

YOUNG BOURBONS CONVENE FRIDAY

Opening gun in the pre-election campaign by the Young Democratic club of Twin Falls county will be fired at 8 p. m. Friday in the I. O. O. F. hall here with a rally for which all Bourbon county candidates have been invited to make five-minute talks. President Paul S. Boyd, Buhl, said today.

Chairman of the speakers' program is Miss Virginia Lawrence, Twin Falls, national committee-woman for the Idaho Young Democrats. She announced that the "gong system" will be used on candidates who run over their allotted five minutes.

The Bourbon session will be an open meeting, and part of the discussion may turn to procedure for getting out the largest possible Democratic vote in the county to oppose the Republican bid for power.

One of the state candidates or Bourbon leaders may be here as principal speaker. Miss Lawrence said, but negotiations were still incomplete this morning. Possible announcement was expected later today.

Refreshments of coffee and doughnuts will be served at conclusion of the party.

DOSSETT EARNS C. OF I. HONORS

All-around man on the College of Idaho campus is Cecil Dossett, senior from Twin Falls, who this week was appointed vice-president of the associated student body of the College of Idaho by the board of directors, according to word received here.

The board of directors is composed of four elected student body officers, managers of the six major activities and one faculty adviser and is the managing and executive body without need of faculty approval.

Dossett's appointment, since he is not allied with any of the three fraternities on the campus, may reasonably be expected to be free from "campus politics" and awarded on more of a basis of merit than is usual, C. of I. leaders said. In addition to being the acknowledged leader of the independents, or non-fraternity group, and one of the more popular social leaders on the campus, Dossett is an outstanding athlete. He plays both football and basketball and has been one of the most dependable players, but his major accomplishments are in track. He is a high hurdler man and runs the 220 and in his sophomore year was one of the co-holders of the high jump title in the Northwest conference.

"Civilized" Lion Breaks Loose From Cage; Stalks, Kills Man

WILDWOOD, N. J., Oct. 6 (AP)—A seven-year-old lion, so civilized he would ride around the walls of a motor drome in a sleazer, became a jungle brute after a few minutes of unexpected freedom last night. He stalked and killed a man and carried him away in his jaws.

He was called "Tiddy" and was owned by Joseph Doshik who operated the motor drome. When the master entered the cage at 10:30 p. m., the lion charged past him and out the door.

Loose on the boardwalk, the lion stalked leisurely while Doshik ran to telephone the police. He soon found the new scenery not to his liking and went back to the cage. But Doshik had closed the door. The lion could not get back in. He squatted and appraised the cage a moment, then stole away, homeless for the first time in his life and frightened by it. Within a few minutes he had lost everything that civilization had taught, and became a predatory beast.

Thomas Saito, 37, a Japanese auctioneer employed on the board-

walk, was standing on the running board of his parked automobile, preparing to enter it when he heard the screams of the 10-year-old son of his employer sitting in the front seat. At the same instant the lion bore him down.

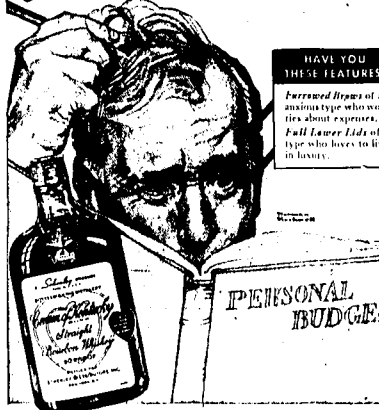
The lion had been at Jarge two hours when Patrolman John Gares, searching along the boardwalk, heard a rattling sound and saw him crouched to spring at him from a few feet away. Gares already had his revolver in his hand. He would not have had time to fire more than one shot but he sent the one bullet accurately. The lion fell dead in its tracks, a bullet through its eye. Then the hunters found Saito's boy, mangled by tooth and claw and the clothes ripped off. His neck had been broken.

