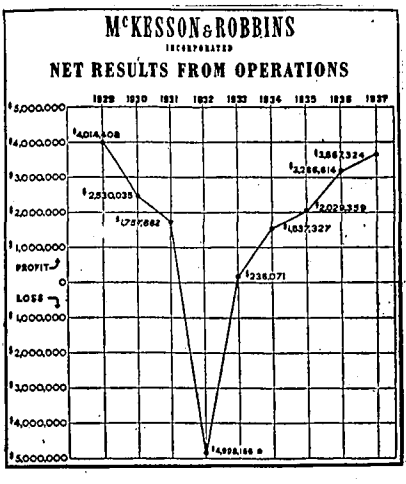

GERMANS' DEBT BURDEN CONTINUES STEADY ADVANCE

BUT PER CAPITA COST IS BELOW U. S. AND BRITAIN

BERLIN, Dec. 21 (AP)—Germany's debt burden is showing upward and Nazi experts are wondering whether it can ever come down safely.

New loans floated by the reich in 1938 total almost \$400,000,000, more than \$200,000,000—more than three times as great as in 1937.

Official statistics show the total public debt amounting to 287,000,000 marks (\$10,530,000,000) or an increase of 36 per cent over last year.

The unpublished figures on Germany's debt burden show 50,000,000,000 marks or \$200,000,000,000 for a nation of 80,000,000 persons as compared with the United States public debt of \$38,600,000,000 for 130,000,000 population.

No Fear of Collapse

In the simplest form possible, the questions posed for economists are: At what point does inflationary pressure become impossible without economic collapse (such as monetary inflation)? How long can the reich continue to postpone a reversal of the present borrowing policy? Must the government ever begin trying to balance its budget?

For orthodox economists the answers might be comparatively simple but under the Nazi controlled economy the whole problem is a financial one although there is general agreement that the reich is in no danger of immediate economic collapse.

Hjalmar Schacht, head of the Reichsbank, who has seen the unpublished debt figures that might aid neutral experts in analyzing the situation, recently spoke optimistically of Germany's prospects. He said that it was hoped these concealed figures could be published in the not too distant future and that when they were disclosed the world was going to get a surprise which would not please the reich's foes.

Situation Changed

On the basis of published figures, the reich's debt burden has changed completely in comparison to pre-Nazi days.

In 1922, the total debt was about \$1,000,000,000, or 29 per cent of the total foreign debt.

The reich's foreign debt in 1938 was \$14,800,000,000 or 52 per cent of the total. Thus the new Nazi indebtedness is almost entirely internal; loans which have been made to the reich by the German people.

That officially recorded domestic debt is steadily increasing and it is still below the pre-war figure of \$2,000,000,000 marks, or \$12,800,000,000.

It is also true that the per capita debt is lower than that of Britain, France or the United States. Thus the internal indebtedness is of secondary concern to the Nazi experts.

ADULT CLASSES TAKING HOLIDAY

Adult education classes in four central communities will conclude activities this week for the holiday season, and will resume work again the week of Jan. 3, it was announced here today by Mrs. G. W. Erbland, supervisor for this region.

The Twin Falls classes, taught by Mrs. Erbland, Mrs. Leure Johnson and Ruth Reed of Jerome, concluded pre-holiday work this week. The family living class, at Burley, directed by Mrs. Erbland, has already closed and the other Burley courses will disband for the holidays Friday. SON PLEADS WITH FATHER FOR MURDER CONFESSION

OFFICIALS PROBE SLAYING AS PAIR IS HELD IN JAIL

By ALAN McELWAIN
 LOS ANGELES, Dec. 21 (Special)—Police put a father and his son in the same room early today and for more than an hour the son urged the father to confess to the murder of his wife, the youth's mother.

The father would not. He accused the son of having killed her himself, and insisted he knew nothing about the disappearance of his wife who had been missing two weeks. He was a dwarf, less than five feet tall, and he readily admitted having had intimate relations with two of his daughters. He was held on a charge of incest.

