

EUROPE BLAZONS ROOSEVELT WORDS ON ARMS SALE

FRANCE, BRITAIN HAIL FOR DESIRE TO SELL PLANES

LONDON, Feb. 2 (Special)—Europe blazoned President Roosevelt's views on the arms situation today as a new factor of incalculable importance in its tense political situation. In Great Britain, and particularly in France, the president's desire to aid the European democracies to re-arm was hailed as a contribution to the restoration of a balance of power—a contribution calculated to slow the march of the dictators and perhaps save the world from war.

In Paris, it was even suggested that the reported statement of the President to the senate military affairs committee at a secret White House conference, caused Premier Benito Mussolini not to make his customary vigorous speech to the Fascist militia yesterday on the occasion of its anniversary.

Attitude Denounced
In Berlin the president's attitude was denounced as an unwarranted interference in Europe's affairs, as a violation of neutrality and perhaps also of the United States' solemn non-forfeiting debtors, and—according to one newspaper—as proof that "Washington and Moscow are pulling on the same string."

Both Great Britain and France are arming urgently, particularly with airplanes. But there is considerable doubt in some quarters in these countries as to the prospect of their reaching the racing pace which Germany and Italy have set. It was suggested this morning that the big feature of all government armament discussions for many weeks to come.

Plane Production Up
Officially inspired articles are appearing in British newspapers assuring the public that British airplane production may be on a par with Germany's soon.

Whether this is true or not, the real thought about the importance of the United States in the world picture is contained in the cut of the following comment in the Daily Telegraph, an influential conservative newspaper which usually reflects the views of the foreign office:

Important Factor
"That Mr. Roosevelt used the words, as reported, 'our frontier is in France' is probably a grossly mischievous, perhaps, of what he actually said. However, our Washington correspondent interprets what did occur as an indication that the president intends to fight vigorously for his declared policy of refusing moral and material support to aggressors and that he believes that while it may be difficult to secure amendment of the neutrality act, congress, and public opinion would approve discrimination in sales of arms and munitions to be enforced by semi-official influence."

"In that event, the United States would become more than ever a ponderable and perhaps decisive factor in international calculations."

Preliminary hearing for two local men, charged with robbery, will be held before Probate Judge C. A. Bailey Saturday at 10 a. m.

The two, Louis Hendrix, 27, and Claude Williams, 21, appeared before Judge Bailey for arraignment yesterday afternoon. Bond was set at \$500 each but, because neither was able to furnish the necessary funds, they are being held in jail.

Claims Death Threat
Hendrix and Williams are accused of robbing James W. Marshall, 27, Const. No. 510 late Tuesday night after they had driven him to a point near the Palace and owned property on the edge of Rock creek. He told police in a signed statement that the two men threatened to kill him "because he knew too much" after they had robbed him.

Marshall identified the two men as the police arrested in connection with the alleged robbery. Both men arrested have prior police records. Proprietors of the Silver Inn said that contrary to the statement Marshall gave police shortly after the alleged robbery, the two accused men did not return to the drive-in dining establishment after the hold-up Marshall described.

Your Health

DIPHTHERIA

In 1937 Idaho had only six deaths from diphtheria. But in the first nine months of 1938 there were nearly 20 per cent more cases of this disease than in the whole of the preceding year, and the danger of a real epidemic is not yet over.

Diphtheria is caused by a tiny rod-shaped microbe with a peculiar hitch for children. Four-fifths of all cases occur in youngsters less than 10 years old, while four out of five adults are immune to the infection. Decreased tonus increase a child's susceptibility.

It is contact with the sick person that spreads the germs, or contact with the secretions of his nose and throat and with objects—such as towels, toys, pencils—which he has handled. Besides this, many people who recover from diphtheria carry the microbes in their noses and throats for a long time after they get well and they often contaminate things they use, such as dishes, milk, handkerchiefs, etc. This is another way of passing infection along.

Two to five days after he has been exposed the patient develops fever and sore throat. His tonsils and soft palate are red and there is a grayish membrane on the surface of his throat. Sometimes, in the most dangerous cases, this membrane grows up into the back of the nose or down into the larynx (voice box). The younger the child, the more serious the outlook.

Before the day of antitoxin, diphtheria often killed 90 per cent of its victims, but now the death rate is not over 5 to 15 per cent.

The only way a doctor can prove that diphtheria exists is to culture bacteria made from the nose and throat. In eight to 24 hours the germs will grow enough to be recognized under the microscope, but to wait that long may be dangerous; so the wise physician, if his patient is very ill, gives antitoxin when he makes the swabs. If the child has diphtheria, this will probably save his life; if not, no harm will be done.

Antitoxin

Antitoxin is the purified blood serum of an animal that has been

Jack Benny Has Lots of Luck But It's Bad Most of the Time

HOLLYWOOD—Jack Benny usually is a fall-guy on or off the screen, on or off the air, in or out of court. He accepted his indictment on charges of buying smuggled jewelry with about the same spirit that he displays when somebody gives him the hotfoot, and with the same remark: "That's very funny."

