Guiding Emotional Expression Termed Teacher Obligation 800 IN ATTENDANCE AS EDUCATION MEET OPENS

Declaring a new responsibility and obligation of the school and its teachers is that which calls for an attempt to guide and direct children's emotional expression in individually desirable and socially worthy channels...

PURGE OPENS ON STAFF AIDES OF NATIONS' LEAGUE

By WALLACE CARROLL. GENEVA, Oct. 28 (UP)—A purge of the League of Nations secretariat was reported under way today with the double objective of effecting budget economies and amending the way for the ultimate return of Germany and Italy to a reformed league.

It was reported that the purge might involve the retirement of as many as 50 officials within the next year, including some of the highest ranking members of the secretariat or permanent personnel.

Left Wing Officials Out In diplomatic quarters, it was predicted that the first victims would be members of a small group of left wing officials who more or less openly oppose Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain's policies.

One high official already has retired—Marcel Hodey, French member of the "major cabinet" delegation to the league in its demands for support against the totalitarian nations and Japan, and that they have sought to embarrass Germany, Italy and Japan in other ways.

Great Britain instituted the economy drive, which is basis for the purge, at the annual league assembly in September, when delegates of all member nations met there. The assembly created a committee of five members to study means of reducing expenditures on the league and international labor organization staffs.

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RESOLUTION ASKS PURCHASE GROUP SEEKS BEAN AID

CALDWELL, Ida., Oct. 28 (Special)—Powerful support of Idaho's farmers was thrown today into the effort to have the state of Idaho take over the Twin Falls-Jerome inter-county bridge.

One of the major resolutions approved by the State Grange today after an 18-hour concluding session was this:

Recommendation that the Twin Falls-Jerome inter-county toll bridge be purchased by the state and made a public utility.

The resolution was backed by the North Side and Twin Falls county Pomona Granges. An earlier resolution asked that the U. S. government make loans on dry beans on a basis of \$3.50 per hundred pounds—the loan to apply on three-fourths of an acre of beans crop. That move was inaugurated by the Twin Falls Pomona and endorsed by the North Side unit.

Before concluding the state convention, the Grange selected Idaho Falls as its 1939 convention city and adjourned its annual gathering here, attended by more than 600 delegates, the convention worked overtime to wind up its resolutions and other business.

Other resolutions approved included: A demand that the state prison parole system be lightened and that 70 paroles be given to second offenders.

A resolution that congress "take back the power" of regulating the college and state money.

Says Borders to Indo-China Must Be Tightly Shut

TOKYO, Oct. 28 (UP)—Japan has protested to France against the transportation of war materials to China through Indo-China and has warned that she might take such measures as she felt necessary unless the supply line was closed, the foreign office disclosed today.

A foreign office spokesman said that Yotara Sugimura, ambassador at Paris, had been instructed to make the protest. He was told, in protesting against the continued transportation of war materials through French Indo-China, to ask the French government to take effective measures to prevent such transport.

Further, the spokesman said, Sugimura was instructed to demand that the French government fails to take such measures Japan might be compelled in self defense to take such measures as she deems necessary.

The supply line to China through French Indo-China is of increased importance to the French government of the Hong-Kong-Canton route. Supplies go from Haiphong, on the Indo-China coast, by railroad to Yunnan province in China.

If the Indo-China line were severed, China would have to depend for foreign materials on the overland routes from British Burma into the Yunnan province through remote Sinking province.

"Whereas, Nov. 11, 1918 will mark the 20th anniversary of the signing of the armistice of the World War, and

