TREASURY WILL SEEK RETURN OF NUISANCE LEVY

TAX WOULD GIVE \$450,000,000 TO U. S. ANNUALLY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (UP)—Acting Secretary of the Treasury Roswell Magill indicated today the treasury will recommend enactment of manufacturers' excise taxes, commonly known as "nuisance taxes," which produce \$450,000,000 annually.

Magill was asked about conflicting reports that the taxes would be recommended. He replied:

"What would you think after looking at the budget?"

The federal government is facing a 1939 deficit of more than \$4,000,000,000.

Magill said the treasury is "considering everything in July tax studies, including a possible broadening of the income tax base. He said, however, that no definite proposals have been drafted.

One possible alternative—broadening the income tax base—would be accomplished by requiring exemptions and increasing surtaxes, similar to a plan advocated last year by Sen. Robert M. La Follette, P., Wis.

Magill said the treasury, in considering the excise taxes and higher income taxes, must consider how many new taxpaying units will be brought into the picture under each plan, the additional revenue involved, and the tax burden now being borne by these classes.

Corrigan Heads for Craziest Of All New York Receptions

ABOARD U. S. LINER MANHATTAN, EN ROUTE TO NEW YORK, Aug. 4 (UP)—Douglas Corrigan got up before breakfast today and said he felt "pretty good so far" but didn't know how he would feel "after they throw all those telephone books at me tomorrow."

The 120-pound Californian, still sticking to his story that he flew from New York to Dublin "by mistake," was headed for one of the craziest receptions in New York's history.

A dozen screeching boats, loaded to the gunwales with thousands of screaming passengers, will surround his ship. They will be divided into two hostile navies, one side yelling at him to come to Brooklyn borough first, the other to Manhattan.

200 Corrigans

He will see 200 Corrigans aboard one ship, 1,000 Irishmen aboard another, fighting to the end for Brooklyn though what borough's official reception committee had attempted to end three days of strife by stepping aside and letting Manhattan have Corrigan first.

Unless their head is rained in the rush, the 300 members of the Manhattan committee, headed by James McGurrin, head of the American Irish Historical society, will accompany the Manhattan from quarantine to the Manhattan dock and take Corrigan off there. Then they will take him to a hotel and keep him there until Friday noon, when the ticker tape parade on Broadway and the official welcome from Mayor F. H. LaGuardia are scheduled.

While Capt. Edwin A. Richmond was pushing the Manhattan through fog at 20 knots toward New York harbor, still 180 miles away, Corrigan discussed such things as his weight, his eating habits, and his airplane.

OIL FURNISHES NO CLUE TO CLIPPER

MANILA, P. I., Aug. 4 (UP)—U. S. navy chemists reported today that samples of oil found on the sea near the last known position of the Hessel Clipper were insufficient in quantity to determine satisfactorily whether the oil came from the missing flying boat.

The Clipper vanished early last Friday while flying between Guam and Manila. Fifteen persons were aboard it.

The announcement virtually eliminated what was considered the only workable clue to the fate of the 23-ton plane.

At the end of the sixth day of intensive searching by air and sea over a vast area of the Pacific ocean east of the Philippine archipelago, no trace of the Clipper had been found.

Several destroyers will continue the search tomorrow. They will then withdraw, leaving submarines, several other naval craft and two amphibians to continue.

NAZIS PROTEST FLIGHT OF CZECH PLANES OVER GERMANY

TWO SHIPS SEEN TRYING TO TAKE PHOTOS OF CITY

BERLIN, Aug. 4 (AP)—Germany protested vigorously to Czechoslovakia today against an alleged infiltration of German territory by a Czechoslovak airplane, the semi-official D.P.B. news agency reported. The agency reported from Glaz, 12 miles from the Czechoslovak frontier, that two Czech planes circled about the town for some time. Attempts by the crews of the planes to photograph Glaz were observed, the agency said.

"Wanton Game"
The German minister to Prague protested sharply to the Prague government, the announcement said, "and demanded the punishment of those responsible for the intentional flight over the German frontier by Czech planes."

The press was aroused by the latest Czechoslovak-German border incident, increasing the tension between the two countries over the minority problem.

"The people in Prague are playing the most wanton game with European peace," the Volkischer Beobachter, organ of the national Socialist (Nazi) party, charged. "This playing with fire reveals unparalleled unscrupulousness. The plan is to create new complications at the moment when the British adviser (Viscount Runciman) comes to Prague and conducts negotiations in a dangerous war atmosphere. Runciman will be able to see for himself in what spirit the Czechs are starting the cover-ups—in the spirit of increased hostility towards the minorities and with a policy of provocation against the reich which is being pushed forward with unparalleled cynicism inspired by the insane idea that Europe has no other task but to let herself be sacrificed on the altar of Czech megalomania."

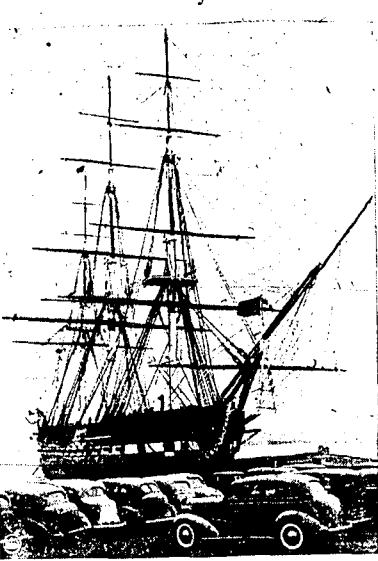

Capone reached forward to embrace him. But bars and non-stretchable prison glass separated them. "My boy," he said.

Grapevine reports later indicated Capone moped quietly in his cell when the visit was over.




