ASPHYXIAATION BLAMED IN PRISON DEATHS

Weinberg Admits Weekly Payments Handed to Hines

NEW YORK, Aug. 23 (U.P.)—George Weinberg, operations manager for Dutch Schultz' multi-million dollar policy racket, testified today that he personally handed to James J. Hines, Tammany district leader, \$500 a week.

Weinberg, who turned state's evidence to accuse Hines of furnishing political protection for the racket, testified in the trial of the political leader that he met Hines in April, 1932, and gave him the first payment of \$500.

Met Regularly
He added that thereafter he met the political chief every week or two until the latter part of 1932 and paid him that amount, at which time Hines "got a raise." The meetings took place in the Hines' house or at the club, the Monograph Democratic club in Hines' 11th assembly district, Weinberg said.

Handed Check
District Attorney Thomas A. Dewey called Weinberg if he had a talk with Schultz after this? A. He told him it was time for us to show the people of Harlem our power, that we had the right kind of protection. I said we ought to open an office.

"Try It and See"
Q. What did Schultz say? A. He said "You know what you're doing, don't you anything. Don't open any office until you see Jimmy about it."

Q. What did Hines say? A. He thought awhile and said "Open it up and try it and see how it goes." So, Weinberg said, headquarters were opened at 231 Lenox avenue.

Q. Did you have a conversation with Hines concerning the racket? A. Yes, at the club.

Q. What was the conversation about? A. I remember that in the afternoon police division.

Q. What did Hines say? A. He said he'd try to do something about it.

Q. Was there any effect on the talk? A. After a while our arrests dropped.

Weinberg had testified earlier that a Harlem policy banker went to Hines in 1931 for protection against Schultz and was told that he had better join the Schultz combination.

Little Entente Gives Hungary Right to Arms

BLED, Yugoslavia, Aug. 23 (U.P.)—The little entente nations—Yugoslavia, Czechoslovakia and Rumania—today recognized the right of Hungary to re-arm for the first time since the World War.

In return, Hungary agreed to avoid armed force in settlement of international problems.

The decision of the entente nations was announced in a communique issued at their conference here. The Hungarian minister to Yugoslavia had been in close contact with the conference and originally it had been intended to recognize an accord covering a wider field of central European relations.

The plan for a "pact of blood" was abandoned, however, due to failure of Czechoslovakia and Hungary to agree on the problem of the Hungarian minority in Czechoslovakia.

Recognition of Hungary's right to rearm followed the recent announcement by Bulgarian relations that post war restrictions on Bulgarian armament had been dropped.

While the conference was acting, Regent Admiral Nicholas Horthy of Hungary, was being elaborately entertained in Germany as the guest of President Hindenburg.

Best Clue is Uncovered in Torso Killings
CLEVELAND, Aug. 23 (U.P.)—A lettered quilt in which parts of the 1931 torso-murder victim of "the mad butcher of Kingsbury Run" were wrapped, was identified today, and police detectives started a hunt for a sawmill-complexioned junk collector.

The torso of the 12th victim—a woman—was found in the folds of the quilt on a dumping ground less than one-fourth of a mile from downtown Cleveland last Tuesday.

The head, wrapped in brown paper, and the legs and arms stuffed in a blanket box, were found nearby.

A short distance away, hidden partially by debris, were the skull and chest bones of the 12th victim—a man.

Improvement Seen in Federal Budget
WASHINGTON, Aug. 23 (U.P.)—Treasury officials today expressed an improvement in the budget this fiscal year if business recovery accelerates during the fall and winter.

Within recent weeks government economists have discovered evidence of an upward trend in business. An improvement in business during the fall and early winter would mean that the treasury's tax collections during the last six months of the fiscal year—January through June—would be greater than anticipated. It also would mean a reduction in relief spending.

Federal Workers Warned on Political Campaigns
WASHINGTON, Aug. 23 (U.P.)—The Civil Service Commission today warned all federal civil service employees against participating in political campaigns.

Among the penalties prohibited were use of campaign stickers on automobiles and "sunning political buttons" on clothing. Employees identified with any political movement.

Little Hope Held for Recovery of Heiress

HOLLYWOOD, Aug. 23 (U.P.)—Little hope was held today for the recovery of Mrs. Emila Jewett Krueger, harvester heiress, after a whispered "death-bed statement" in which she again accused Charles E. McDonald, unemployed electrician, of shooting her on crowded Hollywood boulevard last Friday.

The desperately wounded woman denied there was anything to the attachment between her and McDonald's wife, Mrs. Frances McDonald, Mrs. Krueger's maid and companion.

Charges Filed
Charges of assault with a deadly weapon were filed against McDonald. McDonald admitted to police he shot Mrs. Krueger member of the millionaire McCormick harvester family and wife of Karl Krueger, symphony orchestra leader. He blamed Mrs. Krueger for the breaking up of his home.

Bail fixed at \$50,000. He was arraigned before Municipal Judge S. G. Kern. Bail was fixed at \$50,000 and preliminary hearing set for Aug. 25.

Mrs. Krueger was shot as she attempted to escape from her automobile while McDonald sat in the car parked alongside. He had followed her to the Hollywood boulevard dancing school where Mrs. Krueger's daughter Theresa, was rehearsing.

Primary places Wednesday will be open from 1 p. m. to 8 p. m. Lincoln reminded all spud growers. The poll spots are:

Buhl city hall, Murlough high school, Wilson's store in Kimberly, Castleford office, Fryer highway offices at 119 Third street east in Twin Falls.

Community committee chairman will be in charge at three of the polling spots and county commissioners will handle the other three, Mr. Lincoln said. The vote count will be sent to state AAA offices Thursday, both from this and other north county locations.