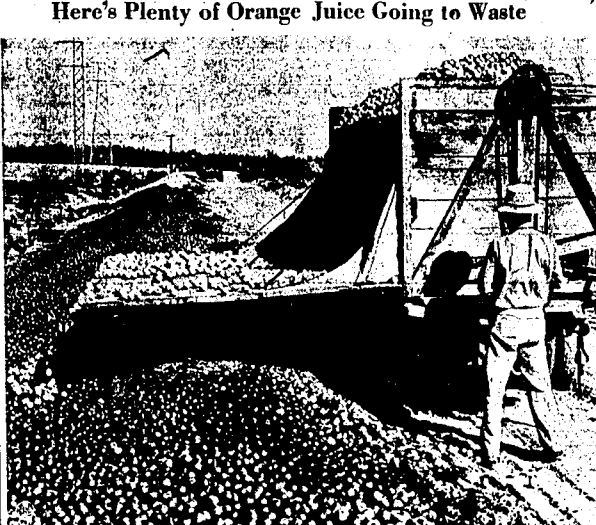

GERMANY ROUNDS UP JEWS FOR EVICTION TO POLAND

FAMILIES TORN APART AS NAZIS ROUT OUTSIDERS

BERLIN, Oct. 28 (UP)—Police rounded up Polish Jews in Berlin and elsewhere in the reich today for immediate eviction across the border into Poland.

Midnight was the deadline for the enforced exodus.

It was estimated that several hundred had been arrested during the night and taken to the Alexander barracks, near police headquarters in the Alexanderplatz.

Hundreds of others who were not arrested were ordered during the night to report to the foreigners' bureau this morning. They were given visas and told to be over the border by midnight.

Informal sources estimated that 2,000 or more Poles were affected in Berlin, while throughout the reich the figure was much greater, particularly in view of the inclusion of Austria in the reich.

Many foreign Jews had been arrested in Vienna since last night, and in Poland, Czechoslovak and Hungarian citizens, many of them resident in Austria for years.

Dale Crumb Fudding
1 1/2 tablespoons flour
1 teaspoonful baking powder
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1/2 cup milk
1 cup dried bread crumbs
1 cup nut meats
2 cups pasteurized dates, sliced
Mix flour, baking powder and sugar together. Add sliced dates, bread crumbs and chopped meats. Stir in the beaten eggs and milk. Pour into a buttered baking dish. Place in a pan of hot water and bake for one hour in a moderate oven. Serve with whipped cream. Eight to ten servings.

As far as could be learned, only males were arrested in Berlin, although it was reported from Rostock and Breslau that whole families had been arrested there.

Polish sources said that hundreds of those rounded up in Berlin had been loaded without baggage into trains at the Schescher station for immediate transport to the border. At the barracks where those arrested were taken, Jewish men, women, sisters, wives and children of the seized men gathered, weeping.

It was understood all Polish citizens in Germany, non-Jewish as well as Jewish, had been ordered by Poland to present themselves to their consulates before the end of October for a special stamp on their passports under the Polish law of last March 3 covering the re-establishment of citizenship by Poles long resident abroad.

Beats Deadline
The law provided that some Poles might actually be required to repatriate themselves. Non-compliance with the law might result in the loss of citizenship, thus depriving the country where they are resident of the right to deport them. This apparently explained Germany's action before the deadline.

All male Polish Jews in Berlin who were not ordered to the foreigners' bureau were rounded up by police early in the morning and taken to precinct stations.

Those over 75, those seriously ill or those having tickets for emigration from the reich were allowed to leave.

The other men were taken to the Alexander barracks and two other

points, one of them a slaughterhouse. Their wives were told to prepare food for two days and warm clothing, and to bring them to those points or to the precinct stations.

Women Bring Food
The men arrived in police vans early in the afternoon. Their womenfolk brought food and baggage to the stations.

Scenes of great excitement and distress were witnessed as families were broken up. Many made frantic last-minute efforts to reach friends by telephone.

One woman said tearfully: "They took my 15-year-old son."

In front of the foreigners' bureau a man waiting with his wife and two small children said:

"I just returned from a business trip this morning and got this word. How can I be expected to pack and get out by tonight?"

The foreign press was informed officially that "several thousand undesirable Poles" the announcement did not specify Jews — were

being transported over the border today before they lose their citizenship.

NON-FARM JOBS SHOW INCREASE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28 (UP)—Secretary of Labor Perkins reported today that non-agricultural employment increased approximately 440,000 between August and September and that factory pay rolls jumped \$7,500,000 a week.

She declared that the gains were larger than seasonal.

