HUNGARY ORDERS EXPULSION OF CZECHS FROM NEW AREA

SLOVAKS RETORT BY CONFISCATING ENEMY PROPERTY

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, Nov. 22.—Hungary ordered the expulsion of Czechoslovakia today from the territory she occupied after the dismemberment of Czechoslovakia. The Slovakian government retorted by ordering confiscation of Hungarian property within its borders. The Czechoslovaks to be expelled are those who settled since 1918 in the territory now regained by Hungary. The two moves added to the strain on the borders between the two countries caused by charges here that Budapest has fomented terrorism in Ruthenia.

Announcement of Hungary's intention and of retaliatory action by the autonomous state of Slovakia, added to the danger of a new explosion in central Europe.

The territory involved, a long strip along the southern edge of Slovakia and Ruthenia, was turned over to Budapest by the Axis. Greece, Italy, which mediated the dispute. To Aid Relief The Slovakian government, in retaliation, ordered confiscation of property of all Hungarian residents of Slovakia, to be compensated for at the discretion of the Slovak government. The proceeds would be applied to relief of those summarily expelled without compensation by Hungary. The announcement said Slovakia, which recently has been reported adopting the Nazi anti-Semitic program, announced that it would accept many Jews into the territory, expelled immediately after the mediation decision.

CRASH VICTIM'S STATUS BETTER
After receiving two blood transfusions last night, J. C. Robertson, resident of the Gooding region, was "much better" today, relatives in Twin Falls said. He was injured in a car-truck smash Saturday evening at the Anshy Newman corner south of Shoshone. He is now in the Wendell hospital.

X-ray pictures showed today that in addition to serious cuts and contusions about the face and hands, Mr. Robertson also sustained five cracked ribs and a punctured kidney, according to Mrs. J. W. Robertson, his sister-in-law. One of the spokes from the steering wheel pierced his face beneath the chin and went through the jaw at least two inches toward the eye. GERMANY, ITALY SEND AID TO REBELS, LOYALS CLAIM

TROOPS, PLANES AND MUNITIONS GO TO NATIONALS

HEMDETS, French-Spanish Frontiers, Nov. 22 (AP)—Germany and Italy were sending troops, planes, guns and ammunition into insurgent Spain while Italy was withdrawing 10,000 German volunteers, the Loyalist government charged today.

A high officer in the ministry of defense asserted the Italian and German ships transported the men and war equipment and that some of the planes were flown direct from Germany and Italy to Palma, Majorca, nationalist base in the Mediterranean. He said the government's information was based on names of the transport ships and the ports of operation.

"Scores of planes and artillery, hundreds of cannons, thousands of tons of war material and more troops were given Franco by Germany and Italy simultaneously with the withdrawal of 10,000 German and worn out," the officer said.

Germany, he said, sent the nationalist 74 cannons and bombers, more than 1,000 tons of war material, 12,000 rifles and 46 cannon between Sept. 15 and Oct. 15. Italy brought 190 tons of shells and 49 cannons and bombers, 6,000 tons of equipment, 300 airplanes and 5,000 troops during the same period.

"The nationalists," meanwhile, claimed that a new counter-attack had resulted in their crossing to the banks of the Segura river at Alcor, where the loyalists had made a forced crossing a week ago.

RETIREMENT ACT SPLITS TEACHERS

Lineup of rural teachers and those in independent districts was evident today as opposite sides of the teachers' retirement plan "fence" after announcement of votes by members of the Twin Falls common school union instructors and the Twin Falls branch of the I. E. A.

An energetic "no" vote was recorded by the rural teachers at their association meeting here Saturday. Officials of the organization announced today. The vote was "almost unanimous."

City Group Approves—Twin Falls city teachers, however, were on record unanimously Monday afternoon in favor of the proposed retirement plan and the payments it envisioned.

The plan will come up for vigorous discussion at the I. E. A. delegates assembly in Boise this weekend. If approved there, it will be submitted by the I. E. A. to the state legislature since Idaho is one of the few states which do not have a pension plan for its teachers.

Approval of the county association was based on the method of determining the retirement payments and not on the salary reduction, according to Mrs. Isabelle Miller, Allendale, president of the group. The rural teachers favor a retirement plan but felt that the method as now proposed by the I. E. A. "would not be suitable to the hundreds of rural teachers because of the fact that it uses the salary paid the teacher as the basis for determining the payments after retirement."

Pay Less—Discussion at the meeting Saturday pointed out that rural districts necessarily pay their teachers less than more populous areas. The lower salary scale, it was felt, would hand a handicap on rural teachers after retirement since they would receive less. The I. E. A. program calls for equal contributions by the state and by the teacher.

Members of the city teachers' group here indicated they felt that voting power of independent districts' delegates at the assembly is not equal to carry the retirement plan to approval.

embassy, denied the report, however, saying "there is nothing to it."

Sheriff Adolf Hiller received a minute by minute report of the debate in common at his retreat in London, he said, and it was reported that it was understood that a final decision was to be taken today after high German officials had made a complete study of the debate and of Chamberlain's statement.

Recall for "Report"—Von Dirksen's recall, if it occurs, would be described as for the purpose of reporting to authorities similar to the reason given the recall of Hans Heinrich Dieckhoff from Washington and the recall of American Ambassador Hugh Wilson from Berlin.

