## COSTE LAINED TO BUY 1,250,000 RIFLES STATE PARDON BOARD REFUSES LYDA SOUTHWARD RELEASE

### SIXTH HUSBAND'S LETTER RESULTS IN 'NO' BALLOTS

BOISE, Dec. 19 (U.P.)—The Idaho pardon board today refused to grant a pardon to Lyda Southward, Twin Falls convicted poison slayer, and gave as a reason a sensational written testimony from a former husband of unrevealed poison plots against his life and that of his son.

Gov. Barzilla Clark, Atty. Gen. J. W. Taylor and Sec. of State Ira H. Masters all voted a straight "no" to the request when the pardon board met in Boise today.

The letter was from Harry Whitlock, Denver, Colo., one of the poison slayer's husbands, who wrote protesting her release on grounds that she attempted to poison him and his "little boy," the married him shortly after her escape from prison.

### Crazed Mexican Abducts Girl, Kills Her Parents

AUSTIN, Tex., Dec. 19 (U.P.)—Wilma Kennedy, a blond wisp of a girl, 16, was rescued today from her forbidden Mexican suitor, who admitted killing her parents and crashing the skulls of her two sisters so that he could marry her.

Officers found her, apparently unharmed, in a house near Austin where they captured Frank Salazar, 24.

He had been a helper at the Kennedy farm home near San Angelo until his dismissal several months ago because of his marked attractions to Wilma. Her parents threatened to kill him if he didn't leave her alone and get out of the vicinity.

Under questioning, aided by Gov. James Alfred, Salazar said that he went to New Mexico after Wilma's father, Paul Kennedy, paid him off. But he couldn't stay away. He returned to the little town of Wilma near the Kennedy home, and was killed on the streets for sight of Wilma.

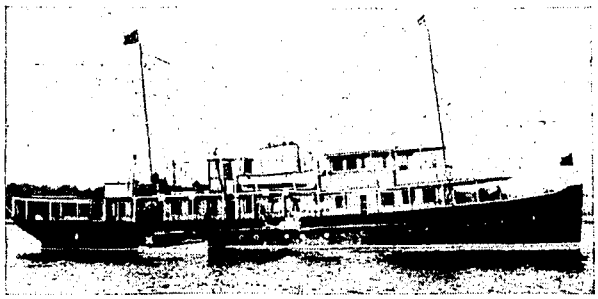

### Union Pacific Stages Avert Strike Plans

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 19 (U.P.)—A threatened strike of union bus drivers was averted today after the committee of drivers and officials of the Union Pacific Stages, Salt Lake City-Portland division, reached a tentative agreement on a renewal contract yesterday following three days of conferences.

The proposed renewal contract will be submitted immediately to referendum of approximately 125 employees affected.

Meanwhile, Brien McMahon, assistant attorney general, arrived from Washington to consolidate the investigation by half a dozen federal agencies into the affairs of the firm.

McMahon said that evidence discovered after Musca ended his 40-year swindling career by committing suicide last Friday indicated that illicit traffic in alcohol, which gave him his start as F. Donald Coster, had been the chief source of income in Musca's later years as well.

McMahon said that no matter "whose name was up" the federal inquiry into all phases of McKesson and Robbins activities—from gun-running to drugs—would be pushed to a conclusion.

LIMA, Peru, Dec. 19 (U.P.)—Secretary of State Cordell Hull sought support of Latin American chief delegates to the eighth Pan American conference today when he called a fundamental difference between United States and Argentine ideas of the proper wording of a declaration of continental solidarity.

The United States idea is that the 21 American republics should bind themselves against aggression by any outside power. The Argentine idea is that they should not specify any outside power.

Argentina wants to eliminate "non-American" and make the declaration read that a threat by any state will be opposed. Argentina is afraid that to specify "non-American" nations will anger nations abroad with which it has important trade interests.

Hull retorts that it would be dangerous for the American republics to agree to a declaration of continental solidarity which would be interpreted as a threat by any state.

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### NAMES IN TODAY'S NEWS

Chairman Josephine Roche of the Federal committee on health care today said that the nation's health care activities will be a White House conference that President Roosevelt will send a special message to congress on the national health program.

