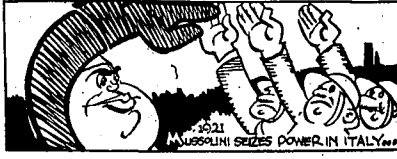

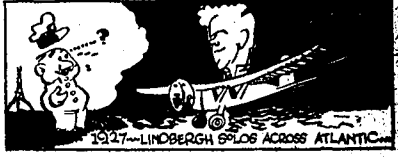

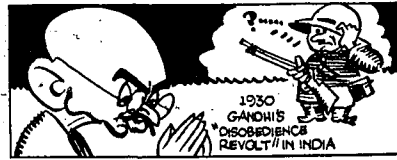

QUICK SHOW-DOWN EXPECTED IN RANKS OF NEW DEAL

MEETING MAY BE HELD TO SEE IF FDR WILL RE-RUN

 WASHINGTON, Nov. 11 (UP)—A showdown to determine the real winners of Tuesday's election was expected today to come quickly in a collision of New Deal forces with the augmented congressional conservative bloc.

Progressives and left wingers, with Mayor Fiorello H. La Guardia of New York in a dominant role, meet here next week to survey the wreckage and determine their course in the coming conservative-liberal struggle. They may also consider what attitude left wing liberals should take if President Roosevelt decides personally to recoup this week's losses by seeking a third term.

New Congress

With only three house contests still in doubt, the new 76th congress alignment will be as follows:

The New Deal-Democratic two-thirds majority has vanished in the house and among Democrats who wear the party tag are many who have bolted Mr. Roosevelt before and would be likely now to do so again. The generally conservative Democratic delegation from the south will have to be kept happy if Mr. Roosevelt is to obtain what he wants from the new congress.

There is a nominal two-thirds Democratic majority in the new senate. But the southern conservatives and anti-New Deal Democrats from other areas probably found new courage in Tuesday's returns. The showdown will come when issues compel Mr. Roosevelt either to compromise those congressional conservatives or drive them into open opposition. They have determined now that he shall not have a third term, nor even the nomination if conservative strategy can prevent it.

Tuesday's returns showing Sen. Bennett Clark, D., Mo., elected with a big vote in the only mid-western state which kept its Democratic moorings intact increase the possibility that conservative anti-New Deal Democrats will advance him to stop Roosevelt or any other 100 cent New Dealer in 1940, Vice President Garner is said to have considerable interest in Clark.

Will Clash Early
 Congressional conservatives and New Dealers will clash early on labor issues, taxation, spending and farm relief. The renomination of Donald Wakefield Smith as a member of the Federal Reserve board comes immediately before the senate. The American Federation of Labor opposes Smith's re-nomination with favoring the committee for industrial organization.

A conservative coalition aided by federal votes might defeat Smith after a contest which probably ultimately would lead to a showdown on amendment of the labor act to put employers on equal terms with employees.

FCC TO OPERATE UNDER NEW PLAN

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11 (UP)—The federal communications commission began operating today under a new plan which abolished two divisions within the agency and resulted in the dismissal of three officials.

Commissioner T. A. M. Craven immediately protested the action which was accomplished by a divided vote on the seven-man body. Chairman Frank R. McIninch described the plan as a move to eliminate duplication of work, speed procedure and place greater responsibility on individual commissioners.

He hinted that his work with the commission might be nearly completed with a statement that he was anxious to clean up details of the reorganization in order to return to his post with the federal power commission. President Roosevelt transferred him to the FCC two years ago to reorganize the department and quiet criticism of its work.

By a four to three vote, the FCC yesterday eliminated the examining division, which has conducted hearings and received evidence on applications for new radio stations, and placed its work under supervision of the general counsel. By a five to two vote it discarded the division of information (publicity department) and began a survey for working out more complete plans for dissemination of news and technical data.

Bandages Taken From Baby After Cornea Grafting

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 11 (UP)—Bandages were taken from the eyes of a three-year-old boy today and surgeons waited for time to tell whether a cornea transplantation had given him sight.

The boy was given an anesthetic before the dressings were changed and there was no way of learning immediately whether the operation had been successful. His name and that of the hospital and doctors were withheld, as has been the case in several recent cornea grafts.

Blind since birth, the boy had been given the tiny cornea discs from the eyes of John W. Deering, executed Utah kidnap-murderer, last week. A 27-year-old Los Angeles man was the other beneficiary of the murderer's eyes, and bandages were removed from his eyes earlier this week, with surgeons reporting the operation successful.

NATIONAL AUTO SHOW OPENS WITH 26 MAKES ON DISPLAY

New Cars Give More Comfort and Easier Driving for Buyers

NEW YORK, Nov. 11 (U.P.)—Motor car manufacturers, hinting that their new offerings are the "most car for the money" ever to roll off assembly lines, presented first public proof of their claims here today at the opening of the 39th National Automobile show.

Twenty-six or more exhibitors have several hundred passenger cars, commercial vehicles and chassis on display in Grand Central palace for the show's eight-day run. From slender, sleek hood to streamlined, or "tear-drop" rear, each car represents a greater margin of comfort, safety and driving ease than ever before.

The 1939 models, retailing an average of \$35 less than their counterparts of the boom days of 1929, bring the motorist more power, greater visibility and less driving strain. Manufacturers confidently expect that 1939 will be a great year in both production and sales and that the industry's new and better offerings may again lead the country back to recovery.

Improvements which might have waited another year have been installed as standard or optional equipment in the new cars. New interiors and exteriors trend more strongly to a combination of functionality with beauty.