Near the incinerator in the home of William Spinelli, 50, the police had found a collection of bones one of which was said, on medical authority, to belong to a human skull. The others were tentatively identified as turkey bones.

In a bedroom, they found a blood-soaked mattress, a blood-stained floor, and a hand ax splattered with dark stains.

Convicted of Murder
 Police said they were convinced either Spinelli or his son, William, Jr., had hacked Mrs. Rose Spinelli to death, dismembered her, and reduced the pieces to ashes in the incinerator.

Father and son were booked on charges of suspicion of murder. The boy told detectives his father had forced him to write to his sister saying their mother had gone to South America with another man. He wrote another note, he said, to which was forged his mother's signature.

The sister to whom the notes were addressed, Mrs. Helen Angwill, 26, didn't believe what they said and had her father and brother arrested.

Story Shaky
 The son's story, detectives said, seemed shaky in parts.

After hours of this questioning, detectives decided to confront father with son. They put them in a room and listened for more than an hour while the son urged his father to confess murder.

The elder Spinelli was arrested Monday night at the home of a neighbor. He said he was afraid to sleep in his own house. Police said he had been having been intimate with Mrs. Emma, 16, and she is married and has a child.

Who is 19, said his father who can neither read nor write, had forced him to write the letter to his sister.

Wedding Ring Found
 Spinelli, Sr., said that before his wife left she pushed him down a flight of stairs. He cut his head and it was his blood the police found, he said.

A gold band wedding ring was picked up in a basket near the incinerator.

Twenty jail trustees, put to work spading up the yard and basement, found \$400 in a rusty can in the basement. Spinelli said he knew nothing about it.

COMPROMISE FOR PERU PACT SEEN

LIMA, Peru, Dec. 21 (UP)—A compromise proposal on a declaration of continental solidarity, designed to end a deadlock between United States and Argentine delegates, was circulated today among delegates to the eighth Pan-American conference.

The compromise, drawn by Carlos Concha and Afranio de Mello Franco, chief delegates of Peru and Brazil, would bind the 21 Pan-American republics to present a united front against aggression by either an American or a non-American nation. Not only armed aggression but any other activity, such as political penetration, which might impair the national institutions of an American republic, would call for united action.

There were indications that the compromise draft might be further revised after conferences among chief delegates. As it stands, the compromise represents a victory for Argentina in that it includes aggression by an American nation against another American nation.

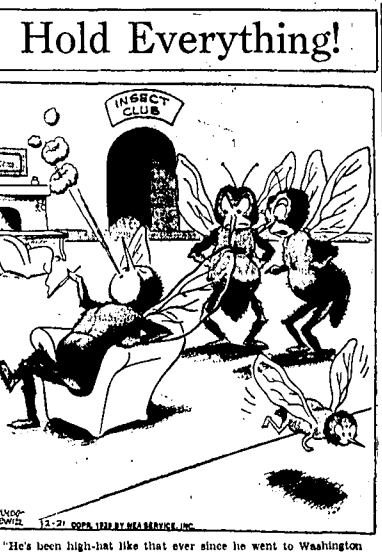

TAXES FLOW IN; DEADLINE NEARS

Adventurous Band of French Colonists Low on Food and Coal

WOMEN QUARREL ON TINY ISLAND NEAR POLAR ICE

PARIS, Dec. 21 (AP)—Radio contacts with an adventurous band of French colonists on barren St. Paul's island, close to the outer edge of the Antarctic ice shelf, was restored today.

George Mandel, minister of colonies, announced the colonists were running out of food and their supply of coal was exhausted.

Naval authorities made hasty preparations to rush coal from the nearest naval base, Diego Suarez, on the island of Madagascar, 3,000 miles away.

