

POLL SHOWS ROSS LEADING FOR GOVERNOR'S NOMINATION

MILLER, MASTERS TIED IN SEEKING JOB IN CONGRESS

BOISE, Ida., Aug. 3 (UP)—The local Capital News said today that returns from a state-wide poll conducted by the newspaper have favored Gov. C. Ben Ross a lead of 22 per cent over Gov. Barzilla Clark in the Democratic gubernatorial nomination contest.

Ross polled 49 per cent of the votes cast in the paper's canvass while Clark received 27 per cent.

Lieut. Gov. Charles Gossett polled with 11 per cent and W. P. Whitaker received seven per cent for fourth place.

LEVEL OF FARM PRICES ASCENDS

BOISE, Aug. 3 (Special)—The general level of prices received by Idaho farmers for their products on July 15 was about three per cent higher than a month ago.

The index of "all commodities" stood at 92 per cent of pre-war, the highest since January of this year.

Grains and feed crops did not share in this advance. The grain and feed crop index indicated a further slight drop from last month.

Fruits and vegetables and other crops showed some increase. Thus, the "all crop" index declined only one per cent from the previous month.

All groups in the livestock and livestock products index on July 15 were higher than a month ago. Meat animals, poultry and dairy products and other livestock products all advanced from six to eight per cent.

While the "all livestock" index now stands at 109 per cent of pre-war, six points higher than last month, it still is 23 per cent lower than on July 15 last year.

LETTER CARRIERS SEEK 40 HOURS

BURLEY, Aug. 3 (Special)—Endorsement of a 40-hour work week with the same minimum salary that other postal workers are paid, was the principal action taken by the Federated Rural Letter Carriers in their state convention here Sunday.

These provisions are included in the O'Malley bill which was presented for endorsement at the session. The convention also adopted resolutions favoring affiliation with the American Federation of Labor and the Affiliated Postal Workers of Idaho.

Harold Pattee, Idaho Falls, was elected president to succeed Alonzo Judd, Burley.

Other officers named were: George Cardwell, Coeur d'Alene, first vice president; W. E. Combs, Nampa, second vice president; Charles Braggeman, Twin Falls, third vice president; Kenneth Schrader, Burley, secretary and treasurer; George H. Burdick, state organizer.

Judd and Burdick were elected delegates to the national convention.

Pricing rural carriers in line for promotions within their offices; widow's annuity; 30-year optional retirement; exemption from payment of state tax on gasoline used in carrying their routes; civil service court of appeals; and federal aid for secondary roads traversed by rural routes, were also asked by the convention.

SHIP QUILTS IN AIRPLANE HUNT

MANILA, P. I., Aug. 3 (UP)—The U. S. transport Meigs tonight abandoned the search for last month's clipper, which disappeared early last Friday with 15 persons aboard while flying between Guam and Manila. The Meigs carrying a large passenger list, started for Guam and the United States.

Officials said they did not expect any planes to continue the search. Navy vessels, however, will remain in the area for several days, although hope of finding the big flying boat was gone. More than 800 square miles of sea have been covered in the hunt.

It was disclosed that the oil found floating on the sea near the last reported position of the clipper contained only small quantities of lubricating oil. Officials said it might be impossible to determine whether the oil was of a type used in the clipper.

Farm Security Leaders Visit First Five Choices

JEROME, Aug. 3 (Special) — Idaho's state farm security administration advisory committee met at Jerome Tuesday to visit the first five farms to achieve an ownership status under the Bankhead-Jones farm tenant act, to recommend selection by Secretary Wallace of two additional counties for extension of the tenant ownership program for the fiscal year beginning July 1, and to forward nominations for additional county tenant committees to administer the program locally upon formal approval of the new counties.

Bingham and Canyon counties were recommended for initiation of the 1938-1939 program under the Idaho allotment of \$27,912. This will permit approximately 14 tenant purchase loans to be made with an average farm purchase cost of between \$5,000 and \$7,000. The committee recommendation was based on percentage of farm tenancy, farm population, availability of farm units and opportunities for diversified farming. Final action is contingent on approval of the counties and appointment of county committees by Secretary Wallace.

