The Irish Laughed and Cried and Yelled Like Mad—CORRIGAN GETS DAFFIEST, BIGGEST OVATION NEGOTIATIONS DEADLOCKED IN JAPAN-RUSSIA CRISIS

First Effort to End Fighting on Siberia Border is Fruitless

Soviet Russia took a stern attitude towards Japan today in the Siberian border dispute. First efforts for negotiations rather than further warfare were deadlocked. Maxim Litvinov, foreign commissar, in effect rejected a Japanese proposal for negotiation. He refused the Japanese suggestion that Soviet troops be withdrawn from the disputed area 150 miles south of Vladivostok, insisting that they were in Soviet territory.

Conciliatory Attitude The attitude at Tokyo was conciliatory and officials there seemed to think that a break could be avoided. Even while the talks progressed, however, new violence flared on the border and an artillery battle was in progress.

Tension Continues In Europe, the tension between Germany and Czechoslovakia was unabated. Germany threatened to fire on Czechoslovak airplanes if they crossed the border. The threat was the aftermath of the recent incident in which Germany charged that Czech planes scouted over her territory and tried to take photographs.

HOPKINS CLAIMS NO WPA COERCION MEMPHIS, Tenn., Aug. 5 (UP)—H. V. Hopkins, administrator of the works progress administration, denied today that there had been coercion of WPA workers in any state primary and said that political organizations "have the right to solicit votes of these workers just the same as those of other persons."

NAMES IN TODAY'S NEWS Hans Herrman, a captain in the German air corps, was shot down in Berlin, compelling an around-the-world flight on commercial air lines in 29 days, 21 hours and 33 minutes. He was one day behind schedule.

It was a triumph for the Ed Crump machine of Shelby county (Memphis) over the Gov. Browning state machine and promised a tight fight in the senate over the eligibility of Berry's successor.

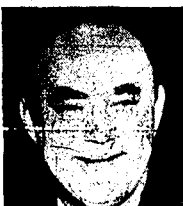

Turn Your Table Over to Vegetables

Let's have a garden jamboree. Ask all the vegetables in.

Watercress, Tomato Salad (Serves 4 to 6)

Two and one-half cups cooked corn cut from cob, 1 1/2 teaspoons sugar, 2 large firm tomatoes, 1/2 cup light mayonnaise, 1 teaspoon paprika, pinch cayenne, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 1/2 teaspoon black pepper, 1 bunch crisp watercress.

Combine corn and sugar. Peel tomatoes and cut into eighths. Remove very soft parts. Slice splices into mayonnaise. Add corn, then tomatoes and mix lightly. Chill well. Cut heavy stems from watercress. Add to salad just before serving.

Make bed of crisp lettuce in large bowl. Turn in the watercress-corn mixture.

Here's a garden sortable from the cook book by Edith Haines.

Baked Tomatoes and Leeks (Serves 4 to 6)

Six medium-sized firm tomatoes, 2 1/2 pounds beefsteak, 1/2 cup uncooked rice, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, scant 1/2 teaspoon black pepper, 4 tablespoons sour cream, 1/4 cup cold water, 2 tablespoons butter.

Wash and boil the rice. Add 1/2 teaspoon salt, the pepper, and sour cream and mix lightly together. Wash the leeks and discard the tough green part. Slice thinly crosswise. Arrange in one layer in a serving dish. Add cold water, sprinkled with 1/2 teaspoon salt, and dot with butter.

Slice off the top of each tomato and scoop out the seeds and enough of the core to make room for the stuffing. Fill with the rice mixture. Replace the tops and arrange the tomatoes on the leeks. Cover the dish and bake in moderately hot oven (375 degrees F.) for 20 minutes. Then uncover and continue baking for 20 minutes more or until the leeks are tender.

Succotash (Serves 4 to 6)

Two tablespoons butter, 2 cups succotash cut from can, 1/2 cup cooked fresh lima beans, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon sugar, 1/2 cup light cream.

Melt butter, add corn, lima beans, seasoning and cream. Mix gently and cook until most of cream has been absorbed.

Italian Edict Restricts Jew Population Activities

NUMERICAL RATIO SET FOR RACE IN ALL PROFESSIONS

ROME, Aug. 5 (UP)—Italy intends to restrict the activities of Jews to the ratio of their numerical representation among the total population, it was announced today.

