## IDAHO GOP MEASURES TO GET QUICK PASSAGE

### Dr. Townsend, Solons to Plead for Age Pensions Before House Group

#### Star Witness from Hawaii to Explain Method Used There

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (U.P.)—The house means committee today agreed to hear Dr. Francis E. Townsend, advocate of more liberal old age pensions, and two United States senators backing his plan. They will testify Thursday.

The senators who will appear are Claude Pepper, D., Fla., who introduced the Townsend bill in the senate, and Gerald P. Nye, R., N. D.

Townsend will produce tomorrow one of his ace witnesses for the plan, Louis C. Silva, former deputy tax commissioner of Hawaii and now statistician for the Townsend organization. Silva is to discuss the mechanics of the Hawaiian tax system which the Townsendites levy to finance their pension plan. Such a tax has been used to some extent in the Hawaiian Islands.

**First Appearance in 2 Years.** A Thursday hearing will be Dr. Townsend's first appearance before a congressional group in two years. His previous appearance resulted in his being sentenced to 30 days in jail for contemptuous action toward an investigating committee. President Roosevelt pardoned him. Ways and means committee members privately they were prepared to ask Townsend to give a full financial accounting for his group, including the sources of support and its expenditures.

Townsend organizations sought to defeat Chairman Robert L. Doughton, D., N. C., and a number of other congressmen in last year's elections.

**Velocity of Circulation.** L. W. Jeffery, Townsend vice-president who directed the political campaigns, argued before the committee today that the velocity of circulation had no effect on recovery, that industrial and business activity depended upon the velocity of circulation. He said that the velocity of currency circulation is speeded up.

The Townsend plan, he asserted, would accelerate the turnover of money.

**Denies Argument.** He denied the argument of Rep. Roy Woodruff, R., Missouri, that the plan would increase the price of products of this country to a level that would make it infinitely easy for foreign countries to underbid their goods, pay the duty, and undersell our producers.

He argued that this could be met by raising the tariff walls, and told Rep. John McCormack, D., Massachusetts, that he would like to see it "worn" when McCormack asked if he advocated "building a tariff wall around ourselves."

**2ND MAN HELD IN MOLESTING CASES**  
Local police, this afternoon, announced the arrest of two men, who they said, cleared up a number of molesting cases of local women which started last summer and which continued until the present time.

Latest to be arrested was Edgar Davis, 35, married and the father of a small daughter. Davis has been arrested in Twin Falls for two years, police said.

Identified by Girl  
He was arrested Sunday shortly before noon in the downtown business section after he had been identified by a 12-year-old girl as the man who, in front of a local store a few minutes before, allegedly had forced to indecent exposure in her presence.

Under questioning by police, Davis admitted, recorded above, that he was not only guilty of this offense involving the small girl but that he had resorted to similar offenses last summer and fall in the vicinity of the downtown business section.

## Planes Hunt for Pilot, Craft in Northern Idaho

Spokane, Wash., Feb. 13 (U.P.)—Two national guard planes today circled the rugged Idaho panhandle and a 100-ship rescue force through snowdrifts in frigid weather tonight to find a pilot who was missing after he was seen flying Sunday in an observation plane. Although the pilot, a Spokane pilot, was a veteran of several forced landings, he was feared to be in danger of being frozen or injured in the wilds after a crash.

The search centered in the mountainous region west of Buhl, Idaho, 45 miles northeast of Spokane, after local radio reported sighting of a plane on a hill from a plane, before dawn Sunday.

## BUDGET HEARING POSTPONED HERE

Because of the line-up of relief applicants that flooded the office of the Twin Falls county commissioner, the scheduled hearing on the 1939 tentative budget for the county was postponed today.

A number of farm and city taxpayers had appeared for the hearing, slated for 10 a. m., but the crush of relief work prevented the board from going ahead with budget plans. Chairman George R. Hart requested the interested taxpayers to return Tuesday or Wednesday for discussion of the tentative budget.

The commissioners, under the law, have five days in which to take final action on the proposed expenditures. Although the tentative 1939 budget shows a considerable increase over the tentative for last year, comparison with the final 1938 budget shows a grand total of \$49,425 for 1939 as compared to \$49,726 final 1938.

Major increase for 1939 is in the poor fund, for which the budgeted amount of \$16,540 was made. Large increase was also made for the fire fund, however, need not be met.

The hearing this week can result in studies of the tentative but commissioners cannot increase them without the preliminary schedule.

## MILITARY GROUP RETAINS SECRECY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13 (U.P.)—The state military affairs committee today rejected, 10 to 4, a proposal to make public its record concerning the aid given by the United States government to a French air mission that proposes to build up the new American-made fighters.

