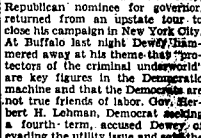

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Full Triumph Forecast over White Fly Peril in Beets and Beans

SUGAR COMPANY CHIEF TELLS OF BATTLE ON SEED

Fly-resistant beet seed — "which has been the salvation of the western sugar beet industry" — will be so advanced within five more years that "nobody on the Twin Falls tract will even worry about the disease," Harry Elcock, Idaho manager of Amalgamated Sugar company, predicted to the Junior Chamber of Commerce here last night.

Elcock recounted the long fight against leafhopper blight of sugar beets, told the steps by which the resistant beet seed was developed and then pointed significantly to the future by assuring that experts of the U. S. bureau of entomology here "are still working to get a better resistant seed."

"In other words, they won't be satisfied until they get a beet that is actually immune to the disease."

Twin Falls in Spotlight

The sugar executive testified Jaycees members with this assertion at the close of his talk:

"The theory of disease-resistance in anything—whether it be plants, animals or humans—is started right here in Twin Falls."

Going back to the start of the battle, Elcock said he accepted a 1924 post at Las Cruces, N. M., in 1927. At Las Cruces was the heaviest white fly infestation in the world, and was chosen as one of four places to begin the attack by science against a tiny fly threatening to wipe out a major western farm industry.

The other spots were Twin Falls, to which Charles Cornman was sent; Riverside, Calif., where Dr. Elbanks Carney was in charge of experiments; and Salt Lake City, in charge of Dr. F. V. Owen. The four men were ordered to seek a beet seed resistant to curly top.

"As a result of this move," Elcock said, "the salvation of the sugar beet industry in the west will be centered around Twin Falls and Las Cruces."

How They Started

He explained that the experimenters "backed up planting of beets gradually, seeking to plant in the winter to avoid the white fly. Elcock found at Las Cruces that this did not produce a sugar beet but that September-planted beets did produce beet seed—"the first in the United States."

"We found occasional beets with a strain of resistance," he said in citing the first ray of hope. "We picked these out from the seed resistant to the disease. That showed us there was a physiological resistance within the beet."

The experimenters and their federal chiefs decided, Elcock said, that if a resistant seed was to be produced it must be grown in the United States because efforts to copy European seeds "had always failed."

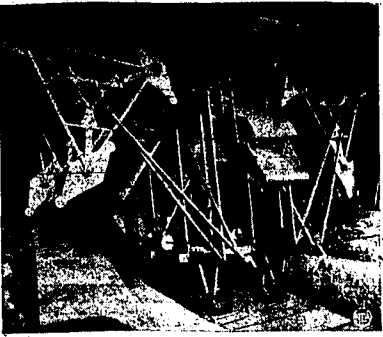
European Plan

Actual development of the resistant seed was done "in rather a novel way," Elcock explained. "Europe plants in April, lets the beets grow, then puts them in earthen silos, then plants them later—in all, a two-year process."

"But we planted in September, let the beets grow dormant during the winter, and produced seeds by the next June. It took me from 1922 to 1933 to find out that the one single thing that had to be when planting beets for seed was not to thin them. After we found that, we were set to produce in quantity when we had finally evolved a resistant seed."

By 1933 Mr. Elcock, Mr. Cornman and Dr. Karner thought they had

what they wanted and decided to put it out in a small way.

Temporary Setback

"But the season of 1933," Elcock said, "was one of the best years in history all over the west. The fly didn't hit and growers figured the cycle was past. Many companies cancelled their contracts for our resistant seed."

"Then came 1934. That was the world's worst year for fly infestation. Only 600 acres out of thousands were saved on the north side and south side tracts in southern Idaho. So we got a big order."

Elcock by then had resigned from the USDA to take on growing of the resistant seed. He said his first year he produced at Las Cruces 800,000 pounds of resistant seed. In 1937 he put in 1,400 acres and produced 1,000,000 pounds of the seed—and the large-scale war on the white fly was on in earnest.

"The seed we discovered was very resistant," he said, "but later scientists have found they could hybridize it and get still better resistance. Consequently, on the Twin Falls and north side tracts this year you'll feel the disease was never here."

Startling Proof

Proving dramatically, however, that the fly is present in this area in numbers enough to wreck the crop if it were not for resistant seed, the sugar company chief said that his concern has planted old-type seed on certain plots scattered on farms in this area.

"The average tons per acre with resistant seed is 16," he said. "But the old-type German seed has produced less than one-half ton per acre. So there is a terrific white fly infestation this year."

Elcock praised the work now being carried on at the entomology bureau here by Dr. A. H. Douglas, director; Dr. R. L. Pietsch and Albert Murphy.

"The fight is not over by a long way," he said, "I know and anybody knows the resistance of the beet we now have is only about 85 per cent. But we feel that this resistance eventually be extended to complete immunity."

