ACCIDENTAL DEATHS IN NATION TAKE 10,200 DROP

PLANE FLIGHTS CAUSE ONLY 35; TRAINS TAKE 65

CHICAGO, Jan. 31 (AP).—The nation's accidental deaths in 1938 dropped 10,200 from 1937 and the greatest improvement ever recorded in a single year, the national safety council announced today.

The provisional figure was the lowest since 1931.

Accident prevention programs were successful everywhere except in the home. For the first time in a decade home accidents exceeded the nation's traffic deaths.

The council said home accidents increased 100 per cent from 22,000 in 1937 to 23,500 last year while traffic fatalities dropped 10 per cent from 20,843 in 1937 to 20,000 during 1938. This represented a saving of 7,640 lives.

33 Per Cent Reduction

Only 35 persons were killed last year in accidents involving scheduled domestic air flights compared with 87 in 1937, a 33 per cent reduction.

Deaths from steam railroad accidents which includes grade crossings, roundhouse accidents, etc., during the first 10 months last year amounted to 2,752, a decrease of 18 per cent from the 1937 total of 4,580. The council said the only increase in deaths was for passenger trains. There were 12 deaths in 1938, largely because of the Montana train wreck last June.

The council said during 1938 the accidental death rate per 100,000 population was 7.3, a mark bettered by only six years since 1900.

Two Great Disasters

Two 1938 disasters were outstanding, however. They were the New England hurricane and the February floods in southern California, which the council said took 602 and 181 lives, respectively.

Forty-five states cut their deaths below 1937 figures. Rhode Island led with a decrease of 36 per cent. Pennsylvania was second with a 35 per cent reduction in traffic fatalities.

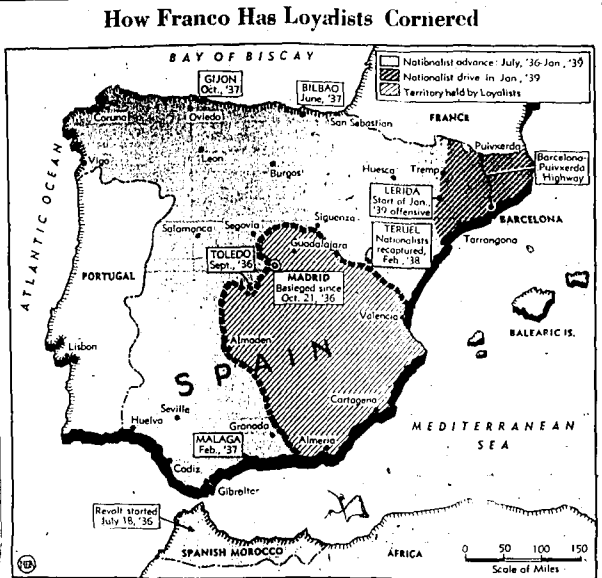
Montpelier Students Will Inspect Local School Government

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BEETMEN RAP AT WALLACE'S STAND

JEROME, Jan. 31 (Special).—Protesting the "antagonistic" attitude of Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace in regard to the sugar beet industry, a petition directed to Wallace was signed here yesterday afternoon by 82 beet growers of the Jerome-Lincoln-Gooding Beet Growers association.

The growers signed the petition at a meeting in the courtroom, J. N. Daly, Murtagh grower, presented the document, which had been previously signed by the representatives of the Nissa, Ore., the Cassia, and the Jerome-Lincoln-Gooding associations at a meeting held in Boise Jan. 31.

4. Revamping the authority of state purchasing agent; giving him new powers and duties; allowing exchange of obsolete equipment; and
5. Creating a commissioner of labor post.
