80 Killed, 250 Injured in Crash of Roumania Trains

SNOW AND COLD HAMPER RESCUE WORK AT SCENE

BUCHAREST, Roumania, Dec. 26 (AP)—Semi-official sources confirmed today that 80 persons had been killed and 250 injured in the collision of two holiday passenger trains near Beni.

Other reports fixed the death list as high as 125 and the injured at 300. Many of the injured were not expected to survive.

Severe cold and snow storms in the Beni district made rescue work difficult. Engines of both trains and seven coaches were destroyed.

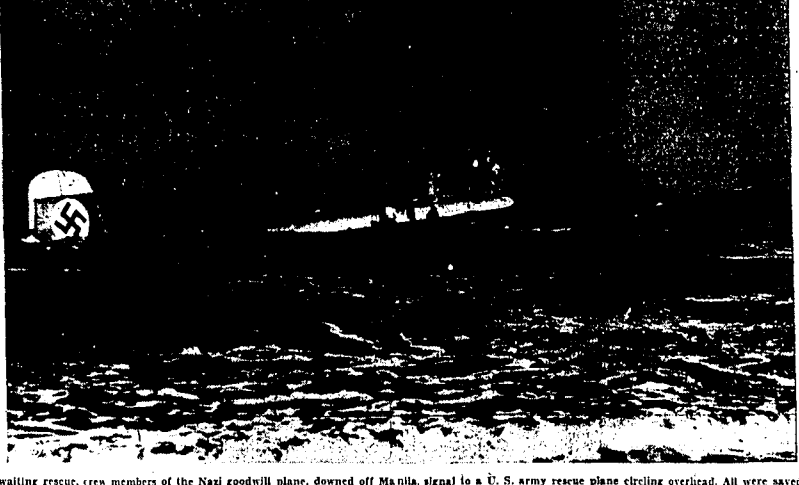
The situation was made more serious because telegraph and telephone lines were disrupted.

Hospitals at Galatz and Braila, northeast of the capital, were reported to be filled with dead and injured. The wreck was described as the greatest railroad catastrophe in Roumanian history.

Passengers escaped injury as the trains collided at 3 p. m. yesterday during a heavy snow storm. The trains carried 1,500 passengers, most of them returning from holiday trips.

Both trains were almost destroyed. Many of the injured were buried in the debris for hours. Rescue workers were handicapped by cold and darkness.

National Income Makes Bright Prospects for Business in 1939

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26 (AP)—Although no official confirmation is yet available, James P. Pope of Idaho has been designated for a post on the Tennessee Valley authority's board of directors, reliable sources indicated today.

Friends of Senator Pope said he has already accepted. He leaves office Jan. 3 as a result of his defeat in the Idaho primaries of last August by D. Worth Clark, congressman who steps up to the senatorship.

Pope, an unwavering supporter of the administration, is rated here by Washington observers as an able man of unusual ability in many ways, although not the vote-getting type in a rough and tumble political campaign.

His appointment is made as reported, the Idahoans would fill the vacancy on TVA caused by dismissal of A. Morgan and David E. Lillienthal. The board of directors is chairman, Pope would become a member with one of the two lieutenants in charge.

The nomination of the Idaho lawmaker will go to the senate soon after congress convenes in January, it is understood.

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LAUNDRY DRIVER HURT BY CRASH

Wendell Brown, 24, driver for the Parkville Laundry and Dry Cleaners of Twin Falls, was in the county general hospital today following an early Christmas morning crash on the Oregon highway.

Hospital officials described Brown as suffering from a possible skull fracture, cracked into the site of a loaded truck back bumper, and fractured ribs.

The force of the crash, as Brown recently saw the truck at the last moment, was so great that it completely demolished the laundry vehicle. Officers said the truck had full and running lights burning.

Laundry business was restricted over the highway, along with two dressed turkeys Brown had been carrying in the truck.

The crash was investigated by Deputy Sheriff Art C. Parker and W. W. Lowrey of the county jail after charges, Kimberly Marshall, and State Patrolman V. K. Barrow.

