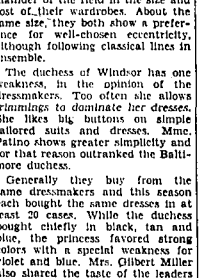

CABINET REVOLT THREATENS CHAMBERLAIN

BRITAIN'S PLAN OF REARMAMENT CAUSES TROUBLE

By WALLACE CARROLL
 LONDON, Dec. 20.—Political quarters reported today that Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain was threatened with a cabinet revolt. This time the dispute involved not the government's foreign policy but its rearmament program, it was reported.

According to political gossip, a number of men of junior ministerial rank demanded the resignation of four key cabinet men—Leslie Hore-Bligh, war secretary; Sir Thomas Inskip, minister for defense coordination; Viscount Runciman, lord president of the council; and Earl Winterton, special assistant to the home secretary.

Do Rearmament Work
 Runciman and Winterton joined the cabinet when it is members such as parliamentary secretary in the various government departments, are being groomed for important jobs, say that they will get out unless the four ministers do.

Other Reports
 There were other reports that because of publicity given the matter, the four ministers themselves may precipitate a cabinet crisis by offering their resignations in order to force Chamberlain to express confidence in them or to replace them.

Many's newspapers discussed the situation frankly. Some predicted there would be a reconstruction of the cabinet early in the new year, immediately after the return of the prime minister from his mid-January visit to Premier Benito Mussolini if not before. It was intimated that resignations on a scale might be avoided by a general switch in posts.

Names Starting In "S" Top All At City's Court

If your name starts with the letter "S" you are more apt to be jailed into municipal court than if it starts with any other letter of the alphabet.

At least that's what you would be led to believe if you thumbed through the files of Municipal Judge J. O. Pumphrey.

Such a "thumbing" by an Evening Times reporter today revealed that during 1938, to Monday, 78 persons had appeared in court on various charges and their names started with "S" in each case. Of course there were names starting with

other letters but they were far below that one member of the alphabet. In second place was "E" while "H" was in third place, "M" in fourth and "B" in fifth.

A survey of the records shows that those who were hauled before the judge and whose true names started with "S" were there for various reasons. Among those reasons were the following:

Varied Offenses
 Hit and run driver, one; disturbing the peace, two; reckless driving, two; intoxicated, one; public place, 23; begging on the street, two; petty larceny, five; vagrancy, nine; driving while intoxicated, one; and burglary, one.

But Judge Pumphrey warned that just because your name doesn't start with "S" is no reason why you should break any laws.

"When a law is broken we don't

care what the lawbreaker's name starts with," he commented.
