STATE LEGISLATURE SESSION

JURY CHOSEN FOR JOHNSTON TRIAL ON MURDER CHARGE

Eleven Farmers In Group Which Will Hear Case

Twelve men, eleven of them farmers, this afternoon held the fate of Duncan McD. Johnston in their hands as state attorneys started presentation of evidence which they hoped would result in a conviction against the murdered charged former mayor, and defense attorneys prepared to beat down any evidence the state might produce to the end that the ex-jeweler would be declared innocent.

Selection of the jury was completed in district court this morning before Judge James W. Porter. After completion of the jury had been attained and the body sworn in, however, it was necessary to recess court until 1:30 p. m. today in order that four additional jurors could be selected from the body of the county and one of these qualify for alternate jurymen.

BORAH WARNS ON PLANS FOR NEW FOREIGN POLICY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (UP)—Sen. Borah, R., Idaho, ranking minority member of the senate foreign affairs committee and leading congressional opponent of foreign entanglements, warned the United States today against any moves involving action against "aggressor nations."

The phrase "aggressor nation" comes of silly origin with a sad history, Borah said. "Let's not drag that out for further use."

Sen. Holt, D. W. Va., an administration critic, proposed that congress "look into the question of defense program thoroughly."

Sen. McNamara, D. Neb., discussing the President's continental defense plan, said that the United States could build sufficient armaments to protect the western hemisphere.

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Appropriation of \$149,800 Made By House, Senate

BOISE, Ida., Nov. 30 (UP)—Both houses of the state legislature adjourned sine die at noon today, thus ending a special legislative session called for the appropriation of special funds for the month of December.

The session ended with no additional appropriations being made. As matters stood at adjournment, the session had given final passage to bills asking \$130,000 for general relief, \$4,800 for maintenance of the state prison through December and \$15,000 for the expenses of the session.

The senate blocked passage of a bill asking \$40,000 for aid of widows and dependent children for the month of December by taking the measure from the house and burying it in the senate state affairs committee.

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ROOSEVELT MAY REOPEN LABOR PEACE NEGOTIATIONS

PRESIDENT STILL HOPES CIO, AFL WILL END STRIKE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (U.P.)—A high administration official indicated today that President Roosevelt might act before spring to re-verse peace talks between the American Federation of Labor and the Congress of Industrial Organizations.

Mr. Roosevelt and his labor advisers were represented as hopeful, however, that AFL and CIO leaders themselves would reopen negotiations without outside interference or presidential intervention.

It was emphasized that Mr. Roosevelt would make no obvious peace move until he believed that leaders of both factions would be receptive to mild prodding.

Indication of Progress

There was little indication of progress in the administration's behind-the-scenes campaign for labor unity. Officials of both the AFL and the CIO told the United Press that, although they desired an "honorable peace," they were not ready to surrender to the rebels.

The CIO's is "Peace without pieces."

The AFL was represented as ready to "wipe the slate clean" and reopen negotiations, provided that all "ulterior" agreements are withdrawn and that no stipulations in advance.

Perkins Plan "Impractical"

CIO leaders represented Chairman John L. Lewis as believing that acceptance of all CIO unions by the AFL, or all AFL unions by the CIO, and a convention of the reunited groups to "iron out details," was the best way toward a settlement.

Both groups rejected as "impractical" Secretary of Labor Perkins' proposal for appointment of a 13-member arbitration commission.

Conflicting jurisdictions between old established Federation unions and new CIO groups in the mass production industries were conceded to be the major obstacle to peace.
