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# FRANCE FACES STRIKE BY MILLIONS OF WORKERS

## DALADIER GIVEN CONFIDENCE VOTE BY 20-18 MARGIN

 PARIS, Nov. 23 (Special)—France faced a general strike involving millions of workers today.

An immediate crisis had been averted because Premier Edouard Daladier threatened to cancel the Chamberlain of Great Britain and call on parliament for a vote of confidence unless the French commission of the chamber approved his drastic financial decrees. By a vote of 20 to 18 the commission rejected a socialist demand for a vote against the decrees. Five members did not vote.

Millions of workers awaited a meeting Friday of the administrative council of the Federation of Labor which already has been empowered to set a date for a general strike. The council will organize a nationwide demonstration Saturday against the decrees which sharply increase the taxes and hours of workers.

The national committee of the federation voted for the general strike but left the date and details up to the council.

**May Tie Hands**

By his threat to put on the finance commission the onus for a rebuff to Britain, France's most valued ally, Daladier saved himself from an adverse vote but the narrowest victory may be in his hands during Chamberlain's visit. Chamberlain accompanied by his foreign minister, Lord Halifax, arrives today for a state visit.

It also indicated that a crisis was approaching rapidly in which the government would be obliged to call parliament and pose the question of confidence.

Daladier was reported to have made furious by the severe criticism of Socialists, Communists and left Republicans. He spoke for three hours before the commission.

"If this motion of defiance is voted by the commission or if the latter refuses to undertake first to study the budget, then my position is taken."

**New Labor Trouble**

"I would like to see Chamberlain and Halifax to adjourn their visit. Moreover I would convolve the senate and chamber to pronounce on the financial policy of the government."

While he spoke new labor troubles were developing. At Valenciennes 17,000 metallurgical workers went on strike and occupied the plant. Mobile guards immediately began to evict the workers at the orders of the government. A strike was in progress in the coal factories at Lens.

Joseph Dunninger, chairman of the council, said he had seen Mrs. Timmer lift metal objects, such as spoons and silver coins and levitate tables with her "magnetic impulse" hand and also make a piano bob out a number by itself. He was not "prepared" to say she has supernatural "power." The council will decide.

Mrs. Timmer and Alice both want the \$10,000 which the council offers to any medium who can produce "supernatural" effects. Chairman Dunninger cannot duplicate by sleight of hand.

Here's the first prize recipe submitted by the Dietrich ranch wife: Shredded Eggs in Souffle Ham Needs (Makes six servings) 3 cups ham, cooked and ground. 1 1/2 cups bread crumbs. 1/2 cup milk. 3 tablespoons flour. 1/2 teaspoon salt. Few grains pepper. 1 1/2 cups milk. 9 eggs.

Combine ham and bread crumbs. Melt butter, add flour, salt and pepper, mix until smooth. Gradually add milk, stirring constantly, and cook until thick and smooth; add 3 eggs yolks, mix well. Combine with ham; cool. Fold in 3 stiffly beaten egg whites; fill individual casseroles or shirred egg dishes with ham mixture, making depression in center; pour uncooked egg into each.

Place in moderate oven 350 degrees F. for about 20 minutes or until eggs are set as desired, and serve immediately. For a Lenten dish, use fish finely flaked, instead of ham.

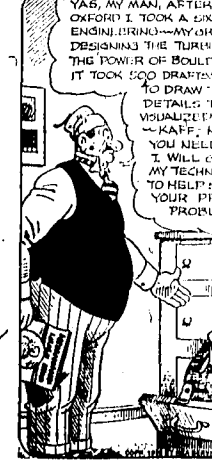

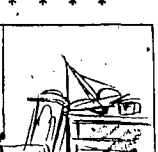

# Hoover Raps Anti-Jew Campaigns

## Rearmament Of Morals is Termed Need

TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 23 (UP)—Only a moral reararmament can save the world from disaster, Herbert Hoover, former President of the United States, told Canadians last night in an address at the annual banquet of the York Bible club.

Intolerant ideologies, he said, "have joined the four horsemen of war, famine, pestilence and death, to hold the world taut with fear."

"The anti-Semitic campaign in Germany," he said, "is the most hideous since the expulsions from Spain in the middle ages, and the Nazi ideology of economic security behind it is concerned with sanctifying personal power."

**Attacks Soviet Policy**

He said Russia was executing political trials upon the thousands, "and worse, the world is now learning the truth that the Russian government in its attempt to force state industrialization, pitilessly left millions of its own people to die of starvation when that government had sold with which to have bought them food."

"A militant autocracy in control of Japan is making a war of aggression upon China as horrible as that of Genghis Khan. For imperialistic trade purposes, the lives of millions of innocent people already have been sacrificed."

**But World Gains**

"A bitter class war in Spain ruthlessly executed civilians on both sides. Again, thousands of women and children have been bombed to death for no military purpose but to create terror."

He said the world has gained from this terrorism, however, "because popular opinions for war no longer weigh the common people."

Referring to the Munich pact, he said that "without entering into the merits of it, I am one of those who believe that it has still contributed to the peace of the world."
