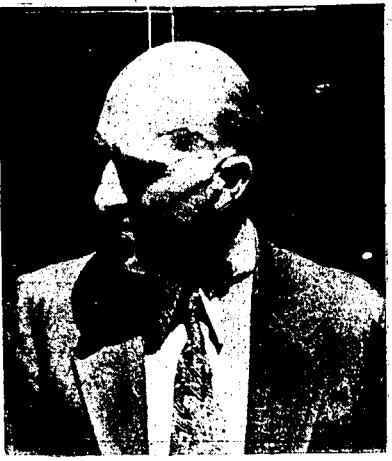

Jury Recommends Life Sentence for Dr. Berry
OLYMPIA, Wash., Nov. 28 (AP)—An assault on the legality of the state of Washington's stringent "little Lindbergh" kidnap law was forestalled today in an attempt to keep Dr. Kent W. Berry and three confederates from serving life imprisonment for Olympia's kidnap-torture case.

Under the state kidnap law, passed after the nationwide agitation over the kidnapping of the Lindbergh child, a verdict of guilty allowed only two possible sentences. One was death, which the jury turned down with a recommendation that the second-life imprisonment be imposed.

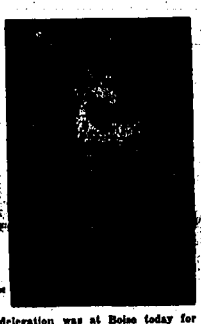

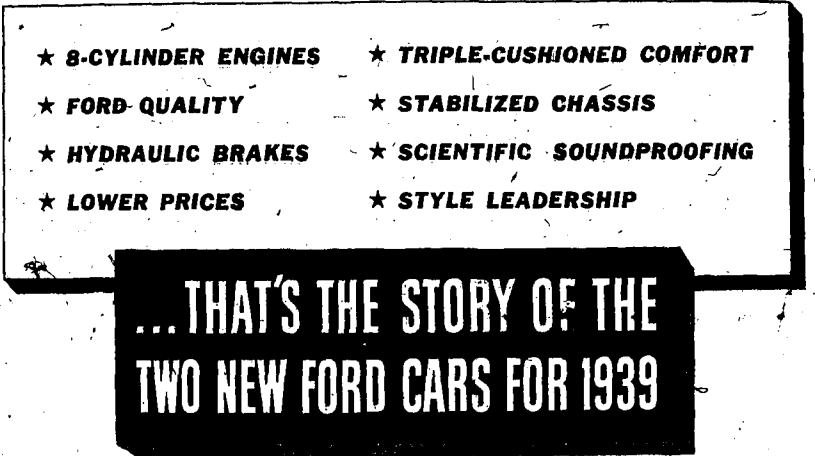

JAPAN SEEKS MUNITIONS FOR DOUBLE WAR PROTECTION

NIPPONESE FEAR POSSIBILITIES OF RUSSIAN BATTLE

TOKYO, Nov. 28 (UP)—Japan must have sufficient munitions on hand to fight, if necessary, two wars simultaneously against Russia and China, munitions makers were told by the war office today.

Gen. Genjiro Hasegawa, war minister, told the manufacturers at a conference that it was necessary to increase the munitions output immediately.

"The army must answer for national confidence and set the imperial mind at ease by achieving the mission imposed on it," Gen. Hasegawa said.

For Two Wars
Viscount Akira Toki, vice minister of the army, said it was necessary that Japan possess munitions for two wars simultaneously. He added that the army demanded that the government enforce the existing national mobilization law, under which war-time production has been speeded up.

The foreign policies of Great Britain, France and Russia, which it is necessary that Japan increase munitions production, Toki accused Britain of helping Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek.

Raps Britain
The occasional gestures of friendship toward Japan by the British government should be interpreted as a policy of protecting rights and interests in China and mean nothing regarding a real introp of co-operation with Japan," he said.

France, he continued, was simply riding on British coat of arms, and the United States was not willing to recognize a new situation but adhered to old treaties.

COLD SPELL TO BREAK IN EAST

(By United Press)
The winter's first severe cold spell, which since Thanksgiving has extended over the eastern half of the United States, will be broken by the middle of the week, government weather observers predicted today.