This Girl Won't Spend the Holiday Season with Daddy

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 26 (AP)—Betty Jean Fisher, Kansas City high school girl, won't spend the holiday season here with her father, Leo Fisher, 39.

Her father lay dead in the county morgue after he was shot down by a policeman. He robbed a laundry company clerk of \$55.

In a pocket was a letter from his daughter. "Dear Daddy: I just received your letter. It makes me happy to hear from you, as I don't know what had happened to you."

"Daddy, I still want to come and be with you. The train ticket is \$30 and I must get a few clothes and some other things. If you can spare it, I would like for you to please send me \$50."

"I am hoping to hear from you by return mail. We will be seeing each other in two weeks."

1938 Season Only Slightly Beneath '37

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26 (AP)—Government economists believe that a national income of \$70,000,000,000, highest since 1932, is in prospect for 1939.

The present rate of business recovery continues, the economists said there is a good chance that national income in the New Year will reach \$70,000,000,000.

The newly appointed secretary of commerce interpreted the President's message as "America's expansion of a will to peace and well-being of all our people."

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Republicans Set To Make Good on Campaign Pledge

BOISE, Dec. 26 (AP)—Idaho Republicans, with a majority in both house and senate, prepared today for the difficult task of making good campaign pledges for tax reduction, economies and administrative reform when the state legislature convenes, Jan. 2.

Democrats will turn over to their arch rivals the heavy burden of solving a tangled mass of major legislative problems that probably will result in more important legislation than any session in the state's 60 years of existence.

The superior administration, relief, penitentiary reform, changes in the departments of public works, education and law enforcement are anticipated.

The Republicans promised to provide for an "expert" board for dispensation of leniency as concerns parole and pardon. They pledged reform of the administration of the department of public works.

Merit System. Governor C. A. Bertolotti's promise to fight for a merit system for all state employees is expected to bring a legislative battle over the state's 60 years of existence.

Volunteers will be looking with the most care for fulfillment of the Republican campaign pledge, "to be honest and economical." They are asking themselves what the new legislature intends to do about it.

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FDR Asks Settling Of Class Problems

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26 (AP)—The nation had before it today the plan of President Roosevelt that class problems be settled in an atmosphere of good will.

The President's appeal was read by Secretary of Commerce Harry Hopkins last night in a radio forum which aimed to combat forces creating class warfare in the United States.

Christmas message, as announced to the shepherds of Bethlehem, was that "the glad tidings are for all of the people."

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STORY DEMANDS ITALIAN 'RIGHTS'

ROME, Dec. 26 (AP)—The inspired Italian press announced today that Italy was "ready for anything" if her demands in the Mediterranean are met.

The authoritative Voce d'Italia said Italy "accepts the offensive on whatever front or by whatever means are named. She is also because she is right and her strength will one way or another result for her to attain her rights."

Foreign observers say the communique is an Italian propaganda effort to position the position established by the formal denunciation of the Franco-Italian accord of 1937.

RESCUE OF NORWEGIAN FREIGHTER CREW TERMED MIRACLE

CAPTAIN TELLS OF CLOSE CALL IN GETTING AID

NEW YORK, Dec. 26 (AP)—Another saga of the sea went into the records today with the detailed narrative of the rescue of 18 men and two women from the sinking Norwegian steamer Smaragd 800 miles southeast of New York last Friday.

"I was called the rescue a 'miracle.' He said when he left his ship was nearly full of water, but he would have kept afloat another hour, and that would have been the end for all of us."

"Generally on a southward passage," he said, "we turn away at 60 to 80 miles remaining. Sunday morning on this trip we decided to haul up for Sandy Hook at 85 west."

"The leaks increased until last Monday night, when the wooden hull began to float," he said. "The water came in so fast our pumps could not handle it, and soon our starboard side was so low in the water that our dynamo failed and the pumps stopped and all our lights went out."

"Tenderland started the flare which got the Smaragd's attention late Thursday. An expert signalman, he used an electric torch to flash an SOS to the Smaragd after it came into view."