Fair Board Sets Special Days at Gala 1938 Event

Decision to set children's day at Twin Falls county fair for Saturday, Sept. 10, completed alignment this afternoon for the special days at the annual fair and rodeo scheduled for Sept. 7-10.

Members of the county fair board last night designated Saturday as children's day after school. The youth ties in the county and various communities had informally favored that day. Thursday, Sept. 8, will be Twin Falls day, and Friday, Sept. 9, will be Buhl day.

Free in Grandstand
Special provision was made for the concluding day of the fair will be free grandstand admission in the afternoon to all grade school children, accompanied by a parent or a guardian. That will permit the children to view the final horse racing events, band concert, and special attractions.

Selection of fair board chairman of various activities in connection with the premiere agricultural event of this area was carried out at last night's gathering. Walter C. Musgrave, Piler, will be chairman of the fair. Claude Delwelle, Twin Falls, chairman in charge of horse-racing arrangements, and W. I. Sackett, Twin Falls, chairman in charge of checking special policemen on the fair grounds.

Tom Paris, secretary of the board and executive manager of the fair, is in general charge. The other board members, Chairman R. O. Wilson, Kimberly, and W. A. Van Engelen, Twin Falls, will also handle special assignments.

Booster Caravan
Board members discussed a booster caravan of motor cars to advertise the fair through the central area, and informally decided to sponsor the caravan. Date would probably be Tuesday, Sept. 6, before the opening.

Cars from all communities in the county would be solicited for the caravan. The caravan will carry publicity material, would tour the north and south sides, probably swinging first into the Buryer and Rupert sections.

Men Found Dead In Cells After Hunger Strike

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 23 (U.P.)—A preliminary examination in connection with an autopsy on the bodies of four convicts found dead after a hunger strike at the Philadelphia county prison indicated that they died of asphyxiation, Coroner Charles H. Hersch said today.

The coroner declined to elaborate on the indications of asphyxiation, emphasizing that it was not a final conclusion. He would not say whether death might have been caused by steam, water or tear gas.

Relatives of the four men reported that the bodies were so disfigured that it was difficult to identify them.

Previously, Hersch, predicting "startling disclosures," said it appeared that four victims had died from beatings or had been scalded to death.

He said that if results of the autopsy "warrant, I will make some arrests."

Two state investigations began today in the strange deaths in the crowded county prison which terminated a noisy hunger strike of 650 convicts against the quality of the prison food.

Points to Gain
While Hersch is his physician, Dr. Martin Green, insisted that the men had died by violence and that the circumstances were "unusual" prison officials insisted that the deaths had been due to accidents and that the men were radical agitators, who had been leaders in the hunger strike.

An autopsy will be performed today to establish definitely the cause of the deaths.

Employment Up 40,000 in July-Perkins
WASHINGTON, Aug. 23 (U.P.)—Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins reported today that factory employment increased 40,000 in July and the weekly factory payroll increased by nearly \$20,000.

She said that the report marked a definite improvement in the employment situation in the non-durable goods district in which employment expanded by more than 3 per cent, principally because of reemployment in the women and clothing and shoes, and in the seasonal food industries, such as canning.

Flowers Can't Droop If You'd Win Prizes

Nodding flowers may be all right in the poetry books, but their heads had better not droop if they want to attract the judges—and incidentally the numerous premiums—at the Grange flower show Wednesday at the Odd Fellows hall.

By way of helping you to enter displays that will meet the approval of the judges and spectators, not only from the standpoint of artistic arrangement, but good condition as well, here are some "tips" which will enable flowers to retain their freshness.

Before Sun-Up

If it's decorative or cactus dahlias that you are planning to exhibit, set your alarm clock for an early hour, for these flowers should be cut before sunrise.

When cutting the show type dahlias

When cutting the show type dahlias, C. S. Randall, local florist, told Mrs. C. T. Koster and Mrs. J. Feldhausen, of the flower show committee, include from two to three feet of the old stock, if possible, in order to keep the blooms open.

Then plunge the stems into three inches

Then plunge the stems into three inches of boiling water for five minutes. Take out and plunge into a large container of cold water until time to exhibit. The container should be large enough to keep the water cold at all times, and it is suggested that ice be added to the water before taking them to the show.

Two small compound or compact dahlias

Two small compound or compact dahlias do not require this special cutting and care, Mr. Randall commented.

Be An Early Bird

Generally speaking, most flowers are at their best early in the morning. Blooms should be cut before 8 a. m. or just after dusk, according to authorities.

It is also advisable to cut before the flowers

It is also advisable to cut before the flowers are at its full size. Not when it is in bud. There are some exceptions, however. The gladioli should be cut after the first buds have opened, but before they are fully opened.

Clipping with scissors is likely to injure

Clipping with scissors is likely to injure the stem, and a sharp knife is the preferred cutting instrument. Flowers should never be broken from the stem with the fingers.

As soon as the blossoms are brought into the house

As soon as the blossoms are brought into the house, they should be set in the coolest place possible. The ideal temperature, rather hard to maintain in summer, is 35 to 45 degrees.

A few pieces of charcoal or a few drops of formalin

A few pieces of charcoal or a few drops of formalin, added to the water, are much preferred to salt as a preservative.

Elmer Lehman, former Republican steel mill worker in Cleveland, once an Employee Representation Plan (company union) officer, briefly union organizer, now a "night club" owner. Hero or villain? 2. Republic Public Capt. Dewey Kelly, Cleveland Police Chief, Balint, former U. S. officer, later a union organizer now accepting occupation as a "discharged Republic steel worker." 3. Vincent Favorito, union lodge president, 5. Bozo Damich, union field organizer at Cleveland, 6. Chief Jim Williams of the fact-finding Republic police force. 7. Walter Malone, once a paid union organizer under Damich.