Chairman Morris Sheppard, D., Tex., said that the committee's action was based upon the belief that "truth should be kept" with new planes had been tested in secret.

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## HOOVER WILL KEYNOTE LINCOLN DAY DINNERS

NEW YORK, Feb. 13 (U.P.)—Former President Herbert Hoover will keynote national Republican observance of Lincoln day tonight when the party's annual Lincoln dinner will be held at the Waldorf Astoria.

Lincoln dinners in every state will take place on the radio broadcast of the dinner of the national Republican club here. Party leaders, elected by Democratic Internal dissection and by the Republican election victories in 1938, said the affairs would be the most hopeful and one of the most important in many years.

Fifteen hundred persons had made reservations, at \$25 a plate, for the dinner in the grand ballroom of the Waldorf Astoria to hear Mr. Hoover, national committee chairman John D. Hamilton, and five Republican governors elected last fall.

**Dewey Is Host.** Host and honorary chairman will be District Attorney Thomas E. Dewey, whose November defeat by the New York governorship failed to prevent him from being the party's presidential nomination in 1940.

The pre-dinnering will last from 7 to 11 p. m. EST (7 to 9 p. m. MST).

The blue network of the National Broadcasting company will broadcast the first hour. The Mutual Broadcasting system will carry on from 10 to 11 p. m. EST. The Columbia Broadcasting system will carry a portion of the program from 10:30 to 11 p. m. EST.

In the order of their introduction, the speakers during the first hour will be: Mr. Hoover, Hamilton, Mrs. William Henry Hayes, president of the Women's National Republican club, and Gov. Ralph L. Carr, of Colorado.

**Second Hour Speakers.** The second hour speakers will be: Gov. Julius P. Hill, of Wisconsin; Gov. Harlan H. Bushfield, of South Dakota; Gov. Frank D. Fitzgerald, of Michigan; Senator Alexander Wiley, of Wisconsin; Gov. Raymond E. Baldwin, of Connecticut, and the Rev. Dr. Joseph R. Simon, pastor of the Collegiate Reformed Church of St. Nicholas.

Twenty members of the national Republican committee and more than a score of congressmen were made reservations.

Hamilton said all the speakers would sound the dinner's theme "Victory through unity in 1940." His speech and Mr. Hoover's will emphasize the national standpoint.

**Hope Abandoned for 5 Men Aboard Plane**  
JUNEAU, Alaska, Feb. 13 (U.P.)—Hope was virtually abandoned today for five men missing nearly 24 hours in a Marine Airways plane on a flight from Ketchikan to a snowstorm and the treacherous ice-filled "inside passage" hampered search by air and sea.

The plane was believed down within 20 miles of Juneau but a dreaded "black wind" was blowing off the glacier where Juneau's winter weather is born and it was feared a northeastern blizzard had struck the craft. Only one chance in 10 was held of finding any survivors.

The pontoon-equipped plane was piloted by Lou Cove.

## BIDS ON LIBRARY OPENED TONIGHT

Final step in assuring Twin Falls of an adequate public library will be taken here tonight as members of the city council meet to accept bids for construction of the building.

The bids will come in two divisions. It was announced this afternoon by City Clerk W. H. Edridge. The first group will embrace general contract bids including electric wiring while the second group will cover plumbing and heating. Actual construction of the building is expected to get underway this week.

Edridge said that approximately \$45,000 is available for the work. The city's \$27,500 portion of the necessary funds is deposited in the Twin Falls Bank and Trust company at the present time and the first installment of the federal government's \$22,500, under the PWA, will be received as soon as the contract is awarded. The city's share in the construction, estimated to cost a total of \$50,000, was raised by a bond election.

Nearly 100 interested persons are expected to crowd the city hall tonight as the bids are opened at 7:30 p. m.

## MAN ACCUSED OF WOODHOODISM RITES

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 13 (U.P.)—A South Philadelphia tailor accused by a Sunday Times reporter of being a "black" member of an alleged woodhoodism insurance syndicate, once practiced the mystic rites of woodhoodism and witchcraft, detectives said today.

Tracing the fantastic and bizarre rituals of the rite which authorities believe caused the deaths of 10 to 12 persons for \$50,000 to \$100,000 insurance, police reported that Phil Petrella, 45, married, had been a member of the "black" and the casting of "spells." At least three deaths occurred in the families of these friends after they were "maginated," according to authorities.

Petrella has been held without bail in the grand jury in connection with the investigation. Two women and a man cousin of Petrella have been charged with homicide and conspiracy in the deaths of three men and a youth, all heavily insured.