Freezing temperatures prevailed generally from the Rockies to the Florida peninsula.

Record-Breaking Snows
Most of the northeastern states were digging out from under record-breaking snowfalls which ranged from 10 to 22 inches in New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and New England. A second snowfall over the week-end found many highways still heavily drifted from last Thursday night's fall.

An abrupt drop in temperatures accompanied the second storm and brought the death toll in the east, southeast and middle west well above 100. New England reported 23 deaths since Thanksgiving, eastern Pennsylvania 25, and the New York metropolitan area 23. Upstate New York and New Jersey were the other major sufferers.

No Snow in Rockies
The Rocky mountain states reported no snow in 24 hours, temperatures above zero, clear skies and prospects of warmer weather.

In the midwest, temperatures were as low as 10 in some suburban areas of Chicago. Weather forecasters predicted record low temperatures for the season in the southern states.

Fertilizer Boosts Beet Yield, Experiment Finds

Value of commercial fertilizer in increasing the yields of sugar beets and other crops familiar to this district was shown here this afternoon as J. V. Briggs, Smith-Hughes instructor at the local high school, announced results of production on the 1.55 acre plot owned by the school and located north of Harmon park.

These statistics, according to Briggs, will be used in the adult evening school instruction classes this winter, the first starting Friday, Dec. 2. All farmers of the district are invited to attend. Round table discussions will feature on all problems. The meetings will be held in the Smith-Hughes room at the high school.

Eight Plots
In announcing results of the experiments on the school plot the instructor pointed out that the area was broken up into eight plots of 12 rows each. Area of these plots ran from one-sixth to one-seventh of an acre. All plots were treated with manure and in addition specific plots were treated as follows: (1) nitrogen (2) phosphorus and nitrogen combined (3) nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium combined. Check plots were located between the plots listed.

In 1937 the area was planted to sugar beets being manured with 12 tons to the acre and 125 pounds of purple super phosphate. In 1938 (this season) manure was again used at

calculated 20,140 tons per acre, a tabulation shows.

In addition to this project, class members are also engaged in other activities, principal of which is animal feeding including care of 56 feeder pigs, 10 feeder steers and a carload of lambs.

Viewed in that light, the question whether the agreement is the best that could be obtained is relatively unimportant. It may need a good deal of revision; some of its clauses may work rather badly; it may take months or years to get it into final shape.

**HAWKS IN IDAHO
TOPIC OF STUDY**

MOSCOW, Nov. 28 (Special)—Three divisions of the University of Idaho, forestry, zoology, and extension, are cooperating in a practical study of Idaho hawks in an effort to determine their proper relationship to agriculture and game conservation.

Dale Arvey, trained ornithologist in the zoology department, will carry on this investigation over a two-year period. To obtain necessary specimens for him, arrangements have been made whereby county agents will ship to Moscow all native hawks and owls who enter to them by farmers and sportsmen.

Results in Bulletin
Stomachs of all birds so received will be examined carefully, and the contents of their intestines, skins and skulls will be added to the university collection of birds and mammals. Final results of the study will be issued in bulletin form.

Sponsors of the study hope that sportsmen and farmers throughout the state will respond to their appeal for specimens. To that end, tags and letters explaining the project have been sent to all county agents, sportsmen's organizations, forest rangers and supervisors and biological survey men in the state.

To County Agents
Birds should be unopened and turned over to the nearest county agent as soon as possible after shooting. Information tags, which must be filled in to make any specimen of value, may be obtained from county agents or by writing to the

Wherever hawks and owls have been studied, it has been found that the majority of species are highly beneficial. Dr. A. B. Hatch, assistant professor in charge of game management, explained in the letter accompanying the study tags, why the food contents of rodents, and rodents have increased enormously in Idaho with the changes in native vegetation brought about by cultivation and grazing.

"Accusing and shooting all hawks as chicken thieves is as sensible as shooting all men who wear blue overalls because one man so clad was convicted of thievery," Dr. Hatch said.