Exteriors Appear Smoother

The new cars, generally, exhibit a tendency toward exteriors that are smooth and free from parts—door handles, hinges and the like—with protrusions. While streamlining shapes continue, there is a new tendency toward a narrowing of the hood, made possible by a lowering of the grille.

Headlamps are recessed in fenders more than in last year's models, and in this development, better road illumination is achieved by the wider spacing of the lamps. In some automobiles, tail lamps now are flush with the rear fenders, while others are mounted on body panels above the fenders.

Alligator Type

Sharply sloping body panels at the rear provide even roomier baggage and spare tire compartments. Engine hoods of the alligator type show a gain in favor, and many of the cars have wider dashboards. This combined with narrower front pillars makes for greater visibility—both front and sides—for the driver. V-shaped windshields, formerly popular, but several of the lines have discarded the divided rear window in the interests of visibility.

Running boards are getting narrower year by year. In the 1939 cars they either are less prominent than heretofore, or else omitted entirely. Some built-in running boards optional equipment.

Both Seats Wider

Most of the cars still sporting running boards have them partly hidden by overlapping doors which now provide greater interior width. Today's automobile body provides plenty of space for the seating of three passengers in both front and rear.

Many models are painted with the new synthetic finishes which are exceedingly hard and more enduring. These are expected to replace the less durable finishes entirely as soon as the necessary "baking" equipment can be installed in factories.

Chassis likewise have undergone improvements, the most notable being the elimination by many manufacturers of the "wobble action" gear shift lever rising from the center of the floor board. Shift levers now are mounted on the steering wheel shaft and are designed to be easily accessible to the driver's right hand. Lost in a Cave—An Armistice Day Thought

Today let us roll back the years to the waiting car. They had come through the French lines near La Campelle the night before . . . not knowing their destination . . . secretly transferred in closed autos and railway cars to the forest rendezvous where Foch waited.

There they heard Foch's terms after he had compelled them to make first overtures for an armistice . . . humiliating terms that left no doubt as to the victor.

In those four days frightening things happened . . . Germany in revolution . . . the Kaiser fled . . . Bohemians attacking the Fatterland. There is no longer any question of being in going on in the lighted car. Only one thing can happen.

On opposite sides of a plain table . . . in the regular dining car seats, two rows of men sit. On one side, Foch, opposite him the German Gen. Detain von Winterfeldt . . . French Gen. Weyssac, and across from him Matthias Erzberger, German plenipotentiary . . . two British admirals in sober blue, two more German uniforms, one more German in civilian dress . . . a military interpreter in French blue.

Death Has Deadline

It is 8 o'clock now. Wint can be said to have been told. A draft of the Armistice terms lies on the table . . . in bold script the Frenchman signs simply "F. Foch." Weyssac, the British admiral, then the trembling Erzberger, sign beneath. Ockendortf, Winterfeldt, von Bolow, the names follow. Erzberger, choked with emotion, rises and reads a formal protest against the terms. Foch rises. It is over. By 7 o'clock his train is on the way to Paris.

"At 11 o'clock, as specified in the paper with the six signatures, a sudden and unannounced silence falls across the front. The war is over.

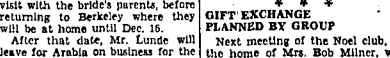

British Protest Nazi Treatment of Jewish Subjects

NEWSPAPERS HIT GERMAN REGIME FOR TERRORISM

By WALLACE CARROLL
LONDON, Nov. 11 (AP)—Great Britain has made representations to Germany to safeguard rights and property of British Jews, it was learned today.
The representations were made at Berlin yesterday as soon as the government learned that the outbreak of Sir George Ogilvie-Forbes, British charge d'affaires, discussed the situation of British Jews.
It was reported that a number of British Jews had been arrested outside the British embassy in Berlin. Official quarters had no information regarding the report.
The horror expressed by British people at the anti-Jewish outbreak was expected to be reflected in a statement by Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain in his effort to placate Adolf Hitler and insure British-German co-operation.

During the Armistice service at Westminster Abbey this morning, the dean, the Rt. Rev. P. F. D. De Lathiere, said:
"Let us remember in silence and sympathy the Jewish people in their trouble."
The congregation rose and stood silent.

Newspapers vigorously denounced the outbreak.
The Daily Telegraph, regarded as the unofficial mouthpiece of the Foreign office, said of the German riot:
"Germany has delivered herself over to a reign of savagery which will send a thrill of horror throughout the civilized world. . . . The pogroms have every mark of an official organization and official condonation. . . . The Nazi regime is one of the most terrible things of the present century."
The Daily Express said:
"The riots merely coincided with a cooling of relations between Great Britain and Germany which already was seriously hampering Chamberlain."
With newspapers and public angry, denouncing the German outbreak and commenting on Italy's internal feuds of anti-Jewish activity, Chamberlain was faced with new opposition to his policy of "playing cricket" with the dictator.

But before the outbreak Adolf Hitler had made three speeches attacking prominent British public men: Chamberlain had begun to speak in London and was trying to tell Britons who should lead them.
Diplomats mystified.
Diplomatic quarters were somewhat puzzled at the speeches for Hitler had never before given public advice from Berlin, it is said that Hitler was further west in Berlin, instead of Berlin, when the Chamberlain's address in the Chamberlain's office.

Diplomats believe that Hitler's anger really is directed against the British, many mobilized during the Czechoslovak crisis, and was rekindled after the Munich agreement by frank criticism of him by some British leaders.

Vatican prelates regarded the decrees as a direct violation of article 34 of the Lateran treaty, under which Italy recognizes as legal all marriages celebrated by religious authority, it was expected the Vatican would protest the article.
