Green Raps NLRB As Annual Labor Convention Opens

CONVENTION HALL, HOUSTON, Tex., Oct. 3 (UP)—President William Green of the American Federation of Labor today charged in opening the organization's 58th convention that the national labor relations board "has become an ally of the C. I. O."

He also charged that John L. Lewis, head of the committee for industrial organization, is leading a dual movement which is designed to a congressional committee as "Communist."

"We want to be free," he said. "We ask only that the Wagner act be administered in a fair and unbiased group. We serve warning that we will go before Congress this winter and demand that changes be made in this law and in the personnel of the board which administers it."

"As conditions are today, the N. L. R. B. is an ally of the C. I. O. We won't stand for that."

Green roared the federation's defiance of Lewis and his associates brought cheers from the delegates when he said that the federation has emerged from the labor war with numbers of members the largest in its history. He described the federation as the greatest bulwark against the invasion of foreign "kings" into the national political and economic life.

"We are not only opposed to Fascism, Nazism and Communism, we are opposed to all 'isms'—except Americanism," he shouted.

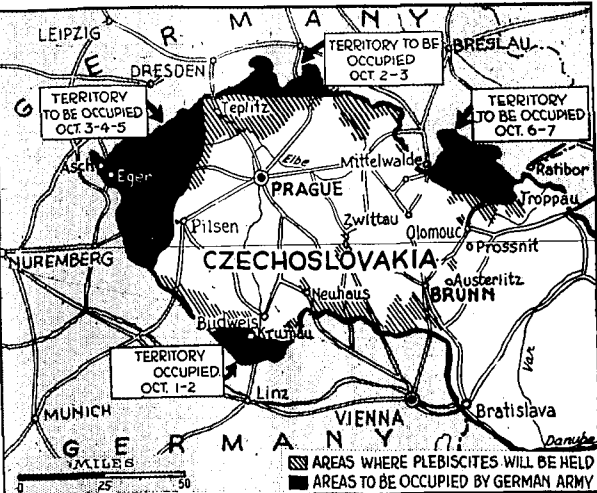
Attack Lewis' Statement A large portion of Green's keynote speech was devoted to a direct attack before a congressional committee by which he outlined what he described as a Communist plot to overthrow the government.

Reads Newspaper Clipping Green read a newspaper clipping describing the recent appearance of a Communist in the Congress against war and Fascism in Mexico. The dispatch described the red flags which were sprinkled generously over the delegates.

"This meeting was held in a hall," he said. "That was a fitting place for it. I notice that Mr. Lewis declared that I don't know where he denounced Communism."

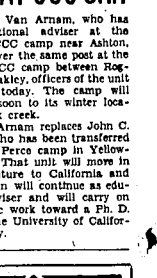

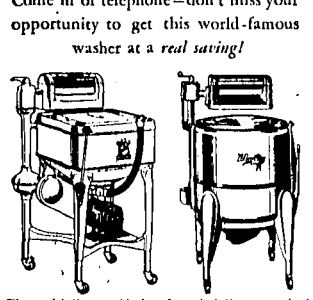