Elcock invited the Jaycees to make a personal visit to the site of the big plant here. Members voted to do so immediately after the next general meeting Dec. 8.

'CHUTES ARRIVE FOR PILOTS' USE

Two parachutes, for use by members of the Idaho Pilots' association, arrived in Twin Falls today from Seattle and are available for immediate use. It was announced by Lionel A. Dean, president of the association.

One chute was purchased by association funds while the other was paid for by Guy Olin, Kimberley rancher, who has taken up flying as a hobby. Olin, however, donated the parachute to the organization.

One chute, for use by a person weighing less than 170 pounds, is 24 feet in diameter while the other, for use by heavier persons, is 28 feet in diameter.

Arrival of the 'chutes will permit the fliers to practice stunting. Parachutes must be worn at all times a flier is doing acrobatic maneuvers, according to United States department of commerce rulings. Small charges will be made among members in order to raise funds to have the parachutes re-packed every 60 days, as required by law.

BOISE, Ida., Nov. 2 (AP)—Republicans and Democrats began throwing their punches today as, with the general election six days away, the campaign began going to the home stretch.

The sparring centered around state issues. The national representative campaign has hinged more on national issues than anything else and has remained out of the price ring.

But within the state lineup, with the main prize the governorship and the evidence of a close race, brings an element of frenzy into Democratic and Republican headquarters, the heavy ammunition began to fly.

Republican Chairman Tom Heath made public a letter, assertedly written by A. C. Merritt, commissioner of public works, which warned the department's employees that "if Bottolfsen goes in, we go out," and urging them to support Ross.

Heath said this letter "showed the political nature of the department" and said the Republican aim was to "clean up that department along with some others."

At Grangeville, C. Ben Ross, Democratic candidate for governor, attacked an audit of the highway department which accused his previous three administrations of "corrupt practices" in road building, and said that "the reason most of you farmers could come in to this meeting tonight is because the Democratic administration gave you roads on which to travel."

Welcomes Clean-Up
Lella Bedford, state librarian who recently wrote Attorney General J. W. Taylor to inform him that she didn't think he made "a very good library board chairman," said she would welcome a Republican clean-up of the statehouse as it would take the spoils system out of her department.

George Curtis, Democratic candidate for secretary of state, told a Rexburg audience that Heath was conducting the Republican campaign in an "irresponsible" manner by "making unfounded assertions."

Adding unintentional impetus to a Republican argument to the farmers, Richard Ross, federal crop statistician, came out with a report showing that farm prices in Idaho were still dropping.

Gov. Barzilla Clark rapped the flat \$5 auto license plan put up by C. A. Bottolfsen, Republican candidate for governor, and accused Judge Charles Koelsch of the third district of seeking "personal glorification" through his connection with the grand jury investigation of state government.

Pool halls and bookmakers posted odds both ways on the gubernatorial campaign; and said there was \$1,350 untaken Ross money on one board.