Visit These Five

Jerome county's committee composed of Ralph Shaver, Carl De Voe and Ivan Epperson, conducted the visit to the five tenant farmers

established on family-sized farms in the county with the \$30,045 allotted last year. The tenants who qualified for successful farm ownership will have 40 years to pay for their farms with interest at three per cent on the unpaid balance. They are Felix Bogusowski, Leon Stokelson, Lloyd Williams, Herman Hall, all of route 1, and Fred W. Peterson, route 2, Jerome.

The Jerome county committee was complimented by the state committee on the high type of tenants selected, excellent soil types of farms purchased and comparatively low prices paid. D. L. Bush, executive secretary of the committee and Idaho state FSA director, gave a report on the program in general and all phases of the FSA program in the state were discussed.

These Present

State committee members present were: G. P. Mix, chairman, Moscow; Col. Joslin, Idaho Falls; Lewis Felt, Blaine; Joe Anderson, St. Anthony; and Ralph E. Shaver, Jerome.

Others in attendance included: Walter A. Zetter, director; Carl E. Johnson, tenant purchase chief; R. T. Magleby, farm management adviser; and Patrick Hughes, family selection chief of the regional FSA office in Portland, and the members of the county FSA office at Jerome.

Masters Claims Effort to "Save State about \$238,000"

Defending his stand on the question of state purchase of the Twin Falls-Jerome inter-county bridge, a matter he noted against when the proposal recently came before the state board of directors, Ira H. Masters, secretary of state and candidate for second district congressman on the Democratic ticket, today had declared his move was made to "save the state about \$238,000."

Masters made this declaration during a radio address delivered here. The address was in the form of a "question and answer" session with Mrs. Bula Malone, Democratic woman leader of this county, and a signer of the candidate's petition, resulting.

It was Mrs. Malone who, in a recent interview with an Evening Times reporter, stated Mr. Masters had informed her and her husband that the bridge matter would be decided favorably to Twin Falls by the primary election. She expressed opinion that he would carry out his word.

Regarding this interview, Mr. Masters said last night:

Fair and Square

"Now I want to thank you, Mrs. Malone, and many others for your loyalty to me in this fight and for that statement which you released to the Evening Times recently while at the Banquet assembly grounds. That statement was fair and square."

During the 15-minute discussion, Mrs. Malone asked Masters why "some people and the newspapers accuse you of double crossing them?"

"Because they insist on buying the bridge at \$847,000—regardless of whether or not it is worth that amount," Mr. Masters answered. "When I told them that I was in favor of a free bridge I did not agree to any fixed price. In fact when this matter was first presented to us, no price was mentioned."

"When the state highway department brought their appraisal of the bridge they fixed the value at \$400,000, or about \$238,000 less than the price the Twin Falls committee is making us to pay for the bridge."

"Strange Reason"

"There seems to be a strange reason why the committee insists on this particular contract being accepted. People are beginning to ask 'is someone getting a commission or a cut out of the sale of this bridge at this high price?' while others are asking 'who gets this down payment of \$100,000?'"

"In other words the value of the bridge should be arrived at and then I think all should agree on the best price we can get and if possible save the state some money. I can repeat, I favor a free bridge but I do not wish to cripple the highway department's program by paying more than the bridge is worth," Masters said.

(Editor's note: A portion of Masters' talk dealing with the bridge matter was not filed with the radio station at the time the speech was given. He made that portion available to the press before the broadcast.)

Discusses Agriculture

During his talk Masters also discussed housing in the United States, prison conditions and reform, and agriculture as it affects Idaho and the other states.

Masters said that the matter of agriculture "is not one that can be lightly disposed of."

"Agriculture is vital to the welfare of the nation as a whole and not just a single state," Masters said. "Of course, the states as units make up the entire situation. Agriculture, as I see it, is menaced by three distinct phases of our modern life. They are the problem of distribution, including transportation; the problem of regulating the markets and market prices; the problem of what we commonly call a surplus."

Masters also discussed the tourist "industry" and said he was a "first booster for the tourist business in Idaho."

Tourist Advertising

He advocated a state-wide tourist bureau and said that "we should put forth every effort to secure an advertising fund of \$100,000 for the next two years. This will develop the tourist business and place it in second rank among our great industries of the Gem state." He said such a move would increase Idaho's tourist business from the \$30,000,000 today to "a hundred million dollars annually."

Prior to the talk by Mr. Masters, Mrs. Masters gave a vocal solo.
