ALASKA SEEN AS REFUGEE HAVEN

WASHINGTON, April 13 (UP).

Interior department experts in a report to Secretary Harold I. Ickes today intimated strongly that they believe that Alaska will be a haven for European refugees, greatly would aid development of the territory.

The report although not reflecting specifically on proposals that Alaska be admitted as such a haven, was compiled to furnish information on development prospects after more inquiries had been made as to the possibility of settlement of Alaska by European Jews and other political refugees.

Alaska now is hampered by lack of money and capital. It added that "settlement projects planned and based upon adequate financing might conceivably benefit Alaska to development of new industries upon resources now being wasted."

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IDAHO SENATOR WARNS STUDENTS ON IMPERIALISM

WASHINGTON, April 13 (UP)—Sen. William E. Borah, R., Ida., denounced European democracies as treaty spoilsman today and advised youth that any war emanating from the issues of the current crisis would be "sordid and imperialistic."

Borah expressed his views in a letter to students of St. Olaf college of Northfield, Minn., who had asked the advice of the veteran isolationist and member of the senate foreign relations committee because of "the growing war menace."

Borah said the tide in any war would not involve the question of democracy or imperialism. He contended the European nations were all alike in their dealings in international affairs.

"It was the democracies of Europe which won the great treaties by which all the spoils were divided even before the (World) war was closed," Borah said. "It was the democracies of Europe which won the Versailles treaty, not a peace treaty, but a spoils treaty. It was the democracies which for 20 odd years refused to make any change in the Versailles treaty looking toward peace."

"The European powers, whatever may be their idea of sociology or political views, pursue one and the same course when they come to deal with international affairs. They all alike violate treaties, disregard the fundamental principles of right, pursue methods which include the use of force and then upon the United States, Canada and other nations to save them from their own intolerable and vicious methods."

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Chamberlain Says Albania Invasion Destroyed Pact

Great Britain and France today publicly warned Europe's dictators that they will fight any military thrust against the independence of the Balkans or the status quo in the Mediterranean.

Sternly charging Italy with disregarding the 1938 British-Italian friendship treaty by a "suspicious" Fascist invasion of Albania, Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain told the house of commons that:

Great Britain will fight with all of its power to protect Rumania and Greece from aggression.

An Italian plan to attack the Greek island of Corfu had been blocked only by quick and forceful British action to come.

The British pledges of assistance against aggression—now extended to Poland, Greece and Rumania—were being communicated to those and other countries in the path of totalitarian aggression, especially Turkey, which is closely linked to Greece.

At the same time, Premier Chamberlain declared the same pledges to Greece and Rumania on behalf of France and announced joint action.

He said the two nations would go to each others aid immediately to oppose any direct threat to vital interests.

Draw New Line

The declaration by the two powers, whose fleets are at-sea, posed a new line in the Mediterranean, where armed forces are being rapidly strengthened and a new line of defense is being drawn.

The British and French declarations were echoed through Europe by a sudden increase of tension along the frontiers of the totalitarian bloc and even in the United States, where the veteran Sen. William E. Borah, R., said, as a "treason" any attempt to involve the American people in a European war.

In Europe, the partnership of Germany and Italy kept up a running fire at both ends of their axis with threats to the Greek and Yugoslav partner, Gen. Francisco Franco of Spain.


CABINET MEMBER GETS BACKING IN FIGHT FOR POST

JEROME CHARTS CLEAN-UP DRIVE

JEROME, April 13 (Special)—In accordance with the issuance of a proclamation of clean-up, paint-up and plant-up week by Jerome, Mayor L. M. Zuk, this week, the Junior Chamber of Commerce has completed plans for beautifying the city by removing all refuse from grounds throughout the residential section.

Following several meetings, preparing for the clean-up campaign, it was decided that trucks will be furnished to remove all refuse such as tin cans, cardboard, leaves and other debris which have collected over the winter months and are lying about making an unsightly scene.