Radio operators at Antananarivo, Madagascar, established contact with the tiny "barren island" early this morning and confirmed the plight of the colonists. Bitter dissension was reported to have broken out among the women in the band.

Near Polar Ice

Fearing that the colony had been wiped out, the report of the French navy had been heard from the stranded group since an SOS it had sent out was picked up by an amateur radio operator in Bremerton, Wash.

The island is 3,500 miles from both Melbourne, Australia, and Cape Town, South Africa, lying midway between the two continents and a few hundred miles from the south polar ice shelf.

The colonists are without fuel but their scanty food supply is supplemented by lobsters and fish which swarm around the island.

The present French warship was at Saigon, French Indo-China, several thousand miles away. Hence the government is unable to furnish to change its course and go to the island and leave supplies or take off the colonists.

Five Married Couples

A warship which called at the island some years ago found the previous colony wiped out by scurvy. The present colony consists of five married couples and two children, and the crew of 36 of the team trawler *Moroux*, renamed *Le Bourbon*.

The trawler sailed from St. Denis, France, on May 28. It cleared the *Suez canal* where the last letters were mailed. They announced the five women were quarreling with one another.

Mrs. Jean Rimon, wife of the radio operator, is a Breton fishwife. Mrs. Hilda de Boer, wife of the expedition's leader, is an experienced world traveler. Colette Mouraquin, niece of the French minister of colonies, is a Parisian and a hair dresser. Paul Canton and his wife of Saint Pauli completed the group.

WINTER HITS WESTERN U. S.

RAIN, SNOW, FOG, HAIL CONVERGE ON ALL STATES

(By United Press)

Winter officially greeted the western half of the nation Wednesday with a varying assortment of hail, snow, fog and rain, from the Pacific northwest to the Gulf of Mexico.

The accompaniment resulted from a slow-moving mass of cold, moist air. Temperatures were not extreme and many areas were not affected because of scattered cloud formations. But the contrast to previous mild December weather was sharp.

Heavy mountain snowfalls and valley fogs stopped all traffic in the northwest. Ice made the highways dangerous. Southern California had electrical storms, rain and hail. A trace of snow fell in Pasadena before hail whitened the ground.

Only thing "bad" about southern Idaho weather today was the rest of the west was hit by rains, snows and hail, was a near-record heavy fog that continued to cling to the ground.

Temperatures stayed above normal, with the high for yesterday at 56 and the low at 21. Low this morning was 21. Low weather prevailed and the prediction was for snow or rain—the same that has been forecast for the past three days. Heavy flakes of snow dropped this morning.

Rain melted it. Citrus growers lighted their amudge pots in protection against frost.

The snow extended south from the Rockies into New Mexico and eastward into Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas. It brought fresh hope for wheat growers.

Rain in Drouth Area

Southeastern Colorado, recovering from five years of drought, was in good condition as to ranges and fields with three to five inches of snow.

The federal meteorologist at Kansas City said the storm had dipped so deeply toward the south that it had lost much of its force and it would moderate to the east.

Electric tree lights and electric decorations require the use of common sense if accidents which may lead to hundreds of dollars in property loss are to be avoided during the Christmas season, give them a thorough examination, Fredheim said.

"See whether the insulation on the wires has dried and cracked, exposing the copper conductors at any point. See whether the insulation has pulled back on the wires at the sockets, exposing the bare copper tips. Sore in the lamp bulbs and see if they fit snugly in the sockets without exposing part of the 'live' lamp base.

"Precautions are necessary to prevent short circuits which might cause sparks to ignite inflammable decorations or the inflammable tree. Metal foil and metal decorations often cause these short circuits when live parts of the set are exposed. Each year there is an unnecessary loss of life and property on Christmas tree fires," Fredheim said.

Fredheim also advised that unless the decorative sets appear in the best of order they should be thrown away and new ones purchased. Sets for use indoors should never be used out-of-doors. He urged use of sets which have an approval stamp of the Underwriters' laboratories.