It was the most sweeping move yet taken in the new Italian "Aryan" racial code.

The announcement was understood to mean that the proportion of Jews in any given walk of life, say law or medicine, must be in the proportion of one to 100 compared to Italians engaged in it. Thus, for example, if there were only 100 doctors in Italy, only one Jew could engage in the profession, and so on in proportion.

Now that Italy possesses an empire, the note said "to avoid the catastrophic plague of mongrelness or the creation of a bastard race, neither European or African, which would foment disintegration and revolt, it is not sufficient to promote severe laws but also necessary to develop strong sentiment, pride and ever present consciousness of race."

"To discriminate does not mean to persecute. The Italian government has no special plan of persecution against the Jews as such."

The note charged that Jews have been "the most integral, most intransigent and most ferocious agents of racialism," and accused Jews of having too close a connection with Masonry and International Bolshevism.

ELECTION FIGHT ENDS IN DEATH

JACKSON, Ky., Aug. 5 (UP)—Former Sheriff Lee Combs, 36, lay dead today, the victim of a wild shooting affray between supporters of Democrat W. Barkley, senate majority leader, and Gov. A. B. (Happy) Chandler, opponents for the Democratic U. S. senatorial primary tomorrow.

Combs' brother, Lewis, 32, Chandler's campaign manager in Breathitt county, and Sheriff Walter Denton, Barkley supporter, were wounded. William Combs, 33, Barkley's county campaign manager, and the city jailer, were sought for the slaying. He is not a relative of the Combs brothers.

Preferred Death

Traffic Accidents Kill Two on Idaho Highways

(By United Press)

Two persons died yesterday in eastern Idaho traffic accidents. One of the victims was struck by a hit-run motorist and left dead on the highway, authorities reported.

Curtis Smith, 20, member of a CCC crew, was found dead on the Arco-Blackfoot highway 25 miles from Blackfoot. Black paint from the car which struck him was found on his forehead, his skull was crushed and his arms and legs were broken.

It was the second hit-run accident within two weeks in Idaho. Leo Hooper, 20, was sent to the penitentiary Saturday after he confessed to the hit-run killing of Frank Cline, 58, on the Marsing-Clayton highway in Owyhee county.

At Idaho Falls, the trick of "hitching a ride" with a bicycle on the rear of a truck proved fatal to Reese Crockett, 24. Crockett was crushed to death last night when the bicycle from which he was holding to the rear of the truck, slipped under the wheels.

As Wendell two mules were killed when struck by an automobile as they crossed the highway. In Emmett, a nine-year-old boy received critical head wounds when he ran in front of an automobile.

Crew Blamed For Montana Train Wreck

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (UP)—The interstate commerce commission bureau of safety today blamed negligence of the crew for a head-on crash June 25 of the Olympian, crack train of the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific railroad.

One person was killed and 82 others, including 64 passengers, were injured when the Olympian crashed into a civilian conservation corps special train in Montana.

Failure to Obey Rules
The wreck occurred near the point where a sister train plunged through a trestle over flooded Custer creek June 19, resulting in the death of 47 and injury to 78.

The safety bureau reported the accident was the result of the failure of the engineer on the Olympian to obey an operation order requiring him to meet and pass the CCC special at Engstrom, Mont. The train passed Engstrom and struck the CCC special about one and a half miles beyond the station.

Improper Consideration
"Inasmuch as there was nothing to distract the attention of the engineer and fireman and since they were required to remember the meet order for not more than 20 minutes, it is apparent that they were not giving proper consideration to the importance of complying with the protective instructions on the meet order," the safety bureau said.

"Had they given the proper consideration this accident would not have occurred."

Kenneth Curtis, Twin Falls aviator, is being held by New Mexico state police at Albuquerque for investigation in connection with an auto trailer theft, according to information received here this afternoon.

No charges have been filed against the young man. It was understood.

She has never before run for public office, although at the Democratic national convention of 1932 she was Idaho delegate secretary and cast Idaho's vote for Roosevelt, and at the national convention of 1936 she was delegate-at-large, seconding Mr. Roosevelt's nomination for Idaho.