Public Forum

CRITICIZES RIDICULE FOR WPA TIMEKEEPERS
Editor, Evening Times:

In the Public Forum Sept. 20, 1938, under the heading "Says Townsendites Might Stool Election" One of our citizens of Burley seems to use the same tactics against every thought except his own that he accuses others of using against his; namely, ridicule and abuse. He picks out for special mention timekeepers on WPA and pictures them as leeches that have no excuse to exist. It would be comical if it weren't so pathetic. In the first place he displays ignorance of the duties of a timekeeper.

He does not know that a timekeeper puts in an average of seven hours each working day and is only paid for five hours at a wage that is far below a standard of decent living. In a great many instances they are timekeepers because they have no choice, when we consider that most of us have families to support. We wonder if the gentleman would like to trade his real work for a timekeeper on WPA. We believe it could be arranged. We wonder if this gentleman realizes that these WPA workers pay the taxes on his houses that he works so hard to support, or to rent to someone that is more fortunate than to work on WPA.

We have no quarrel with the Townsend people, personal or political, except some of its point out that unless the economic system that forced us on WPA is changed, that it will fail. First, because labor produces all wealth; this being true, labor must pay all taxes. If this were not so, why was the tax on the U. S. A. only \$8,000,000,000 in 1930 and \$350,000,000,000 in 1937? The potential wealth was here; what made the difference in value?

Second, 20 per cent of the people of the U. S. A. own 80 per cent of the wealth, quotes William E. Borah. What is there to prevent them from gambling on Wall street where the Townsend people expect to collect the larger part of the taxes? They own 80 per cent of the wealth that they gamble with. What is to prevent them from passing on the tax to the 98 per cent of the necessities of life by charging it to overhead? The 98 per cent are the essential workers, whether by hand or brain.

As far as the writer of this article is concerned, he is not opposed to the Townsend plan or any other plan that has for its object a better distribution of created wealth, but he does think that all should know more about cause and effect and not lead any part of the citizens to hope for something that may prove a disappointment.

Grape Jelly's Real Delicacy; Here's Recipe

Like grape jelly? Practically everybody does, and the Evening Times offers home-makers today two top-notch jelly-making recipes.

Here they are, as prepared by Frances Lee Barton, nationally known home economics expert.

RIPE CONCORD GRAPE JELLY
AND BUTTER

To prepare fruit, stem about 5 pounds fully ripe grapes and crush thoroughly. Add 1/2 cup water, bring to a boil, cover, and simmer 5 minutes. Separate juice from pulp by placing hot fruit in 2-quart sieve. For jelly: Run enough juice through a double layer of cheesecloth held in a small sieve to obtain 4 cups of strained juice. For butter: Rub grapes from which juice has drained through sieve to obtain 4 1/2 cups pulp. Use the excess juice or water if necessary to fill up last 1/2 cup.

CONCORD GRAPE JELLY
4 cups (2 1/2 lbs.) juice
7 1/2 cups (3 lbs.) sugar
1/2 bottle fruit pectin

Measure sugar and juice into large saucepan and mix. Bring to a boil over hotest fire and at once add bottled fruit pectin, stirring constantly. Then bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1 minute. Remove from fire, stir quickly. Paraffin hot jelly at once. Makes about 11 glasses of fluid ounces each.

CONCORD GRAPE BUTTER
4 1/2 cups (2 1/2 lbs.) pulp
7 cups (3 lbs.) sugar
1/2 bottle fruit pectin

Measure sugar and grape pulp into large kettle, mix well, and bring to a full rolling boil over hotest fire. Stir constantly before and while boiling. Boil hard 1 minute. Remove from fire and stir in bottled fruit pectin. Pour quickly. Paraffin hot grape butter at once. Makes about 11 glasses of fluid ounces each.

