Mac Announces His Choices for Winning of Kentucky Derby

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 12 (UP)—It has long been the policy of this racing expert to announce his choices for the Kentucky derby month in advance. Last year, while the title game was still blanketed with snow, I unveiled a check-up on horses, with the Kentucky Derby, and also the winner of the \$100,000 Santa Anita handicap. His name is Porter's Mile, a three-year-old belonging to W. E. Boiling, Mr. Boiling is a strong man, and he has built a fine distance and an excellent horse. The purchase of the Island of Manhattan for \$24 million of costume jewelry was no greater bargain than Boiling got when he bought the Mile from John Hay Whitney for less than \$750.

That was just a year ago, and since then the mighty Mile has reaped \$77,000 from the classic Belmont turf. He is now at the top of the list, and he is a horse to watch for a Derby winner. They lean toward the Saratoga stable's Bolt, the first future winner ever to campaign in the winter as a three-year-old. He has made one start since reaching here, in the Santa Anita stakes last Saturday, and he won it easily.

Now the Santa Anita has the derby and the six furlongs but a mile and a quarter, which is the derby distance, but Porter's Mile finished the shorter race so strongly that there is no reason to believe he can't as the route. After all, he is bred for distance. He has the reputation of being a strong runner, and he has been named "The Porter" could go the whole way, and has staked more than one route. Sport Squibs

Mr. Clarence Anderson, a youngster of some 34 years, quite bald and with a very sort of humor, came to town yesterday and treated followers of the slicking society to some of the faintest trick and fancy shooting ever witnessed on a billiard table in the city—probably some of the very finest that will ever be displayed here for many years to come.

Mr. Anderson put on his show at the H. and M. billiard parlors before a packed house, and to say the least, he had much of them some time dismayed and probably just a little bit puzzled with the tricks he pulled right before their very eyes.

The trick shot artist, billed by the world's champion, displayed a variety of 50 shots, missed only five times and wound up the performance by putting 15 balls in the pockets of the table with one shot. That climaxed the splendid performance and brought his raptures from the crowd.

But this trick shooting stuff is an old game for Anderson—despite the fact that he never touched a cue until he was 18 years of age.

Along about 1930 he was operating a filling station at Kane, Penn., and the depression moved in on him. About that time he had discovered that he was better than average at trick shots, and as the depression continued, he decided to sell his station and really go into the sport of trick and fancy shooting.

And since that time he has improved yearly until today he has no real competition in his chosen field. Also during that time he had discovered the ladder of success to a notch in sports where he ranks along with Willie Hoppe, Jack Schaeffer and others of the green cloth. Incidentally, Anderson toured with the above named pair for a time in 1938 and hit many of the larger cities of the nation.

On his present tour he is sponsored by the Brunswick-Balke-Collender company and has played in the major cities of the nation, including such places as Pittsburgh, Philadelphia, Brooklyn, Winston-Salem, N. C., Amarillo, Tex., Salt Lake City and many others.

In Brooklyn Anderson put on a performance that brought comment and praise from all over the east. He gave 44 trick shots without a miss—something he doubts he'll ever be able to do again.

While the so-called "experts" of the cue in most towns of the nation are willing to bet on their abilities, Anderson has never yet made a wager on one of his shots—if he doesn't gamble at all on any pool game. While he prefers to stay strictly in the trick shot business, he occasionally settles down to straight pool and a newspaper clipping he carries showed that he had made a run of 237—only 23 short of the world's record.

Of all the spots played in his present tour—which has taken him this far from the east coast to the west—Anderson states that the most exciting he ever got out of a stint was at Kimberly last night in an exhibition played before the Twin Falls engagement.

"The crowd really got into the spirit of the tricks there and started giggling, and I started having fun. I really never had a more enthusiastic audience and that's when it's fun to put on an exhibition," stated the world champ.

For the folks whose taste more responsive to his line of play than they do the east—the fans appear to like the game more and Anderson more thoroughly interested.

Anderson is the first of a series of billiard stars coming to this area during the winter months, and if the following members of his troupe live up to the performance staged by this gentleman in his first year in the "big time"—billiard room proprietors are going to have to build additions to accommodate the crowds.

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COUNTY REFUSES CLAIM BY STATE

State request that Twin Falls county pay \$3,328 for its November social security contribution was turned down by the "old" board of county commissioners, county records showed today.

The \$3,328 claim constituted the one month's payment, which this county did not give the state. The December claim was paid with money transferred from other relief portions of the budget after state-wide attention was centered on the Idaho relief crisis. The November claim, however, had been turned down earlier because the amount

marked in this county for co-operative public assistance was exhausted.

Decision not to reimburse the state for the one delinquent month was made by Commissioners James L. Barnes, Robert Ray and George H. Hart because "no other county similarly situated has made any effort to reimburse the state and the further fact that all state appropriations for relief purposes lapsed the first Monday in January, and no county appropriation was available."

Mr. Barnes offered the motion rejecting the state request.

SAWTOOTH SNOW ABOVE YEAR AGO

Sudden snowfall last week blanketed the Big Wood river drainage area with snow depths that exceeded last year both at Ketchum and Halley, according to the weekly report received here from F. S. Moore, supervisor of the Sawtooth national forest.

Ketchum had 12 inches average depth Monday, Mr. Moore said. The figure for 1938 at the same date was 11 inches. Halley had nine inches at the start of this week, as compared with four inches last year.

The snowfall was general throughout the Sawtooth sector, and

such spots as Galena and the three Old Baldy reporting stations all climbed above totals of last season. No. 3 Old Baldy showed 30 inches, compared to only 18 last week and 24 at this time in 1938.

Soldier ranger station and Fairfield both reported depths rocketing upward from those of a week ago. The ranger station had 22 inches Sunday, four inches more than last year and 14 more than a week ago. Fairfield had six inches, which was three times the total a week ago but still one inch under 1938.

In the Salmon river watershed, Williams Ranch in Sawtooth valley had 25 inches of snow Monday. That was 17 inches more than last season and seven above the week before. Cumulative snowfall in the Halley country from Oct. 1, started as a result of the latest storms. On Monday it had reached 27.80 inches. Average is 37.73 and a year ago the mark was 30.25 at this season.

CLAIM REJECTED

As an aftermath of a prolonged legal battle that saw the county appeal to the United States supreme court, the board of county commissioners, before the two new commissioners took office, rejected a claim of Southern Idaho Laboratories for \$101 for services rendered Mrs. Marie Henderson Sears, county records revealed today.

Mrs. Sears won a district court judgment against the county for injuries received in the county hospital. The Idaho supreme court upheld that verdict, and the U. S. high tribunal refused the county's appeal for review. Mrs. Sears was then paid approximately \$4,500.

The \$101 claim was disallowed because the matter is regarded as closed.