The Daily Express said Capt. Fritz Wjedmann, Hiller's personal adjutant, might be sent to London to obtain a personal report on British public opinion regarding the Jewish situation.

Sir Neville Henderson, British ambassador to Germany, is now in London undergoing medical treatment. Observers pointed out that the government could retain him here without embarrassment should Von Dirksen be recalled.

It was considered unlikely, in view of the outbreak of the Nazi press, that Chamberlain would obtain German cooperation for his plan, even if von Dirksen was not recalled.

Seeks 5,500,000 acres—The prime minister had held out hopes that some 6,000,000 acres of land could be made available for the settlement of Jews, provided private contributions of more than \$100,000,000 were made.

He laid particular stress on his "quarantine" language, where possible 50,000 acres could be set aside. In addition he foresaw the possibility of nearly 10,000 square miles in British Guiana for refugee settlement.

Chamberlain did not intervene in the debate in common which followed his statement. The debate was on a Laborite motion which deplored "the treatment of Jews in Germany and welcoming some concerted efforts by nations, including the United States, to secure a common policy."

The debate on the motion, which was approved without division, was notable because not a single voice was raised in opposition.

"Seven voting representatives from the Twin Falls unit will attend the assembly Friday and Saturday. The delegates received instructions yesterday afternoon at a meeting at which the local group voted its stand on major legislative proposals coming up at the Boise conference.

These are Delegates: Delegates are Helen Butler, Bickel; Mildred Bowles, Washington; Lois Showell, Lincoln; Austin Wallace, and Harry E. Smith, junior high, and James U. Tomlin and Mr. Platt, senior high. Several of the delegates who may be unable to make the trip will send proxies.

Action taken yesterday to guide the Twin Falls delegation included: Approval of the proposed new school equalization law to provide an even distribution of money in Idaho "per pupil per teacher."

Approval of the proposed new certification of teachers in Idaho more difficult for outsiders, and would keep such out-of-state instructors from coming in, teaching in Idaho for a time, and then using that Idaho work as a stepping-stone to better paid jobs elsewhere. It also requires certification for superintendents, principals, and supervisors. High school teachers' certification would remain the same for four years of college work; elementary would also remain as now set up.

Approve Retirement Law—Approval of the proposed teachers' retirement law and recommended adoption of the "Maryland" plan. That method provides retirement payments on an actual four year basis and the teacher contributing equally.

These proposals—Is to be submitted to the legislature if the I. E. A. assembly approves them—will have highlights of the discussion at Boise.

New Fields Provide Bright Future, Says Auto Research Head

"NEW YORK, Nov. 22 (Special)—"We have a wonderful future ahead of us in any line of business today if we will just get the most out of what we know so little about, anything."

This was the keynote of the address of Charles F. Kettering, vice-president of General Motors in charge of research, at a luncheon in the Waldorf-Astoria Starlight roof.

The luncheon, given by Alfred P. Sloan, Jr., chairman of General Motors, centered on the theme of "The Motor Car in the World of Tomorrow." It was attended by approximately 400 industrial leaders, editors, publishers and civic leaders.

"We are just learning about steel," stated Mr. Kettering. "We are just learning about rubber, we are just learning about oil, and the reason I have taken a little time on the subject of a growing plant is that that is the place where the sun contains the energy, and some of the energies stay and we need to know how it is done. But it is all before us."

Mr. Kettering stressed our lack of knowledge by pointing out that we do not yet know how the leaf of a plant obtains its energy from the sun.

Stephan and Blandford are counsel for the plaintiffs.

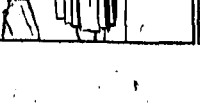
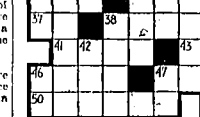
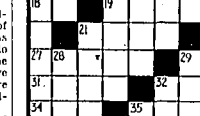
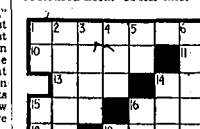

FACTS OF FATAL CRASH REVEALED

J. H. Umbaugh, former Twin Falls jewelry store owner, died almost instantly, and his daughter, Willis, aged 19, lived for about 15 minutes after their car was struck by a Union Pacific train Thursday morning, Nov. 10, at Las Vegas, Nev., according to newspaper accounts of the fatal accident received by friends here.

Tom Bellis, state safety officer, who investigated the tragedy, expressed the theory that Umbaugh, who was taking his daughter to school from their ranch home, knowing the schedule of the trains and figuring that there would be no train along at that time of the morning, drove up onto the tracks without looking, and moved directly into the path of the engine, No. 8, which was two hours late.

According to the account of the train-auto collision appearing in the Las Vegas Evening Review of the journal, "the machine was struck on the right at the end of the engine where it was riding. It was almost completely demolished."

"Umbaugh, who was driving the car at the time of the accident, was behind the wheel and Willis was in the wreckage, thrown on top of her father when the first arrivals came to the rescue."

The stewardess on the train was called immediately and determined that Umbaugh was dead, and she rendered what aid she could for the injured girl, but her body was so badly broken by the force of the impact, that the child died before other medical aid could be given her," the news account continued.

"Umbaugh was a prominent Las Vegas business man. He came to Las Vegas in 1931, and opened the Umbaugh jewelry store. He purchased and developed a large tract of land near where he made his home with his wife and young daughter."