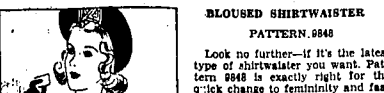

NEW DEAL TO STAND BEHIND ALL DEMOCRAT NOMINEES

EVERY BOURBON CANDIDATE WILL RECEIVE BACKING

By LYLE C. WILSON
 WASHINGTON, Oct. 6 (Special)—Chairman James A. Farley has placed the Democratic national committee today squarely behind all Democratic nominees in this campaign regardless of whether they are liberal or conservative. Farley predicted that the two-party system would prevail here for many more years.

Some persons saw in his policy statement a contrast with the Sept. 2 pronouncement by President Roosevelt in favor of liberal candidates.

Mr. Roosevelt, who has stepped over party lines at least twice—in Nebraska and Minnesota—since entering the White House, in September told press conference questioners:

"If there is a good liberal running on the Republican ticket, I would not have the slightest objection to his election. The good of the country rises above party."

Will Support Nominees

He assented then to a suggestion that a liberal Republican would be more likely to vote in the national interest than would a conservative Democrat.

Farley had a press conference yesterday, the first in a long time that could not remember when the previous one took place.

"All the conventions and primaries are over," he told questioners, "and I'm going to support the nominees of the party."

He was asked whether that meant support of Democratic nominees "whether they are liberal or not."

"Why certainly," the chairman replied, and explained that he was speaking only for himself and the Democratic national committee.

Farley was not a party to the New Deal primary "purge" except in Maryland where he advised Mr. Roosevelt on strategy in the effort to prevent nomination of Sen. Millard E. Tydings. He parried "purge" questions yesterday, especially whether patronage would be taken from offending conservative Democrats.

"All This Talk Foolish"

There already is evidence in Nevada and Virginia, however, that some of the Democrats considered to have been unfaithful to the administration must suffer for their sins.

"I think all this talk of what is going to happen after the elections is foolish," Farley said in response to "purge" patronage inquiries.

"What the Democratic national committee should do is everything possible to elect Democratic nominees."

He said specifically that included senators against whom the "purge" failed and the Democratic ticket in California where both senatorial and gubernatorial candidates have endorsed a \$30-a-week Thursday pension plan. Both Mr. Roosevelt and Secretary of Treasury Morgenthau have condemned the Thursday pension plan, although Mr. Roosevelt said California had a right to experiment and that state experimentation might serve some useful purpose.

CZECH TROOPS PLUNDER ZONE NO. 2, NAZIS CHARGE

DISPATCH TERMS AREA CONDITIONS TO BE "CHAOTIC"

By FREDERICK C. OECHEMER
BERLIN, Oct. 6 (AP)—The German official news agency alleged today that conditions in zone No. 2 of Czechoslovakia, Sudetenland, allotted to Germany, were "chaotic" and that Czech troops were plundering in the area.

After detailing alleged conditions, the agency ended its communique by saying that the Czechoslovak government apparently was no longer in position to maintain order in the Sudeten territory and that looting by Czech troops endangered the entire population.

It was made known that Adolf Hitler had left Berlin for zone No. 2 this morning, traveling by train.

Soon afterward, the official agency said that the German occupation of zone No. 2 (which under the Munich agreement the German troops entered Sunday) had been delayed beyond schedule because the Czechs were late in evacuating certain points, especially Deutschschnee and Kunersdorf.

Late Leaving
The cities of Warrnsdorf, Rumburg and Friedland, near the frontier, were mentioned as points which the Czechs were late in leaving.

Continuing, the agency asserted that all roads leading back into the interior of Czechoslovakia from Reichenberg, the chief city in zone No. 2 were congested and that Czech troops lacked gasoline, and their armored cars and trucks were immobilized.

Food also was lacking, the communique said, and it alleged that in consequence 1,000 Czech troops were reported to be plundering Kunersdorf, where conditions were "chaotic."