Despite the reported gains, non-agricultural employment in September was 18.4 per cent below September, 1937 and payrolls were 22.6 per cent below the same month last year.

But administration officials were encouraged further by increasing activity in the durable goods industry. Secretary of Commerce Roper, however, warned businessmen against premature price increases that would halt trade recovery by placing products beyond the pocketbooks of consumers.

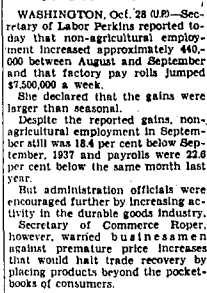

MANY INDUSTRIES SEEK EXEMPTION

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28 (UP)—Wage Hour Administrator Elmer Andrews said today that "numerous" requests for exemption for the law had been received but that all will be referred to the legal division for study before final decisions are made.

"Business men generally know whether they are in interstate commerce, without writing us," Andrews said. "It would be a good thing if they would just go ahead and comply."

He said exemptions have been requested by the Puerto Rico tobacco industry, domestic tobacco stemmers in the five-cured belt, the pecan shelling industry, the U. S. rug and carpet association, the American Bankers' association, the American Newspaper Publishers association, and Pacific dried fruit packers.

Dillinger's Doctor Found Guilty Again

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 28 (UP)—Another prison term faced Dr. Clayton May, the so-called "Dillinger doctor," today following a jury verdict finding him guilty of second degree murder and conspiracy to commit an illegal operation.

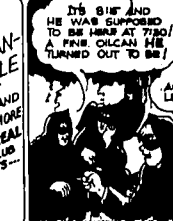

Cotton will be Used in First 'Two-Price' Experiment

WALLACE LASHES GOP OPPOSITION TO FARM PLANS

By G. E. STEWART, JR.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 28 (AP)—Agriculture department experts sounded out cotton processors today in the first step toward expansion of markets for surplus agricultural products.

Proposed by Secretary of Agriculture Wallace to supplement existing farm aid measures, the program will be a "two price" system under which surplus farm commodities would be sold to low income families at less than market prices.

Meanwhile, Wallace assailed critics of the administration's farm program for the second time in 24 hours. In a formal statement issued here and in a speech delivered at Reading, Pa., last night, he defended the new agricultural adjustment act and charged "ultra-conservative Republicans" with inconsistency in their attacks.

Program Shaped
Wallace's "two price" experiment to increase demand for farm products is being shaped by Assistant Secretary Harry L. Brown. First comprehensive studies, it was indicated, will be in the cotton industry.

Brown plans to call conferences with small groups representing various types of cotton processors and later to call a general conference. Lawrence Myers, department marketing expert, now in New York at the meeting of the cotton textile institute to explain the government's position and obtain remarks.

Details of the plan have not been worked out in any form. The problem is to take unused farm surpluses and transfer them to persons who need them but whose standards of living do not permit them to buy at present prices.

Three obstacles appear to threaten the plan:
1. Merchants may object, contending that the government is entering the distribution and sales business in competition with private enterprise.
2. Extreme difficulty may be experienced in determining the families entitled to reduced prices and those who must pay regular rates.
3. The proposal may prove so costly that present funds will prove inadequate and congress will refuse to appropriate the difference.

Each year, for four years, this northeastern Ohio town has looked forward eagerly about this time to the latest Czeszcicki "molded pumpkin" creations—pumpkins with features of notables in public life, of death's heads, of just ordinary people—all designed to give the traditional Halloween Jack O'Lantern a new life.

Catch 'em while they're young is the basic rule in growing "planned pumpkins," says Mr. Czeszcicki. An aluminum, two-part mask of whatever facial form desired is placed over the unsuspecting and helpless pumpkin at an early age. In about three weeks the two halves are removed and there looking up at you is your closest friend or favorite movie actor, a pumpkin. In Maple Grove in pumpkin pie, or Gable lined up with a candle.

It's a very successful business, too. Pumpkin Planner Czeszcicki sells his special pumpkins at good prices, having achieved something approaching national fame.
