

ITALIAN STUDENTS STAGE ANTI-FRENCH DEMONSTRATION

OFFICERS GUARD EMBASSY AS BIG THROUGHS PARADE

 TWIN FALLS, Dec. 6 (Special)—Hundreds of university students, including women, held angry anti-French demonstrations in main streets today, shouting:

"We want Corsica! We want Tunis! We want Djibouti!"

Djibouti, chief town of French Somaliland, is the terminus of the only railroad to Addis Ababa, capital of Ethiopia, and Italy is forced to use the French owned line.

Guard French Embassy
 Police and soldiers in impressive numbers guarded all approaches to the French Embassy. They closed the entrance square on which the embassy is situated, and permitted only persons who lived or worked in it to approach.

Crowd of demonstrators, grenadiers, Alpine troops and picked policemen guarded the embassy building.

Groups of between 10 and 20 students started small anti-French demonstrations this morning as they went to classes.

As they left class at noon for lunch, the students massed in hundreds to show their anger toward France.

Ask for Corsica, Tunis
 They paraded to such hotels as the Excelsior and Ambassador, and pointing to signs like "Cafe" and "The Restaurant," shouted:

"Put them in Italian! No French words in Rome!"

They got as close to the French Embassy as they could, crowding into side streets, and shouted for Corsica, Tunis and Djibouti.

They went then to the Venice square in hope that Premier Benito Mussolini might appear on the balcony from which he often speaks.

He did not appear and after waiting 10 minutes the students left.

Small demonstrations by groups of students and young priests were reported all over the city. The demonstrators wandered through main streets, shouting slogans against France, and demands for Tunis.

One group saw an automobile with a German license plate on it, and shouted, "Heil Hitler!"

BOTT WILL TAKE OATH JANUARY 2

BOISE, Ida., Dec. 6 (AP)—Gov. Elbert C. A. Bott will take his oath of office as chief executive of Idaho at noon on Jan. 2, it was officially announced today.

The oath will be administered by Justice James F. Albishie of the state supreme court. A few minutes before the administering the oath to Bott, Justice Albishie will receive the chief justiceship of the supreme court.

Change of chief justice's title is automatic and ancient, Justice William M. Hodien occupied the chair this year.

The state legislature will convene on Jan. 2 also, notwithstanding Gov. Barzilla Clark's proclamation which designated that day as a legal holiday.

The texts and pictures illustrating them were shown on the screen at the services. Mr. Chambers' topic next Sunday night will be "God or Godlike Adam or Ape?"

BOISE, Dec. 6 (AP)—John Wenger, who stole the great seal of Idaho in order to validate stolen state bonds, was released from the penitentiary here today upon a reprieve granted by Gov. Barzilla Clark.

New Work Starts At Memorial Park

Initial task in a new development project at Sunset Memorial park here has started with roadways for the new entrance cut in, according to W. E. Hawley, engineer and landscape artist from Yakima, Wash. Hawley is supervising the local work. He said that if favorable weather continues for a few days the road beds will all be shaped and ready for gravel surfacing.

A considerable quantity of nursery stock contracted for from the Kintners Nurseries will be planted as early as possible in the spring, the landscape architect said. The underground sprinkling system will be extended to all developed portions.

STREET WIDENING POLICY APPROVED

Establishment of a policy which will govern widening of streets in Twin Falls came last night as members of the city council discussed the recent improvement along this line in a part of the 100 block on Second avenue east.

The council moved that in the future permission will not be given for street widening where the travelway is now 40 feet in width unless the curb is moved back a distance of at least eight and one-half feet (center to the property line) and all gasoline pumps which are set up along the street are removed. Permission will not be granted to set up pumps along any street. The council voted unanimously to adopt the policy.

Also during the meeting last night members of the council gave official permission to Lionel A. Dean, local businessman-filer, to erect a second floor (center to the property line). The hangar will be completed and in use by Christmas.

Rowcliff, weighmaster, showing collections of \$78.40; Fire Chief Fred Perry, showing two alarms during the month and 300 inspections made; Dr. E. R. Price, city meat and dairy inspector, showing 1,603 animals killed during the month; Municipal Judge J. O. Pumphrey, showing total collections from fines amounting to \$145.50; R. J. Healy, plumbing inspector, showing collections of \$114; J. G. Sean, electrical inspector, showing \$70.70 collections.

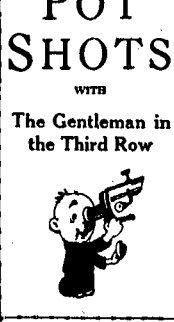

WHEAT MOVES IN NARROW RANGES

N. Y. STOCKS IN HEAVY TRADE

NEW YORK, Dec. 6 (UP)—The market closed higher.

CHICAGO, Dec. 6 (UP)—Wheat prices moved in a narrow range slightly above previous levels on the Chicago board of trade today. The undertone was steady to firm.

At the close wheat was up 1 cent, rye unchanged, and oats and corn up 1 cent to 1 1/2 cents. Higher. Opening quotations in wheat were regular, and offered commission house buying pushed prices fractionally higher. Liverpool and London market buying estimates of the 1939 winter wheat crop were consistently higher. After the early advance, however, trading turned dull and prices receded from their peaks on scattered profit-taking.

A Liverpool crop estimate of the probable winter wheat crop averaged about 325,000,000 bushels, more than 150,000,000 bushels under the 1938 harvest.

STOCKS ADVANCE IN HEAVY TRADE

NEW YORK, Dec. 6 (UP)—Stocks turned today after a four-day decline similar to that of the main market, and then fired test cartridges.

