More Than Century of Styles Pass in Review at OAO Dance

Twin Falls and vicinity could easily support its own museum of American fashions, it became evident at the costume party of the O. A. O. Dancing club last evening, so authentic and "collection worthy" were some of the ensembles worn. The Elks ballroom was the locale for the event, one of the most diverting in the annals of the organization.

From shortly after the War of 1812 to the post-World War "flapper" era, the exciting journey of American history unfolded in review as the men and women dancers, some emulating famous characters of the past, and others behaving in the humorous manner their ludicrous "get-ups" dictated, enjoyed the dances that were popular from the Gay Nineties to 1925.

From the time Will Wright's army struck up the tune of "Hail, Hail, the Gang's All Here," for the grand march, until the final number, "After the Ball is Over," the gala remained amusingly in character. The merry-makers assembled at the ballroom at 8:30 o'clock for an informal hour preceding the grand march.

Prizes to the Winners:
Mrs. Archie Bowman, as Water-gate, a member of the S. S. Thompson strata of society, wearing a gaudy white feather hat, ornate with plumes, a flatter hat, a brief light-colored skirt and peek-a-boo blouse, received the women's prize for costume. To Mrs. B. S. Keel, J. W. Adams, awarded the men's prize for humorous effects. A red-shirted old fisherman, with a sinister appearing curly beard and who he looked like the original organizer of California's vigilantes.

Mrs. R. P. Perry, in an exquisite velvet batiste, hand-tucked and ruffled gown, with which she wore white mitts, and the perkier of roll-trimmed mauve velvet and felt hat, planned with ostentatious the women's prize for the prettiest costume. The ensemble, dated 1880 had belonged to her mother, the late Mrs. R. E. Shepherd of Jerome.

The ensemble was comprised of an intricate flower-trimmed bonnet, a long capelet of wool all ray-trimmed with black jet bands and fringe, a hand-loomed plaid wool skirt, worn over an elaborately embroidered, tiered petticoat, and held out by a collapsible set of hoops.

Mrs. O. P. Duval, wearing long curls behind either ear, and a flower-splashed period costume, was a charming Civil War belle. A necklace of carved gold links, the pendant studded with garnets and pearls, a matching brooch and little finger ring, belated jewelry of Mrs. Duval, added to the effectiveness of her outfit.

Representing a more modern period, Mrs. C. A. Bailey, with a "belle" gown in her eye, was a provocative "chickie" of 1915, wearing a blue-plumed legion hat, and a white net flounced dress, sachet with blue velvet.

One of the most striking gowns of the evening was the 1910 costume which Mrs. E. A. Head had brought back with her from a trip to the Philippine Islands. Fashioned on the same lines that have prevailed for years and years, the voluminous skirt was made of lamp fabric, and hoisted and up-standing collar of pleated fabric in a soft shade of green, embroidered with white, black and silver metallic threads.