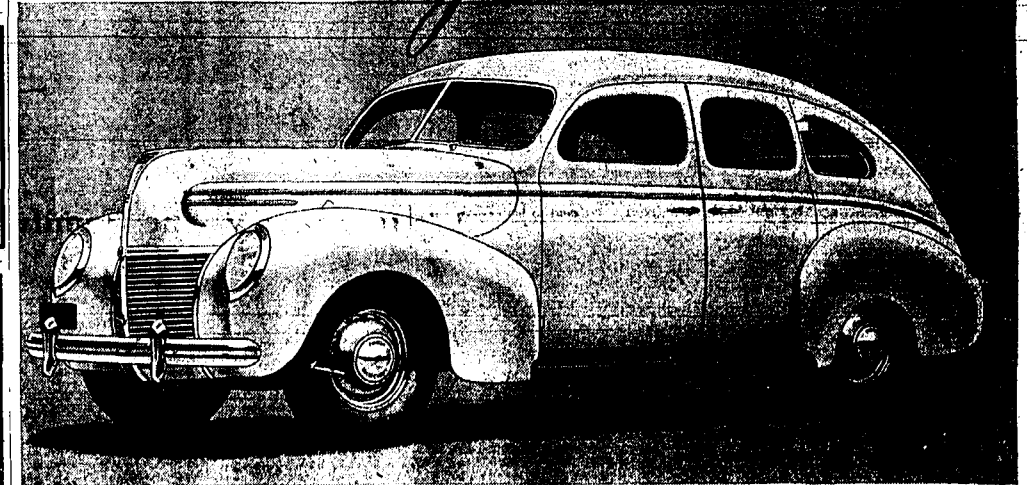

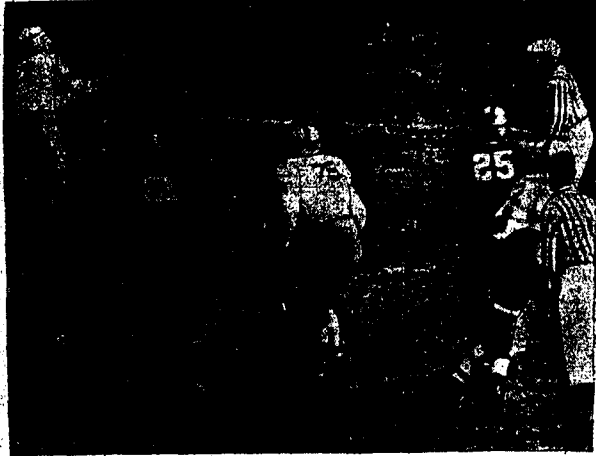

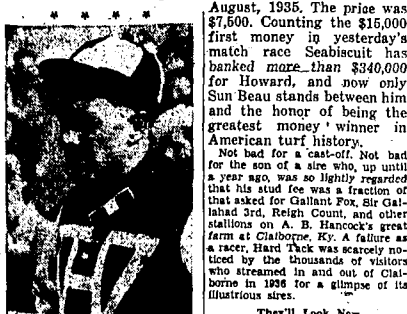

EDUCATOR RAPS TEACHING 'SLUR'

BERKELEY, Calif. (UP)—Dr. Robert Gordon Sprout, president of the University of California, has challenged the recent criticism of H. G. Wells, famous English author, on the present status of the teaching profession.

Wells' criticism was that one of the things that is wrong in the world today is that "two-thirds of teaching profession is damp and rotten inside."

Dr. Sprout in his public reply insisted that Wells' criticism might be much more applicable to England than it is to the United States.

"Mr. Wells," Dr. Sprout declared, "has drawn a caricature to illustrate his contention that educational systems and those persons administering them are not yet perfect. The value of a caricature is not determined by the accuracy of its delineations but by the pertinence of its exaggerations. The exaggerations in the present one are appropriate."

Might Apply in England

"I am inclined, however, to think that Wells' method of attack is more appropriate to England than it is to the United States.

"England is an old country. It has the reputation of making haste slow. Exaggeration is necessary to get it into action.

"The United States, on the contrary, is a relatively young country. It has not quite grown up. The pioneer idea that old houses and old land may be blithely abandoned if they have become two-thirds damp and rotten, because there is new material for a new house and new land to build upon just over the horizon. The tendency is to correct faults on the impulse of the moment, so before a critic whips the American public into action, he should be sure he has a firm hand on the reins.

"These things must be given consideration in studying what Wells has to say about education. We know that there must be further progress—and not in program and methods of education. Educators have seen to that.

"They have seen to it that there has been steady progress not only on the elementary level, but on all levels; not only in educational methods, but also in educational content, in educational personnel, and in all the infinite varieties of their tremendous social task.

"In short, Mr. Wells is not to be taken too seriously."

ODD ORDINANCES HANG OVER CITY

PORT WORTH, Tex. (UP)—It isn't a matter of civic pride, but Port Worth probably would have the highest average of offenders in Texas if all city ordinances were enforced.

Statutes still in effect, although many are outmoded, give the ordinary citizen at least one chance a week to break a law without penalty. Some provide heavy fines and imprisonment, although the courts and police pay no attention.

Throwing a cigarette end in a public place, street or sidewalk, makes a Port Worth citizen liable to a \$100 fine. The ordinance does not say how used cigarettes are to be destroyed.

Sunday theater-goers break an old "blue law" by leaving the projection-machine operators at work on the Sabbath. Fines for the violator or throwing at him is another punishable offense.

Automobiles parked more than 18 inches from the curb also are illegal. If anyone blows a horn, whistle or rings a bell loud enough to frighten a horse, another ordinance could be invoked.

Throwing dead horses in the river, keeping more than 50 pounds of dynamite in the home, breaking or racing a horse on the city streets, and getting drunk on horseback are other acts that could get the offender in trouble.

These violations don't include the state and federal laws.

Widening Job Set to Start On Route 30

Everything was in readiness today for the start Thursday morning of a project which will result in widening of the Old Oregon Trail through most of the length of Twin Falls county under terms of a WPA project approved last summer in Washington. Start of actual operations will be made as a crew of from 15 to 20 WPA workers reports for work at the western city limits of Twin Falls tomorrow morning. First work will be lengthening of culverts preparatory to actual widening work. Under specifications of the work, the road will be widened from 18 to 24 feet of actual driveway with six-foot crushed rock shoulders on each side. The project contemplates the widening of practically all of highway No. 30 across the county. 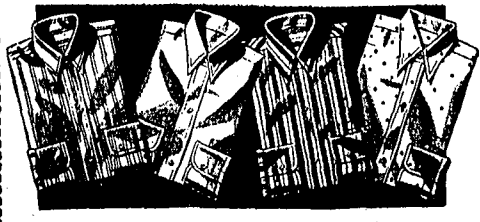