Los Angeles, Dec. 19 (U.P.)—The house of delegates of the California Medical Association voted this morning, after three days discussion, for a low-cost health insurance.

They made their state organization the first in the country to take such action. The program will become operative within 90 to 90 days.

### LOW-COST HEALTH INSURANCE VOTED

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### RECLAMATION PROGRAM GREATEST IN HISTORY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19 (U.P.)—Secretary of the Interior Harold I. Ickes' annual report today called attention to the largest reclamation construction program in American history.

He said work was in progress on 32 projects in 12 states, in which the largest construction jobs are in the western area.

During the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1938, he said 25 projects opening in 16 semi-arid western states had provided irrigation for 5,000,000 acres on which the average crop value was \$300 per acre.

The water supply in 1938 provided ample, the report said, with one exception.

Thirteen major dams were being built and six were completed. Great scale operations were completed at Grand Coulee dam in eastern Washington and the central valley project in California.

In connection with granting the report stated that with completion of preliminary surveys and classification work, temporary one-year licenses will be replaced during the coming year with 10-year permits.

This change in the range into permanent construction of two 45,000-ton larger than any now operating with the American fleet, which may be armed with 16-inch guns, if reports that Japan and other powers are violating international treaties.

### WIND AND COLD BLANKET EUROPE

LONDON, Dec. 19 (U.P.)—A biting wind that swept across thousands of miles of Europe from the Siberian steppes brought suffering to millions today in the coldest winter in years.

Over 30 deaths from cold were reported in Europe, including 10 in England, 10 among Jewish refugees on the Polish-German frontier and elsewhere, six in France and two in Hungary.

Abnormal temperatures were reported all the way from the Black and Baltic seas to the Mediterranean and the English channel. It was 20 below zero in Moscow, 10 below in Warsaw, 7 below in Paris and 6 below in London.

Hundreds of thousands of troops in camp in the north of France and the Balkans postponed the great offensive which the nations of the central front were to begin at the federal court later today. They are held in 100,000 rail cars.

QUAKE DEATH TOLL  
ANKARA, Turkey, Dec. 19 (U.P.)—A heavy death toll was feared today in a series of earthquake shocks yesterday in central Anatolia. Many houses were wrecked and hundreds were homeless. The same area was shaken last year and hundreds were killed.

WINDOWN SHATTERED  
AUCKLAND, N.Z., Dec. 19 (U.P.)—A succession of earthquakes occurred through New Zealand in the last few days. Buildings were damaged and many were shattered. The city in the south island, No loss of life was reported.

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### RACE

HOLLYWOOD, Dec. 19 (U.P.)—Two movie companies raced today to get the amazing career of Frank Donald Coster-Musca on the screen first. Warner Brothers hoped to begin production before Jan. 1. Columbia had six writers at work on a Coster-Musca story and hoped to get it into production quickly.

### Night Train Crash Kills 32 in Brazil

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil, Dec. 19 (U.P.)—Thirty-two were killed and 60 injured last night in a train crash on the Central Do Brazil railroad in the state of Minas Geraes.

The crash occurred between the stations of Jooz Ayres and Bico, about 100 miles from Rio de Janeiro. The train was carrying 100 passengers and 100 crew members.

NEW YORK, Dec. 19 (U.P.)—Managers of the Brooklyn Navy Yard searched the vast grounds on the possibility that a fire which destroyed 250,000 gallons of oil on the yard's main building was started by an arsonist who still was in the yard.

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# Loophole May Give Clark Liquor Board Appointment

## GOVERNOR MAY GET CHANCE TO RENAME MOORE

BOISE, Dec. 19 (AP)—A loophole in the Idaho statutes would make it possible for Gov. Barzilla W. Clark to declare a surprise appointment Jan. 1 that would allow the Democrats to retain a two to one majority on the state liquor commission for the next two years, attorneys said today.

Gov. Clark's attention has been called to the legal technicality by Democrats seeking the appointment, and their supporters. He would have just 12 hours in which to make it.

Term Expires Jan. 1

The term of Commissioner Homer Moore of Craigmont, a Democrat, expires Jan. 1, 1935. Gov.-elect C. A. Bottofson will take office succeeding Clark at noon, Jan. 2, and form his Republican administration.