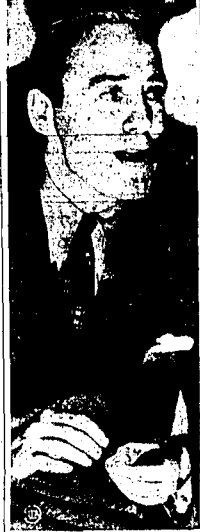
Unhappy things are always happening to Mr. Benny, who is Hollywood's champion, warden and dearest-pan comedian when he isn't performing. He is dead-pan because he actually does not see or hear what is going on around him. He just stinks around, rolling his cigar in his mouth and worrying about some imminent crisis which may be nothing more than a 30-second scene in "Man About Town." Not even an appearance in federal court can be more terrifying to Mr. Benny than those first few moments when he faces a camera or a microphone.

Pants in Flames

In spite of the actor's preoccupation and grim men, nobody takes him very seriously. While he was wearing cowboy costume during the filming of his last picture, someone set fire to his pants. When he was being lowered from a window, a costly watch dropped from a pocket and was smashed to bits. He has a large entourage of stooges who by all the Hollywood rules should behave in an obsequious manner and say, "Yes, Mr. Benny." Instead, they argue with him until, exhausted, he sits down in a chair that has been fixed to collapse.

When such things happen, Benny says, "That's very funny." He is customarily the ghost of a smile behind his cigar.

There are some who say that Benny is a tight-fisted miser who will not out of his way to save a dollar here and there, but his close friends declare this idea is exaggerated by the ribbing he gives himself on the radio. Last year, on the first day of his return from New York after an absence of months, he was touched for \$1200 by numerous needy pals. He is a generous player of benefit. He and Mary Livingstone entertain handsomely in a large house in Beverly Hills, and their swimming pool is so big that it has

a skin on it. Benny and his wife have huge warships, and he undoubtedly is the world's best dressed comedian.

Jokes are Cash to Him

Whether punch-queen or prodigal, he is no waster of cash. A joke is the most precious thing in the world to a man in Benny's business, and he almost never says anything funny in informal conversation. His companion in the smuggling trouble,

George Burns, lets gulps fall where they may. But Benny makes through a newspaper like a small boy in juvenile court.

When Benny is not working in a picture, and has time to go to parties or his golf club, he is almost as gay as anybody. During picture production, though, he usually is a time two gag writer, Eddie Brubaker and Bill Morrow, and Secretary Harry Baldwin are always with him at the studio. During every spare minute they work on the radio program for the following Sunday.

Benny never appears in the Paramount cafe; he has guests and coffee in his dressing room. The three employes all talk at once. Benny sits back and listens. Occasionally he makes a suggestion and rises and paces as he elaborates on it. He never petulantly says that a lousy idea is lousy, he says, "Maybe I could switch it around like this." The writers believe that he is the most kindly fellow who ever lived.

He's Good, That's All

Benny and Morrow are on his personal payroll, and he often says them on movie dialogue. "This doesn't play right," he'll say, tossing away a few pages of script. He and his writers then will work out some new lines. The result always is an improvement, or he would not be allowed such liberties.

His perpetual clerk is not a posed trademark; he smokes about 15 cigars a day. Benny smokes in his life until 10 years ago, when he took a part in Earl Carroll's "Vanities" which required him to puff cigars.

His devotion to Miss Livingstone (who was Sadie Marks) and their 5-year-old adopted daughter, Jean, is one of Hollywood's special prizes. He and his wife call each other "Doll." Benny never has attended a preview of one of his pictures. He goes to boxing matches if there are any, and is on tenterhooks until Miss Livingstone finds him and says that the picture was a success.

And They Still Speak

Besides golf, Benny likes bridge but is poor at it. He owns a race horse, Buck Benny, bought at Saratoga auction. Before that, Benny's first race under his new colors, the actor gave Hillard Mark, his brother-in-law, \$300 to bet on the race across the board. Mark didn't know how to bet, and couldn't find a bookie anyway, so he bet the money. Buck Benny won, paid a big price, and cost its owner some \$7000 by the unplaced wager.

Mark remains one of Benny's closest confidants. Another is Harry Lee, his former Broadway manager, who now is his stand-in although he has to wear 4-inch cork stilts.

King Jeff Publishes Book On "American Hobo, Inc."

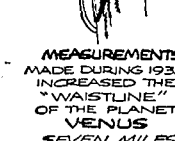

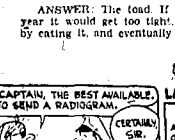

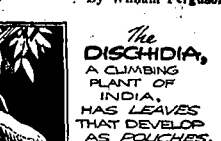

MEASUREMENTS MADE DURING 1938 INCREASED THE "WAISTLINE" OF THE PLANET VENUS SEVEN MILES.



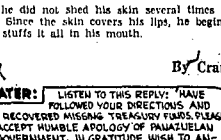

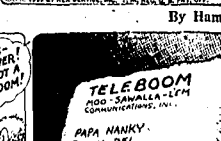

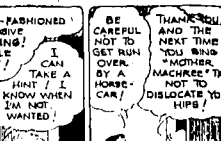
