



# CIO MAPS DRIVE FOR UNIONIZATION OF MASS PRODUCTION

## CHARTERS WILL BE ISSUED FOR START OF WORK

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Nov. 19 (Special)—Leaders of the Congress of Industrial Organizations prepared today to carry out the mandate of the first convention and initiate immediately an "unremitting" drive to unionize all mass production workers.

Two new international charters will be issued immediately. John L. Lewis, president, said. The 43-man executive board created before the convention adjourned yesterday, he said, had agreed to charter the Plaything and Novelty Workers' union and the fishermen and allied workers.

The campaign to organize workers of the Ford Motor company in Detroit, it was learned, the convention voted to boycott Ford products unless the company bargains collectively with the United Automobile Workers of America.

Little Steel Drive identified membership drive will be conducted in "little steel" and in the cement, rubber, glass, packing, furniture and textile industries.

119 delegates representing a claimed membership of 3,787,000 imposed per capita levies which will amount to about \$2,000,000 to finance the program. They went on record in opposition to any peace with the American Federation of Labor, which embraced the sacrifice of the fundamental principles of industrial unionism.

The convention adhered to a plea from President Roosevelt that the door to peace be left open, an appeal which he also made in the first CIO convention in Houston, but it voted to "drive forward with every means at its command" toward unionization of the unorganized, and to "unremitting campaign throughout every industry and in every corner of the land."

The A.F.L. in anticipation of further conflict with the CIO voted at Houston to continue an "unremitting" drive for 12 months and to "drive forward with every means at its command" toward unionization of the unorganized, and to "unremitting campaign throughout every industry and in every corner of the land."

The CIO called for a broad program of social and economic policies. Its objectives include: A 40-50,000,000 federal housing program; a two-year public works program; a program of social insurance; repeal of "repressive" labor legislation; anti strike-breaking legislation; condemnation of the postal strike; a federal program to aid youth and opposition to the current state of the work progress administration.

## BORAH OPPOSES CHANGE IN LAW

The state department for a quick solution was disposition of German refugees—a problem that Mr. Roosevelt described at his press conference yesterday as most serious.

**Contrary to Spirit of Law**  
The only specific plan announced by Mr. Borah is to restrict temporary visas on which between 12,000 and 18,000 Germans and Austrians now are residing in this country. He said he was backed as strongly to the spirit of the law.

**Expressed Doubt**  
Borah expressed doubt that such visas could be extended indefinitely. "It is my understanding," he said, "that there is a limit to the number of visas that can be issued in the spirit of the law that visitors' permits are granted for temporary purposes. If they were made permanent it would violate the spirit of the law."

**Mr. Roosevelt said** that it was his understanding that at the end of the month a certain number of visas again could be extended, and so on. He reminded correspondents that all the 12,000 or 18,000 visas were not necessary. He said that many of those here on visas had been engaged in teaching in schools and colleges.

An Important Conference. It is becoming more and more obvious that the Pan-American conference which is to open in Peru next month presents New World democracy with a great opportunity.

While it is true that democracy as we understand it is not a very robust growth below the equator, it is also true that something fundamental to the New World way of life is being threatened from Europe.

The European dictatorships are not simply one man tyrannies. They call for a regimentation of social and economic life such as no New World tyrant ever dreamed of.

That is not primarily a military problem. It calls for little in the way of conferences between military and naval authorities. If the statesmen can find ways to keep the channels of New World trade clear, if they can formulate some program by which the New World nations can, through the interchanges of goods, services and ideas, maintain and improve their economic levels and move forward toward a freer and richer life—then there will be much less reason to be afraid of developments in Europe.

The dictator states may coerce a single nation; they cannot coerce half the world. In the Americas opportunity still exists. If the Americas stand together, they can make of their half of the world a thriving, unregimented trade area which totalitarian economics cannot affect.

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HISTORY Of Twin Falls City & County. As Gleaned from Files of The Times.

15 YEARS AGO. NOV. 19, 1923. The celebration notwithstanding the fact that the celebration of the 15th anniversary of the city of Twin Falls, Idaho, is being observed during the past few days.
