

REPORTS OF GERMAN TROOP MOVEMENTS STIR EUROPE

NAZI SPOKESMEN DENY MANEUVERS ON POLE BORDER

BERLIN, April 8 (U.P.)—Reports of small scale German troop movements in East Prussia, as well as between Berlin and the Polish border, were credited by reliable observers today although an official spokesman denied them and asserted that there was "nothing sinister" about them.

The purpose of the troop movements was not clear—whether they were intended to put pressure on Col. Josef Poleski for his military return to Warsaw from London or for some other purpose.

But certainly in the view of observers their limited extent indicated they were not aggressive in the nature of them.

Troops Concentrated

According to the best authenticated reports in the last few days there had been considerable concentration of troops in the southwestern corner of East Prussia.

Simultaneously the old rich garbion on the Polish border had been concentrated in the southwestern corner of East Prussia.

Hitherto, however, all movements have been on a small scale whereas observers held that any intent to attack Poland would require large concentrations involving country-wide shifts, and at least several of those.

Whether troops seen on the march near Berlin yesterday were part of a new movement or were actually returning to their garrisons from Czech areas was unknown.

Strategic Footnote

Observers believed that if Germany had aggressive plans as an answer to "entrenchment," critical days would come between the 12th of April, when large numbers of German leave men return to their divisions, and the 20th. On the 20th it was estimated that five divisions of the Wehrmacht would converge on Adolf Hitler's 50th birthday parade, offering an excellent screen for large scale movement.

Observers believed that Italy's occupation of Albania would give Italy a strategic foothold in the mountainous, pre-occupied Jugoslavia and Greece and keep those countries from joining in a "stop Hitler" bloc.