"We were leaning badly. Our engines were broken down. We used the last of our fuel and the engine died. We were abandoned to the mercy of the sea. I saw Christmas cards!"

Rebel Offensive Pushes Forward

Franco Army Moves Ahead For 18 Miles

BARRAGOSSA, Spain, Dec. 26 (AP)—The "Christmas offensive" of Generalissimo Francisco Franco against Catalonia pushed forward at one point as deep as 18 miles, nationalist headquarters reported today.

In bright winter sunshine the mechanized nationalist forces moved rapidly over the level plain known as the Llana de Urgell toward the main highway to Barcelona.

They claimed to have reached the outskirts of Grandella, a communications center 16 miles south of Grandella and 18 miles beyond the point where the offensive started.

Barcelona officials admitted loss of Almatel, 25 miles south of Lerida and east of the Segre river.

Attack Fan-Wise

On the lower Segre the attack was spread fan-wise over a front of approximately 25 miles. Cavalry was being used successfully along the front.

The nationalist spearhead was pointed at the heart of Catalonia. It captured the Sarroca-Almatel highway and pushed beyond Torredors 13 miles south of Lerida.

In the north the nationalists claimed an advance of more than five miles along the Trena front. Barcelona was considered particularly notable because they traversed roadless mountain terrain.

Snow Kneep Deep

Plowing through knee deep snow, the Catalan and Navarrese divisions cleaned up the Mont Sec plateau and approached important road junctions leading to the heart of northern Catalonia. They claimed to have taken entire companies prisoners and captured tanks, artillery and war materials.

At midnight Christmas eve nationalist soldiers knelt in the snow gripping their rifles as chaplains in vestments celebrated "missas de Gallo"—midnight mass.

For a brief time war was forgotten, but at the end of the services they returned to sentry duty or rolled up in their blankets for sleep until the advance would be resumed.

PROWLER SOUGHT IN MURDER CASE

CANON CITY, Colo., Dec. 26 (AP)—Police tonight are searching for a prowler who had terrorized Canon City housewives for the last three weeks as a suspect in the death of Mrs. Norma Atterbury, 41, prominent clubwoman.

Sheriff D. F. Van Buekirk said his officers were investigating possibilities. Atterbury had been strangled to death by the person who terrorized women in the neighborhood. A search had been ordered to patrol the area to watch for the prowler after reports had been received of his activities.

Blood Analysis

Dr. Francis McConnell, Denver toxicologist, was called in to make blood analyses from samples found on the back door and in a bedroom of the Atterbury home, in which the woman was found dead.

Mrs. McConnell, who distinguished herself in the trial of Anna Hanin, Ohio "poison maddess," cooperated with Police Chief Hugh D. Harper of Canon City and E. Paul County Coroner Thomas Coughlin.

An autopsy showed the woman died of strangulation, a report substantiated by a physician. The verdict reported she had not her death by strangulation probably at her home, by a person or persons unknown.

Finds Wife's Body

Dr. R. L. Atterbury, Canon City ophthalmologist, testified he found his wife's body at the foot of the basement stairs in their home. He said he believed she had fallen and broken her neck.

Chief Harper testified it was his opinion the woman did not die where she was found but probably had been thrown down the stairs after she was killed.

Mrs. Atterbury, a leader in church and social affairs in Canon City, was married a year and a half ago.

BOY WINS OVER DREAD DISEASE

CHICAGO, Dec. 26 (AP)—Twenty-one days ago Raymond Potter, Jr., 14, was stricken by staphylococcus meningitis, a rare disease usually fatal within 48 hours. Today his physician said he had a good chance to recover.

There is no standard treatment for the disease. It attacks the bones, blood and covering of the brain. Medical records show that other persons have recovered from it.

Physicians believe the reason Raymond still is alive can be credited to his blood transfusions he received from persons who recovered from staphylococcus infections of a similar but not the same specific type.

Dr. Luther M. Loran, the attending physician, said if Raymond continues to improve further transfusions may be unnecessary.