Then came the concluding statement that the Czechoslovak government seemed no longer able to maintain order in the Sudeten territory.

Zone No. 2 is at the north side of Czechoslovakia, north of Prague.

Under the Munich agreement German troops were to have entered it Sunday and completed their occupation Monday.

Stars on Zone No. 4
The high command of the army announced that German troops under Col.-Gen. Kurt Rudolf Cserwenko's command began their occupation of the last zone, No. 4, this morning, crossing "the former Czech-German frontier" between the Czech towns of Loebacheta, on the east, and Landeck, on the west.

Zone No. 4 is on the north side of Czechoslovakia, north of zone No. 2.

The international commission delegated to fix conditions for the surrender of Sudetenland territory announced at a meeting last night the territory to be occupied by the German army.

To German Troops
The coal area of Dux and Bruex, the hop growing district of Salz, the important district just west of Pilsen and his great Bohemian mountains were among the cities of Neustadt, Troppau, Bischofstein, Znanin, Mehrsch-Krumau and Auspitz were allotted to German troops occupation.

A foreign source acquainted with the proceedings of the international commission asserted today that though there had been some disagreement on the subject of the coal area, it was said that everything was going satisfactorily and that both Czechoslovak and German delegates were "completely reasonable."

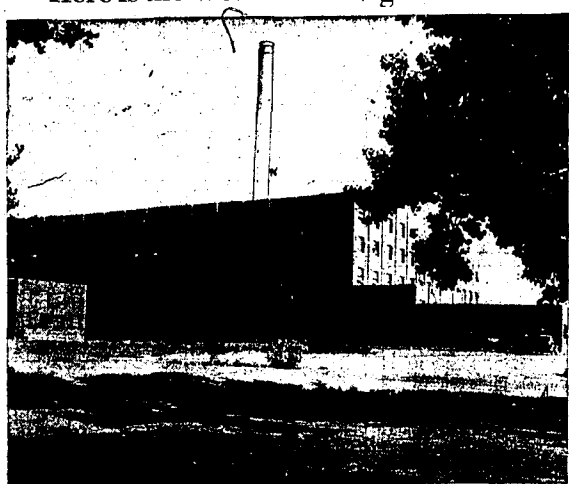

Big New Sugar Plant Nearly Ready for Opening at Nyssa

The new "big brother" to Amalgamated Sugar company's Twin Falls, Burley and Rupert sugar plants is now practically completed and ready to usher in a new industry along the western border of Idaho.

The "big brother" is the new Nyssa (Or.) plant, about which observers say "there's nothing like it in the west."

Runs Soon
The big plant will soon be running at full blast, according to Amalgamated officials. And its entry into the beet industry will mean that Idaho will also benefit. The Nyssa establishment means added traffic, employment in western Idaho and stimulus to business in many lines since the plant requires chemicals, fuel, gasoline, oil, coal, transportation and other materials.

Approximately 175 men will go to work in the Nyssa plant under Supt. Burnall Brown. The factory will stage a 100-day run, working day and night. It has a capacity of 2,000 tons of beets per day and a storage capacity of 500,000 hundred-pound sacks of sugar.

The plant is an investment of \$2,500,000. It will bring western Idaho and eastern Oregon farmers

Processing of beets at the Twin Falls plant of the Amalgamated Sugar company will start at 12:04 a. m. Saturday of this week instead of 12:01 a. m. next Monday as previously announced. It had been reported today by H. A. Elock, Idaho district manager.

The 48-hour advance in the opening schedule, according to Elock, is necessary because of the favorable conditions which have existed for harvest of the beets. "The beets are being dug at a faster rate than was anticipated," Elock said. The earlier start will not affect the anticipated 85 day run, he said.

Elock stressed the importance of workers reporting on time.

"All employees of the Twin Falls sugar factory who have received cards to report to work, report 48 hours ahead of date on the cards. The factory will start at midnight Friday instead of midnight Sunday."