According to Frank Titus, chairman of the clean-up committee, a schedule has been announced when trucks will be around in various sections of the city to collect all debris. The only cooperation asked from property owners is that they place all such refuse in containers and thus facilitate removal. Cans and such like should be placed in containers out in the alleys or, if there is no alley in the block, citizens are asked to place the refuse in the street near the curb.

The schedule will begin on Monday morning, April 17, and will continue until the following Wednesday, April 26, Sunday excepted. On Monday and Tuesday, April 17 and 18, trucks will pick up in the southeast part of town; Wednesday and Thursday, northeast part; Friday and Saturday, southwest part; and on the following Monday and Tuesday, refuse will be picked up in the northwest part of town.

The local Boy Scouts will assist in the project to beautify Jerome.

BIG BATTLESHIPS WILL BE SPEEDY

WASHINGTON, April 13 (UP)—The navy plans to make its two new 45,000 ton battleships speedier than the fastest battleship of cruiser now afloat.

These proposed capital ships, which will be the first to be built by this country to exceed 35,000 tons, will sacrifice potential additional power for speed.

It was learned that earlier plans for arming the 45,000-ton ships with 16-inch guns—two inches larger than those on existing warships—have been abandoned so that virtually the extra tons can be used for equipment to increase the motive power.

Requests for money to build the new ships have been submitted to congress.

AAA FLAX RULE HELPS FARMERS

The way was cleared today for south central farmers to grow flax this season without penalty on their soil-depleting allotment.

Compliance with three provisions outlined here today will make flax a non-depleting crop as far as 1939 classification is concerned, although actually it is a depleting crop. The move was taken by A. A. A. flax is a crop which yields a profitable cash return to growers.

No Effect on Payment

In Twin Falls county farmers agree with the provisions, their flax acreage will have no effect on their soil conservation payment, according to Ray W. Lincoln, secretary of the county agricultural conservation association.

The provisions are these:

1. That it be mulched after to acre with an established stand of legumes or grasses. This is applicable to all of Idaho.
2. That it be planted in a strip crop with an established stand of legumes or grasses. This is applicable to all counties north of the Salmon river and irrigated lands of southern Idaho.
3. Where practical, that it be followed in 1940 after flax harvest with an established stand of legumes or grasses of the same acreage. This is applicable to irrigated lands only.

The state committee has emphasized that the accompanying stand of legumes and grasses must be good enough to be considered "established" or the flax will be judged soil-depleting, and will be counted against the soil-depleting allotment and the conservation payments, Lincoln said.



GAINS NOTED IN STORAGE WATERS

Substantial gains in water for irrigation were noted today in the three principal reservoirs serving this section of Idaho, a report sent to the Twin Falls Canal company by Lynn Crandell, watermaster, above.

Jackson lake at the present time shows a reading of 565,440 acre feet against 558,370 a week ago. Likewise American falls reservoir shows 1,066,000 acre feet of water stored at the present time against the reading of 1,062,560 a week ago and Lake Valerius is now storing 81,200 acre feet against 75,420 last week.

Precipitation during the past week, the report shows, included .93 of an inch at Moran. Snow depth at Island Park is now 33 inches with a water content of 13 inches. Other snow depths reported include Moran 21 inches, Snake river 40 inches, Bannock 24 inches, Teton 22 inches, and Cottonwood lake 33 inches. Water content of the snow at Teton pass is listed at 28.6 inches.

In an addition to the report Crandell issued the following statement regarding the water outlook: "The water outlook for the 1939 irrigation season has deteriorated considerably during the past month, due to deficient precipitation. On the projected basis Jackson lake, which furnishes 80 per cent of the river runoff, the snow on April 1 was generally the least it has been on in the date since systematic measurements began in 1926.

Run-Off May Drop
At the highest elevation station, however, the snow now is about the same or slightly greater than in 1937, which was the lowest runoff of the past three years. It now appears likely that, unless heavy spring rains occur, the flood runoff as well as the summer natural flow will be less than it has been for the past three years although it may be as great as in 1937."