The law reads:

"Upon expiration of the term of appointment of each member of the commission, the governor shall appoint his successor for a term of six years."

The Idaho constitution provides:

**Law Interpretation**

The governor shall hold office for two years beginning on the first Monday in January after the election.

Since attorneys doubt whether an appointment can be made legally on Sunday, on which Jan. 1 falls, the law could be interpreted that Clark would be chief executive until noon, Jan. 2, when Bottofson is sworn into office. During these 12 hours,

they assert, he could make the appointment.

Other liquor commission members include: Chairman H. H. Yeaman, Idaho Falls Republican, in office until Jan. 1, 1934, and E. P. Horsfall, Boise Democrat, whose term expires Jan. 1, 1943.

# TERRITORY DEMANDS MAY LEAD TO WAR, SAYS FRANCE

## COUNTRY WARNS ON ANY POSSIBLE 'SURPRISE MOVE'

By RALPH HEINZEN  
 PARIS, Dec. 19 (Special)—Foreign Minister Georges Bonnet's voice ringing above the frenzied cheers of members of the chamber of deputies, said today that France would never surrender an inch of her territory, anywhere, to Fascist Italy, and added:

"A surprise move intended to obligate France to cede territory could lead only to armed conflict."

It was an unequivocal, and apparently final answer to agitation in Italy for surrender of French territory to Premier Benito Mussolini's aspirations in the Mediterranean and the Balkans.

As plainly as a man could, Bonnet said that France would fight and that Great Britain would be at her side.

**Naval Construction**  
 At the same time, Minister of Navy Cesar Campinchi announced that 24,000 tons of new French warships would be laid down before the end of 1942 in a drive to bolster the empire defenses. The figures include tonnage already under construction.

France, he announced, will spend \$500,000,000 francs (\$200,000,000) on naval construction in 1939.

The chamber was debating the foreign industry budget. It had been expected that left wing elements in the cabinet would back the government as regards its policy. Bonnet dispensed his expected critics. He spoke boldly and forcefully and added:

"The French government is resolutely determined to defend the French patrimony and not to allow anyone to wound in any way her dignity and her grandeur."

**Deputies Cheer**  
 Depulized rows of cheering wildness. Any idea of opposition collapsed. There was no more debate and the chamber at once adopted the foreign office budget.

Bonnet made three main points in his speech:

1. That France would fight Italy rather than surrender territory.
2. That France and Great Britain would be united in any war and that either country would go on once the other had withdrawn its aid in event of an unprovoked attack.
3. An important gesture to Germany, Italy's partner in the Berlin-Rome diplomatic axis.

**No Aid Support**  
 As regards Germany it was necessary to remember that Germany had remained silent and neutral in the agitation against France—an agitation which was ostensibly disavowed by the Italian government but which continued clandestinely in the closely controlled newspapers of Italy.

Bonnet, in his speech, upheld the recent French-German anti-war declaration as a most important document and he said that if it were carried out faithfully war in Europe would be impossible.

## TURKEY GROWERS COMPLETE SALES

GOODING, Dec. 19 (Special)—The sale of turkeys for the Christmas and New Year's market neared completion last week with 67,500 pounds already shipped, bringing the growers in this territory approximately \$13,000 in return. The birds averaged about 16 pounds and brought 20 and 22 cents at Burki's red store, and 19 and 21 cents at C. G. Tarpening's.

Tarpening, buying for Swift and Company reports the shipment of one carload last week approximating 30,000 pounds and averaging about 15 pounds to each truck. These birds were trucked to Twin Falls and shipped from there. They were of excellent quality, reports Mr. Tarpening, and almost all were grade No. 1. The birds came in in small numbers, about 200 from each of the small growers in this community.

The Greenhorn farm, owned by Joe Arkost and sons, was the largest single shipper from this territory, reports Mr. Burki. One carload, made up entirely of Arkost's turkeys, went through Wednesday night to New York. Included in the shipment were 3,000 dressed turkeys, which brought 20 and 22 cents per pound.

About 800 birds were taken through by truck to Caldwell and from there shipped to Los Angeles.

