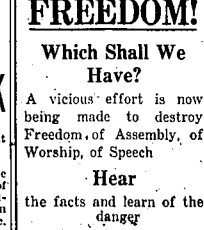

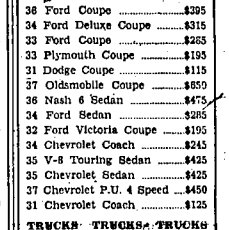

Cadwell Tops Burley By 16-7; Rupert and Filer Play Deadlock

Bruins Defeat Oakley Club; Ferry Beaten

It was a highly satisfied crowd that left Lincoln field last night after watching the opening home game of the season. Twin Falls beat Oakley 20-0 but that was beside the point.

The 2,000 spectators assembled, the interesting feature of the evening was that it appeared certain that Hank Powers had turned out a team which would not have been displayed on the local gridiron for many seasons. The color, it appears, is going to come from a trio of backs that are still in the process of winning their spurs, but who loom as potential football greats for old Twin Falls high school.

Another feature was that the game was played under the floodlights—the first time since 1929—through the game, provided that turned out all last season was on hand for the festivities—A certain sign that there will be a good crowd attending before the season reaches its high point.

But to get down to cold facts the figures for the game are as follows: a pair of touchdowns in the second period, added one each in the third and fourth—and failed to make a single conversion after touchdown.

An outstanding line that never allowed Oakley a first down, while it was in the game, provided the backbone for the Twin Falls defense and offensive. But the color was taken care of by Dale White, Max Croft and Myron Desett. White hit the line hard and often, and displayed a nice elusiveness after he was in the line, bringing him long gains and high scoring honors for the evening. Croft, with some nice runs and a fine bit of punting, scored on a 16-yard run in the second quarter. And Desett provided the thrills of the evening with his long punts—one for 55 yards for a touch-down and another for 42 yards in mid-field.

280-Yard Gain

All told, the backfield, with the addition of Patton, Tetz, Chuck Thomas and Bill Peters, ran up a total of 150 yards from scrimmage, and 121 from return to punts for a total of 280 yards net gain. They scored on a 16-yard run in the second quarter, and 42 yards from the return punts.

Meanwhile the sturdy line was holding the Hornets to one first down—scored when reserves were in the game in the final quarter. Each team attempted three forward passes and had most intercepted and completed none. Twin Falls was penalized 25 yards and Oakley 16. Bruins fumbled four times, recovered three and had Oakley recover once. Oakley fumbled once and Twin Falls recovered.

Croft Scores First

Max Croft chalked up the first Twin Falls score on the first play of the second period when he went 15 yards to score standing up. Desett raced 45 yards for the second in the same frame. Dale White plunged across from the two-yard line in the third, and then he packed the end most of the way on a 35-yard drive in the final frame for the last counter of the day.

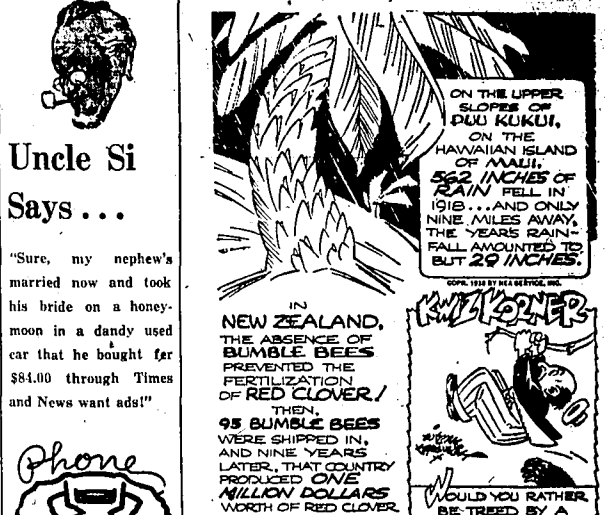
