## 25 INJURED

### Idaho Demos Claim GOP Throwing State into Debt

#### BITTER DEBATES ENLIVEN ISSUES IN LEGISLATURE

BOISE, Feb. 25 (UP)—The Republican majority is throwing the state \$1,000,000 into debt to put into effect a false economy and tax reduction program, Democratic Leader F. M. Binkley charged on the floor of the house of representatives today.

Party leaders tangled in a bitter debate over a measure to authorize issuance of treasury notes totaling \$1,000,000 for use of the state highway fund introduced with administration support.

Democrats charged the measure was a makeshift to take care of the deficit in highway department funds caused by loss of revenue when the automobile license fee on pleasure cars was reduced to \$1.25.

"You Republicans urged economy in every department, reduced auto license fees, and made a grandstand play to the public to convince them you were doing great things," Binkley said.

#### Death Takes U. S. Envoy In Germany

BERLIN, Feb. 25 (UP)—Prentiss B. Gilbert, charge d'affaires of the American Embassy, died suddenly last night of a heart ailment.

Gilbert had had a distinguished career. He was the first man to represent the United States in the League of Nations council.

Gilbert was 55. He was a native of Rochester, N. Y. His father was a prominent lawyer.

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#### PRESIDENT URGES LABOR HEADS TO JOIN PEACE PACT

MIAMI, Fla., Feb. 25 (UP)—President Roosevelt in urgent letters today asked the heads of the American Federation of Labor and the Congress of Industrial Organizations, to appoint immediately committees to negotiate a peace agreement in labor's three-year-old civil war.

The temporary White House office here made public letters to AFL President William Green and CIO President John L. Lewis in which Mr. Roosevelt urged the two unions for asking settlement of the dispute.

"First, because it is right," Roosevelt wrote to Mr. Green.

"Second, because the responsible officers from both groups seem to me to be ready and capable of making a negotiated peace."

"Third, because your membership ardently desire peace and unity for the better ordering of their responsible life in the trade unions and in their communities."

"Fourth, because the government of the United States and the people of America believe it to be a wise and almost necessary step for the further development of the cooperation between free men in a democratic society such as ours."

Mr. Roosevelt told the rival labor chieftains that he was "sure that results can be achieved if the parties can be brought together with open minds and a clean intention to effect genuine peace and harmony in the labor movement."

Would Negotiate  
One sentence of Mr. Roosevelt's letter indicated that he personally might be willing to mediate the struggle if it became necessary.

He said that "whatever assistance in the government can give you in this matter, will be gladly given."

"I wish to reiterate the sincerity of my belief in labor's capacity to reach a peaceful settlement of the dispute."

He said that the intention of the wage earners of America to play their part along with all other groups in our community in creating a better life for all is a noble and laudable one.

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## 25 ARE HURT IN TWIN FALLS TRAIN WRECK

**(From Page One)**  
Pullman occupants here retired for the night and some of the injured had to be pulled from their berths and carried out by ambulance attendants and doctors summoned from Laramie and by townfolk aroused by noise.

Four persons reached the scene of the wreck in night clothes attempting to administer to the injured, whose cries from within the wrecked car attracted attention. The injured were placed in the Laramie ambulances and carried to hospitals there. The less seriously hurt were taken aboard a train immediately behind the wrecked one. This train then detoured around the wrecked car and continued toward Salt Lake City, Utah, the next city on the main line west. Five of the injured persons were taken out for treatment at Ravalli, Wyo. 100 miles west of Bozeman. Hospital attendants said this group suffered only minor injuries.

Mostly from Des Moines

The greatest number of injured were from Des Moines. Employees of the Pullman car company had chartered two Pullman cars to trip to San Francisco and the Chicago Great Western's expedition, Jager and his wife were along as chaperones.

In all the train pulled 16 coaches. The wrecked car, railroad officials said, included six fully occupied observation cars, two first class, two Pullman and the diner.

H. O. Fitch, 45, of Detroit, Mich., who was in one of the coaches overturned, said he was playing bridge with three other passengers when the car began to vibrate. He was treated for cuts and bruises.

Turn Back for Aid

"I suddenly felt everything go over," he said, "and I tried to grab onto something. When I grabbed my companion, I saw the badly crushed body of another person, but I knew I was all right."

The main part of the train was halted as soon as it was possible to stop and trainmen and passengers from it ran back to aid the injured.

Hospitals at Laramie were crowded but city officials said the injured were being given adequate attention.

## BALL PARK CLAIM SUIT SENT BACK

Formal order of the Idaho supreme court, received and filed here today, issued a mandamus to district court to hold "further proceedings in the \$489.94 claim by E. E. Gibbs against the defunct Twin Falls Athletic association, Ltd.

The high bench Thursday reversed a district court order on appeal of Mr. Gibbs. The appeal named the trustees of the defunct association—John N. Cahn, John B. White and C. J. Hagar.

Mr. Gibbs, whose bid for purchase of the historic old ball park on Second avenue south was accepted by trustees and then disallowed by Judge J. W. Porter in calling for public bids, seeks the \$489.94 as interest on funds he posted for the sale, as attorney fees in district court and appeal action, and as costs of other procedure.

He asked \$51.34 as interest on his \$1,000 down payment, and \$75 interest on an additional \$3,000 impounded by the court to come with his contract of purchase. Attorney fees are \$100 for the action here and \$125 on appeal.

**Sold to Congriff**  
The ball park was sold to the Congriff Outdoor Advertising company for \$5,000 after new bids were called for. That sum was higher than Gibbs' original offer.

Justice William M. Morgan wrote the opinion which reversed the district court order which rejected the creditor's claim.

## PRINTER WINS IN SUIT OVER WAGE

Because the district court here found it could not place reliance on a worker's time book as a basis for suit over wages he claims are due him, H. L. Clark won a victory today in a memorandum decision by Judge J. W. Porter.

The decision favored Clark and Security Building and Loan Association, Billings, Mont., over Paul J. Dauven, who had sued the local printer for \$124 and suit expenses. Dauven had worked for J. J. Dauven, contractor hired by Clark to remodel the basement at 509 Main avenue west.

"The workman's suit, filed Dec. 2, 1937, was dismissed by the court because the contractor had not paid him and that the owner could not be held liable for the contractor's failure to pay him. Judge Porter's memorandum decision, pointing out that 'no reliance can be placed' on Dauven's time book assertedly showing the hours he worked, also found that the plaintiff in his claim of labor lien 'willfully and knowingly grossly exaggerated the number of days worked and the amount due.' The decision also found that 'such an exaggeration of claims were not made in good faith.'"

The jurist also pointed out that the "preponderance of evidence" indicates Dauven's lien was not filed within the statutory time.