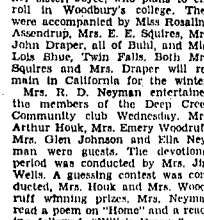

NATIONAL PRAISE FOR SNAKE CANYON

Editor, Evening Times:
Few people have seen the deeper beauties of the Snake river canyon but most Pacific Northwest residents have learned by this time that it is the deepest chasm in the nation. Occasional feature stories in the newspapers point that out.

But the rest of the country doesn't know, and an article in the current Geographical Review giving the mammoth proportions of the Snake canyon as compared with the Grand canyon of the Colorado is fast becoming a worthy of quotation by the news magazine. The Snake chasm attains a depth of 1200 feet. The Colorado walls are more sheer and more colored, but they lack the breath-taking softness and mystery of the Snake depths.

The Snake is an "ace in the hole" for the Pacific northwest. No railroad crosses or touches it, and the good-road builders have shrunk from the cost and engineering needed. Thus neither the railroads nor the tourist agencies have considered it of use to give space in their ballyhoo. But one of these days a proper road will be pushed to the rim and the canyon will become the equal of Crater lake and Mount Rainier as an attraction for both tourists and the home folk.

As a strange creation of nature it correctly ranks with Niagara, Pike's Peak, Death Valley, the Yellowstone and the canyon of the Colorado.

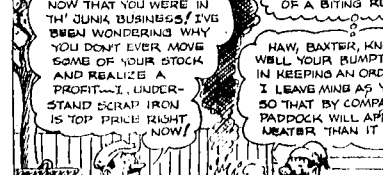

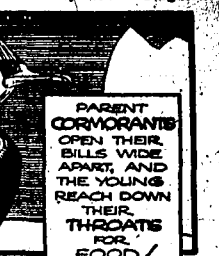

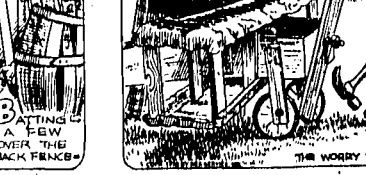

PLAN SET FOR AMENDING OF U. S. NEUTRALITY ACT

PROPOSAL WOULD GIVE ROOSEVELT EMBARGO POWER

NEW YORK, Nov. 28 (U.P.)—A plan to amend the United States neutrality act so that the president could apply an embargo on any nation he deemed to be an aggressor is being prepared by government experts for presentation to President Roosevelt.

The proposed amendments would be designed to transform the neutrality law into one of the most powerful diplomatic weapons in existence.

State department and other officials are preparing the plan. It calls for sweeping changes which would put "teeth" into United States foreign policy. The proposals, after submission to the president, will be worked over with congressional leaders in an effort to clear the way for legislation amending the neutrality law at the next session of congress.

Increase President's Power
Although government officials were silent or denied that the proposals had any official status, it was learned from unimpeachable sources that amendments under consideration included changes that would:

1. Increase the discretionary power of the president in dealing with belligerent and with aggressor nations.
2. Give the president power to name the aggressor in foreign conflict and apply an embargo on that nation without applying it to a nation being attacked.
3. Empower the president to prohibit shipment of all war materials to an aggressor nation.
4. Include Canada in the list of Latin American nations to which the act at present does not apply.

Changes Fit in Program
Such changes would fit into President Roosevelt's recent program of increasing the defense of the Americas if need arose and with the purpose of that policy at the coming presidential election.

Under the plan, the president would strengthen Mr. Roosevelt's declaration of last summer that this government would not stand by in event of an attack on our neighbor on the north.

The fact that these proposals are being prepared does not mean that all of the changes outlined would be proposed by the administration or adopted by congress. The details remain to be worked out, expanded or modified, but it is felt that a bill congressional in nature seems likely if request is made in the greater discretion of the chief executive. The extent to which congressional leaders can shape the legislation probably will guide formulation of the proposed amendments.

"Earhart of China" in U. S.



In the United States to raise funds for Chinese, Lee Ya-Ching, known as the "Amelia Earhart" of China, was granted renewal of her pilot's license at Oakland, Calif. The talented young Chinese aviator insists that China will fight to the last man in their undeclared war with the Japanese and that "China will win."

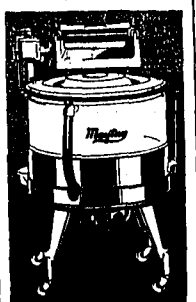