FAMED REPORTER TAKES OWN LIFE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6 (UP)—Paul V. Anderson, 45, a Washington correspondent for the St. Louis Star-Times, and a former Pulitzer prize winner, died at emergency hospital today an hour after he was found semi-conscious in his home.

Police said Anderson apparently had taken an over-dose of sleeping tablets. A Negro maid, Olive Fields, said Anderson told her before leaving the sleeping tablets.

"I'm going to end it all. My usefulness is at an end and I'm tired of living."

Anderson was the Washington correspondent for the St. Louis Post-Dispatch for 15 years before joining the Star-Times about a year ago. He was awarded the Pulitzer prize for the best example of reporter's work in his specialties leading to newspaper coverage of the sensational Doolittle investigation in 1928.

Anderson began his newspaper career on the Knoxville, Tenn., Journal in 1911 going to St. Louis a year later.

Idaho Potato is King—and Here are Some Fine Recipes

This is National Potato week—and King Idaho Russet is getting more nationwide publicity than he ever had before.

So it behooves Idahoans, too, to emphasize their own product. Here are some good recipe hints to help you, as consumers, to help the Idaho farmer, as producer.

Easy to Bake

Baking the Idaho Russet is the easiest thing yet. Scrub the potatoes thoroughly, for the skin is "good eating." Place them in a hot oven (450 degrees), or if you like, a cold oven and let them be heating through as the oven heats. Allow about 45 minutes for a preheated oven, a bit longer for the cold oven start.

As soon as the potatoes are tender, remove them from the oven, roll each between the folds of a towel, and let them drain for a square of butter into it. Serve at once.

The stuffed baked potato offers interesting variations in its uses. After baking, cut off a portion of the skin at the top or cut in two, lengthwise. Remove the insides, leaving a "middle," wash well, add butter and hot milk or cream. Whirl until light and fluffy. Replace in shells, sprinkle with American cheese and bake in a quick oven (400 degrees) until heated through.

How to vary it: With a tablespoon make a hollow in the filled potato. Into this an uncooked egg may be placed, or a filling of such as green lima beans, creamed carrots and peas and the like. This serves as an excellent way of using up leftover fish, meat or fowl, or of extending it. After filling, place the potatoes in a moderate oven (350 degrees) until heated through.

Another interesting variation is to add to the mashed potato chopped cooked meat or vegetable, fill the shell and bake. When you are up with this Stuffed Potato de luxe—the meal-in-a-shell you'll declare it the best little "wife-saver" you know.

scrambled eggs with ham bits. Over this place a layer of some cooked vegetable—spinach, peas, asparagus, carrots or what have you. Then the well-seasoned mashed potato in a mountain to top the whole. A piece of butter atop this or a sprinkling of grated American cheese—here a few minutes in the oven (350 degrees) to warm the whole thing through, and to brown it. This—as you will find out—is a whole meal. Good plain food—and mighty fine eating!

If you want to be "fancy" do try:

Fillet of Sole — Belle Otero (But Potatoes Make It)

Bake Idaho Russet potatoes—cut in half, remove potato and mash, adding butter, seasonings, and hot milk or cream. Then lay about a half dozen shrimps in the potato shell, over this a portion of a fillet of sole that has been poached in wine. Cover this with a light mayonnaise sauce and place a border of the mashed potato around the potato shell. Place the potatoes under the broiler, removing them when hot and browned. Each half is an individual serving.

Notes: Mayonnaise is made according to a medium white sauce recipe with fish stock used instead of milk, and with Parmesan cheese. Other sauces of this general type may be used.

To poach the sole in white wine, cover the fillets with the wine, add salt, pepper and dots of butter. Cover and bake 15 minutes in a quick oven (400 degrees). Or cook very slowly on top of range, basting frequently for poached eggs. Other fish fillets or brotters steamed white fish may be used.

This may be served alone as a course in itself, in which instance smaller potatoes may be used. If for the entrée of a luncheon or the main dish at dinner, use quite large Idaho Russet potatoes, serve with a buttered vegetable and a green salad.

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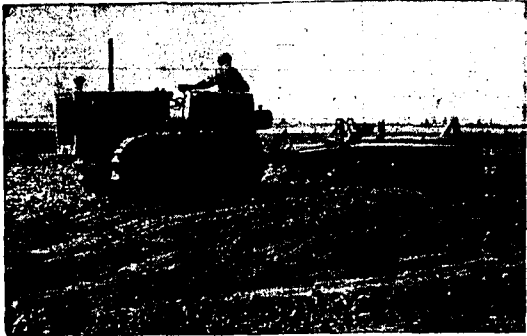
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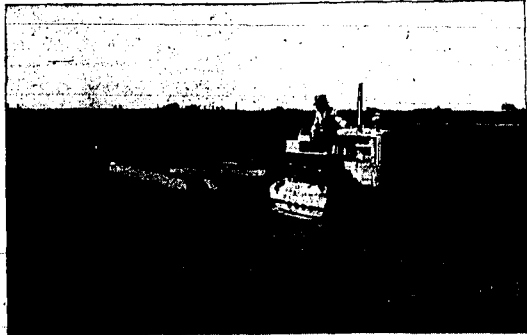

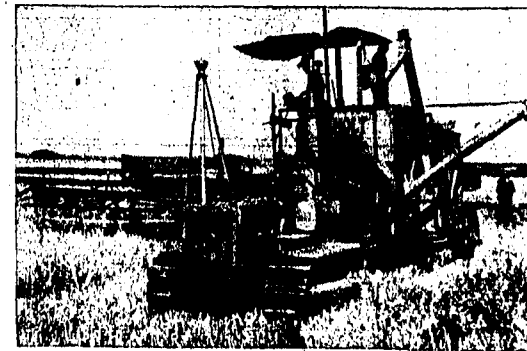
