

He couldn't tell a people on Mondays that it had a corner on adulthood, and spend the rest of the week treating it like a kindergarten class.

Unfortunately, a sense of humor can't be acquired like a college education. This being a great pioneering age in the field of producing substitutes for goods of which there is a scarcity, why doesn't somebody work on a synthetic sense of the ridiculous?
