CATHOLICS STRAIN RELATIONS WITH NAZI LEADERS

Bishop Attacks Try To Remove Children From Church School

BERLIN, Nov. 21 (U.P.)—Relations between Nazi Germany and the Catholic church were subjected to a new strain today as the government began independent efforts to find homes for German Jews abroad.

The letter was read from pulpits in all churches of his diocese. It protested against action seeking to induce Catholic parents to send their children to non-confessional instead of confessional schools.

The parents were reminded by Bishop Freysing of their right under the concordat with the Vatican, to insist that their children receive education in Catholic schools.

Reminded of Responsibility It exhorted them not to give up their claims and reminded them of their responsibility for their children's education.

From a well-informed private source it was learned that Germany had been negotiating with several Central and South American countries for admission of large numbers of German Jews.

SECOND MISHAP HITS GERMAN SHIP ANCHORED AT OAKLAND

2 CARGO BOOMS BREAK, ONE MAN KILLED BY FALL

OAKLAND, Calif., Nov. 21.—The second mishap aboard a German vessel here this month claimed today one life and started another investigation.

Two heavy cargo booms broke their steel cables and crashed upon the deck of the North German Lloyd motorship Waser. They tore loose within 45 minutes of each other. The first killed Nick Pesha, a longshoreman.

Federal and state investigators rushed aboard from the Naval station, Oakland, and to a dock nearby.

After a few moments the investigators, led by Nat Peiper, federal bureau of investigation chief at San Francisco, and assistant district attorney Frank Coakley of Alameda county, concluded that no sabotage was involved.

As they left the Waser, the longshoremen camped out on the ship's deck again were started to move the cargo. There was a sudden cry of warning and three longshoremen jumped to safety as the second boom smashed upon the deck.

Captain Vohsig said he was convinced the boom fell accidentally. Peiper held the same opinion. Investigation was referred to the state bureau of industrial accidents.

Immediate concern over the Waser incidents followed official conclusion that a time bomb had been fixed outside the Vancouver hull before it left here for San Francisco on a voyage to Bremen. The Vancouver was beached in the estuary, later refloated and returned to dry dock.

Peiper and other officials were taking pictures of the ship in an effort to obtain a clue.

Chief Justice of the district court's office said they would continue their inquiry on the Vancouver. He said the investigators had no further interest in the Waser.

AUTOIST HURT BY CAR-TRUCK CRASH

Injured when his motor car and a truck smashed together at the Andy Newman corner about seven miles south of Shoshone, J. C. Gooding-Wendell section, was in "fair" condition this afternoon at the Wendell hospital, according to word received here today by Dr. Robert J. W. Robertson, Twin Falls.

Wendell hospital attaches reported that the injured man suffered no lacerations on his face and hands but that his condition is not critical.

One of the men, who was unskilled here, sustained a possibly broken nose but did not require hospital treatment. # CZECHOSLOVAKIA BORDER CLASHES THREATEN PEACE

## FRONTIER GUARDS REPUULSE POLISH, HUNGARY THRUST

**VIENNA, Nov. 21 (AP)**—The danger of armed conflict over Czechoslovakia's eastern frontier, involving Hungary and Poland and possibly Germany and Italy, increased today as new incidents occurred.

It was officially announced in Prague that Czech frontier guards had repulsed a band of Polish irregulars who crossed the frontier into the Czech province of Ruthenia. One Pole was killed.

Both Poland and Hungary were reported to be prepared to march into Ruthenia and eastern Slovakia at a moment's notice. Both nations have been reinforcing frontier troops.

It was said that they were ready to take advantage of any serious frontier incident for "police action" to preserve peace.

**Both Disappointed**

Both had been disappointed by their failure to obtain from the Vienna conference which settled Czech-Hungarian territorial disputes enough Czech territory to give them a common border.

Observers believed that if the situation grew dangerous, Adolf Hitler might take a strong hand. Italy and Germany were Vienna arbiters and rejected Hungary's full claim.

Occupation of eastern Czechoslovakia by Hungary or Poland or both would constitute a loss of prestige to Italy. For Germany it would be a loss of prestige and would also threaten to close the road to the Black sea. At the same time it would interfere with Germany's economic program in Slovakia and Ruthenia, as well as in Bohemia and Moravia, the other Czechoslovakian provinces.

**"Attack on Peace"**

Hitler's newspaper, the Vienna Voelkischer Beobachter, reflected the acuteness of the situation in an editorial which warned that any opposition to the Vienna verdict "can become an attack on peace."

Frequent clashes were reported in the region of Pelepetak and a growing "uprising" was reported in the mountainous regions further west in Ruthenia.

The reports said three incidents had occurred in which groups of Hungarian irregulars crossed the Ruthenian frontier and clashed with Czech defense troops including gendarmes, police and customs guards.

Four Hungarians were reported to have been killed and several were taken prisoner. The Hungarians were forced to withdraw, the reports said.

**Six Killed**

At Prague, the government said that at least six persons had been killed in border clashes with Polish and Hungarian "terrorists." But the government denied that there had been an uprising in Ruthenia.

Reports from Budapest and Prague conflicted sharply.

Prague reported that a major clash had occurred near Volec and attributed the incident to Hungarian invaders. They said four Hungarians had been killed by Czech frontier guards. Another clash was reported near Poljana.

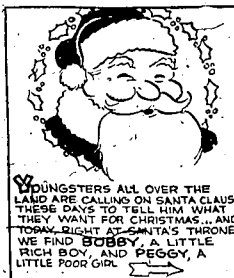
**Local Man Elected By Honey Producers**

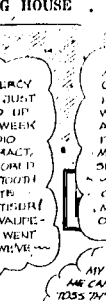

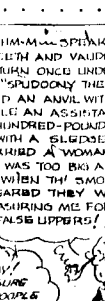

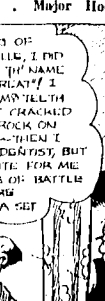

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# Norway Mourns Death of Queen

## Heart Attack Ends Life of Aged Woman

LONDON, Nov. 21 (AP)—Great Britain and Norway joined today in mourning Norway's Queen Maud, who died of a heart attack yesterday in a private clinic here.

She was the "little queen," last surviving child of Edward VII and Queen Alexandra of Britain.

Her husband, King Haakon VII, had been almost constantly at her bedside since she underwent an abdominal operation Wednesday.

King George VI, in reply, ordered the British court to observe mourning for four weeks, ending Dec. 16.

**Tomboy of Court**

For a half-century Queen Maud was the tomboy of the British royal family. Her father nicknamed her "Harry" because of her vivacity.

Both Queen Alexandra of Britain and Princess Louise of Denmark opposed the love match of Haakon, the Prince Charles of Denmark, and Maud.

Princess Louise wanted Charles married to Queen Wilhelmina of the Netherlands. Queen Alexandra opposed it because of the close relationship.

Married in 1896

But they were married July 22, 1896. In 1906 when Norway broke from Sweden, Charles was the second son of the crown prince, was called to occupy the new throne. He adopted the name of Haakon.

Although they were foreign born and at first resented by many Norwegians, their tact and democracy soon won over the majority of the country.

Queen Maud would have been 60 Nov. 21.

## Mercury Dips Down to New Low for Fall