Brought from Sing Sing, where he is serving a 20-year term for the slaying of his sweetheart, John Caspary, 26, a nephew of Petrella, had been a member of the "black" and had "tried to send me to the electric chair—I'm sure of it now—because I knew too much."

**DEATH TO TRAITORS.** SHANGHAI, Feb. 13 (U.P.)—A large force of armed Chinese raided the Italian police station in the western part of Shanghai today, fired shots in the air and scattered pamphlets warning that "the Chinese and Japanese anti-traitor iron and blood corps" intended to exterminate all traitors. ## Tax Collections, Police Division Approval Looms

BOISE, Feb. 13 (U.P.)—Republican majority leaders lined up their forces in the Idaho senate today in caucus for quick passage of two administration measures which would create a division of state police and consolidate all tax collection agencies in the hands of the tax commissioner.

Abraham Lincoln memorial services, the passage of nine minor bills and a resolution took up the time of representatives in the house. The senate will conduct Lincoln memorial services after the noon recess.

**Two Measures.** Gov. C. A. Bottolfsen was conducted to the house chambers where the memorial services were held. Rep. Silas Wright, R., Boise, paid tribute to Lincoln and asserted "the American nation never will be trampled upon by Fascist elements."

The two administration measures were scheduled to come up for senate consideration later in the day and were expected to pass. Both were requested by Gov. Bottolfsen in his opening message to the legislature.

The tax collection agency bill would place administration of the beer, mail, motor vehicle and other tax agencies of the department of law enforcement in the hands of the tax commissioner.

State Auditor Calvin Wright would be deprived of his duties as secretary of the state board of equalization. And his duties turned over to the tax commissioner under terms of the bill.

The state police bill would create a separate department of police in the department of law enforcement. The bill would transfer the duties of state police officers.

**Threaten to Override.** The house threatened to override the governor's veto of a bill that would allow the city of Lewiston to increase its tax levy when a substitute measure was introduced by the governor was passed, \$1 to 1 by the lower house.

The governor vetoed an earlier bill on Sunday night. It was petitioned by Lewiston citizens against it. Rep. H. O. Bailey, D., Nez Perce county, said the city officials of Lewiston would be in support of the measure.

Introduced in the senate was a bill proposed by Sen. Fred Reynolds, D., Camanche county, which would bar married men or women from working for the state, county or city, if their names also were employed in private industry.

**Italy United Press.** Rome, Feb. 13 (U.P.)—The Italian cabinet, headed by Benito Mussolini, was announced today. The cabinet would lead four cabinet members, including several Central American ports, were recalled to Italy today.

## Bellevue Favors

### New Water Plan

BELLEVUE, Feb. 13 (Special)—Plans for a new water system to cost approximately \$55,000, of which Bellevue will pay about \$18,000, were approved by the Bellevue city council last week.

Conroy Gillette, city attorney, was authorized by the council to take the necessary steps toward holding an immediate special election which will call for a bond issue of \$20,000 to be amortized over a 20 year period.

Under the proposed plans the city will expend about \$18,000 which will be used in conjunction with the WPA. Since labor will be the principal cost of the project, the WPA will contribute \$37,000 towards the construction of the new system.

The remaining \$8,000 of the bond issue will be used to retire six percent interest bearing bonds now outstanding. These will be refunded at a lower rate of interest and extended maturity dates. The present bonds are due in 1942.

If the bond issue is approved by Bellevue taxpayers the water system will include a new concrete main and covered pipes at the springs in Muldoon gulch east of the city and new concrete and transite water mains from the springs to the settling tank and on down to the intersection of Main and Pine streets.

All present pipes within the city will be replaced with either 4- or 6-inch transite pipes. The proposed system will deliver enough water for persons and for sprinkling and fire fighting purposes.

Tentative plans have met with the unofficial approval of W. B. Leonard and E. D. Bovey of the state health service.

Mayor H. J. Martin said "This is a vitally important project and calls for the full support of the community to insure being able to take advantage of this wonderful opportunity of obtaining federal aid."

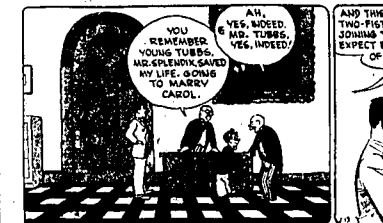

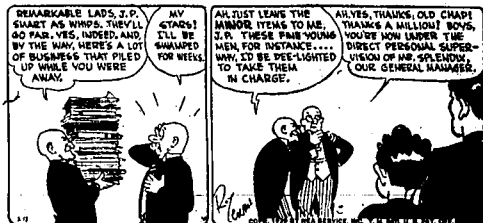
