

ARMY DESERTERS TO FIGHT EXTRADITION TO OREGON

ACTION PLANNED TO HALT RETURN OF 5 TO COAST

BOISE, April 19 (U.S.)—Edward Klaus, 24, and Vern Jensen, 24, alleged San Francisco army deserters, and members of a gang charged with a little crime march through four western states, today indicated through their attorney, Ed Rosenheim, Boise, they would fight extradition.

The men said they would resist their return in signing waivers of extradition to Portland and demand a hearing. Rosenheim examined the telegraphic warrants charging the men with assault and armed robbery in Multnomah county and said he would take immediate legal steps.

Girls Plan Similar Action
The action was expected to halt return of the men to the coast city. Meanwhile, the girls who accompanied the men on their mad dash, Edna Malpino, 18, Cleone Alvay, 17, and Jewell Smith, 17, all of San Francisco, were expected to take similar action.

Sheriff Don Hendrick was in Portland where he flew yesterday with Donald Bailey, 27, leader of the sextette, who was hurried there to receive treatment for an infected arm and shoulder.

Arm Shattered
A soft-nosed bullet struck his upper arm, shattered it and splattered lead through his shoulder. It did not receive proper treatment during the four days the gang eluded authorities and may have to be amputated.

Klaus and Jensen said they signed the extradition waivers to secure removal of Bailey to Portland so he could get medical aid and added that now that he had received that aid, they would demand "justice."

An extradition hearing before Gov. C. A. Bottelstein probably will result. Anticipating such a move, Portland authorities already have prepared extradition papers.

WILSON IN LOVE

AND AT WAR

From Ida M. Farbell's autobiography: "All in the Day's Work" (Macmillan: \$3.50); the story of a famous journalist's recollections, 1887-1938.

Times grew blacker. The day when we would go to war seemed always nearer to me. In February of 1916 my depression was deepened by hearing Mr. Wilson admit it. My friends, Secretary and Mrs. Daniels, had been so anxious to include me among their guests at the cabinet dinner they were giving in honor of the President and the new Mrs. Wilson.

At the dinner table the President was gay, telling stories, quoting literature. Later, when it came my turn to talk to him and I told him how charming I had found Mrs. Wilson's situation and lively, he rather eagerly fell to talking of her, and to my amazed delight, of the difficulties of coming early when each time he calls the house is surrounded by secret service men!

Dropping his gaiety, he told me a little of the situation at the moment. "I never got to bed without realizing that I may be called up by news that will mean that we are at war. Before tomorrow morning we may be at war. It is harder because the reports that come to us must be kept secret. Hadst action, information might plunge us into a dangerous situation when a little care would entirely change the face of things. My great duty is not to see red."

I carried away from that dinner a feeling of the tremendous difficulty of the tremendous responsibility which we lived and of a man that had steeled himself to see us through.

Desperadoes Tired of Army, so Decided to Quit San Francisco

BOISE, April 19 (U.S.)—Three desperadoes, who terrorized Portland police in a mad career of crime, broke their silence to give the first interviews outlining their version of their escapades.

They gave the interviews to Jay Rosenheim, reporter for the Boise Capital News, after maintaining a stubborn silence for 20 hours since their capture. Donald Bailey, 27, who is now in Portland, acted as spokesman for Edward Klaus, 24, and Vern Jensen, 24, other members of the bandit trio.

"We're not desperate," Bailey said. "We did the same thing that any person could do in our position. We knew that by leading the kind of life we had been for the past

week or so we couldn't help but run up against the law some place. We realized we must get caught, but as long as we were free and could use our arm to hurt me so damned bad, we intended to keep on doing it."

Shattered Arm
Bailey suffered a shattered arm in a gun battle with Portland police. He was returned to Portland last night by airplane to receive medical attention on his arm.

"About the only charges they have against us is army deserting and that affair in Portland. I'm a little worried about that. I can't care about the rest of it."

"We haven't committed a lot of crimes in San Francisco. All three

of us have always lived in the bay region and we were tired of the army so we decided to leave town. We got the car and later picked up the girls. The girls are not from San Francisco as you think they are but we would rather not let anyone know where their homes are."

"We didn't know for sure where we were going, except that we had planned to go to complete in the middle west area, try to get some work."

"When we got to Portland, we were spotted by a cop. He started to chase us, but we saw him there and got out to the edge of town."

"While we were sitting there in the car, another cop in a car came up to us and drove in front of our

DOCTORS PONDER ARM AMPUTATION

PORTLAND, April 19 (U.S.)—Physicians today considered amputation of an operation to save the left arm of Donald Bailey, 27, leader of a gang of army deserters, and their school companions, captured in Boise, at the end of a week-long crime career.

Bailey's arm was shattered by a bullet in a gun battle with Portland police men outside Boise and was flown here from Boise, Idaho.

Physicians at Multnomah county hospital said the bullet had sent lead splinters into Bailey's shoulder and that infection had set in. The wound was given only cursory treatment as the gang fled from Oregon into Washington and then to Idaho.

Other members of the gang remained in Boise where they also signed extradition papers for removal to Portland on charges of Main act violation taking a stolen car across a state line and assault and robbery.

Their Boise attorneys, however, was reported to have announced the main members of the gang might resist the extradition warrants and their removal.

Nazi Leader will Demand "Economic Living Space"

BERLIN, April 19 (Special)—Hitler intends to demand "economic living space" for Germany in his speech to the Nazi reichstag April 28 replying to President Roosevelt's appeal for peace. It was reported today.

Doubt was expressed that Hitler would ask the United States for trade concessions as the price of German participation in any peace program.

Nevertheless it was suggested that in demanding economic living space, Hitler might call attention to his recent statement that Germany must expect of slave labor, he might emphasize what Nazis say is Germany's insupportable national debt in domestic central and eastern Europe economically and politically, and might take occasion to demand free access to vital raw materials colonies.

Life and Death
Nazis say to critics of their "expansionist" program that the need for "economic living space" is increasingly a matter of life or death.

They hold that the trade bid is a challenge to Germany in countries which should be left to Germany economically.

Celebrations Start
Chikoro Gufencu, Rumanian foreign minister, continued his talks today with Joachim von Ribbentrop, foreign minister, as the result of which Germany hopes to win Rumania from the "peace front" on to Paris and London, after remaining for Hitler's 50th birthday celebration tomorrow.

American's national parks are providing one of the biggest increases in travel. In 1938, the all-high total of 16,233,688 national park visitors in 1938, 95 per cent came by auto. The survey indicates an increase this year.