# Wreckage May Reveal Fate of 1927 Hawaii Air Race Contestants

## CRAFT IS FOUND IN WATER NEAR PACIFIC ISLAND

HONOLULU, T. H., Dec. 19 (U.P.)—The fate of Mildred Moran, Michigan school teacher who gambled her life with those of six men, and lost, in the air race to Hawaii 11 years ago may be revealed today.

Navy salvage crews attempted to raise the wreckage of a civilian plane, but hurried to ocean sand, off the westernmost point of Oahu island.

It was discovered by a Filipino fisherman diving to recover his net. He reported the ancient wreckage to naval and army officials who sent out a crash boat.

40 Yards Offshore

The spot was 35 miles northwest of Honolulu, 40 yards offshore in 28 feet of water. Using eye goggles, a team out and examined the wreck. It was wedged between two huge volcanic rocks. Part of the fuselage stuck out from the white sand. Multi-colored tropical fish swam lazily through the tattered yellow silk fabric and the metal skeleton of the framework.

It obviously was an old ship and showed evidence of having been in the water a long time—possibly since 1922 when the \$25,000 prize excited a free-for-all race of pilots who risked their necks to fly here from San Francisco. Two planes of the fleet left Oakland on Aug. 16, 1927, completed the flight. Art Goebel and William Davis, 1927, took first prize money. Capt. Paul Schuller won \$10,000.

Not Military Plane

Navy officers were positive the plane was not a military or naval craft. They believed it was a biplane and one of three ill-fated "Dole" ships. But there was possibility it was that of Capt. Charles T. P. Uim, who with a crew of three was lost somewhere near the island in 1934 on a flight from San Francisco. No trace of the Uim ship or its crew had been found.

First clues to be brought up from the wreckage were contained in several pieces of wing covering, a tubular wing brace, pieces of fabric and corrugated aluminum. A piece of light alloy also was found. It bore the numbers 28F1013-98 and 11859 or 959.

Miss Moran was a passenger aboard the craft piloted by Augie Pedler and navigated by Lt. Vilas Knope.

The "Golden Eagle" carried John W. Frost and Gordon Scott to their deaths, and the "Spirit of Dallas," flown by Capt. William P. Erwin and A. H. Eckhardt, also was lost. It was forced back and took off on Aug. 18.

"The Spirit of Dallas" was the only one equipped with radio, almost an innovation in those days of compass flying and dead reckoning. When 600 miles out from San Francisco, Erwin reported:

"We are in a tailspin."  
It was the fullest explanation of the tragedy that befell any of the three ships, until today.

## RESERVOIRS HOLD ADEQUATE WATER

Two of three principal reservoirs serving this section have shown considerable gains in the amount of irrigation water stored during the past month, a report of Lynn Crandall, watermaster for the Snake river watershed, disclosed today.

Only reservoir to show a drop was Lake Walcott, which, at the present time, is storing 65,120 acre feet against 67,100 acre feet a month ago.

The two other reservoirs, American falls and Jackson lake, showed gains. American falls reservoir is now storing 1,298,100 acre feet against 1,050,220 acre feet a month ago. Likewise Jackson lake is unponding 458,870 acre feet of water against last month's total of 437,780 acre feet.

Snow depths over some of the areas have shown substantial increases and are also showing good water content. Latest reports show four inches at Ashton, 16 inches at Island Park dam, 24 inches at Beecher river and 12 inches at Moran. In the case of the 16 inches at Island Park dam 3.10 inches is the water content.

Recent precipitation included 21 of an inch at Ashton and 19 of an inch at Moran.

Water stored in the American falls reservoir and in Jackson lake amounts to nearly double that stored a year ago, the report shows.

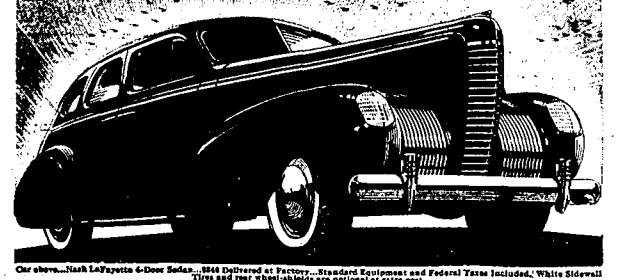
