# YOUTH-HOSTELS WILL NOT ITALY

ROME (U.P.)—Youth, which is emphasized in Fascist Italy, will soon have its own chain of road-side inns to encourage hiking and long walking trips.

Following the examples of Germany, France and England, the Italian government has decided to construct a series of youth hostels at intervals of 60 miles throughout the peninsula. They will be along the principal roads leading to Rome from the Brenner and Ventimiglia to Milan from Genoa.

The first hostels will be opened in conjunction with the World's exposition in 1942. The promoter is Antonio Pessina and his organization is to be known as the "Albergo Italiano per la Gioventu". A later development of the organization, according to its promoter, would call for 70 roadside inns, situated at a distance of about 20 miles from one another so as to permit boys and girls to cover longer distances on foot. Pessina says this "would be more hygienic and cost very little."

He has studied youth hostels in Germany and France and has been impressed by their obvious advantages. He is determined that Italian youth shall benefit in the same way.

In reality tourists of all ages and nationalities will be the chief beneficiaries along with Italian boys and girls. Nazi Germany, it is learned, has promised to send from 5,000 to 10,000 young people to Italy annually when the hostels have been completed.

In Europe at present there are a total of 6,000 such inns, of which Germany alone has 2,500. At the last "All-Work Congress" in Rome, 40 nations expressed the hope that youth hostels might soon be as much a tourist feature in Italy as they are in other countries.

## HIGHLIGHTS FROM LATEST BOOKS

### WHEN RAILROADS MADE MONEY

This is how George R. Leighton describes the building of the Union Pacific in the story "Five Cities" (Harcourt, \$3.50). This is a biography of a railroad, the 100 years as it happened in Omaha, Nebraska; Louisville, Birmingham and Seattle.

On the last of May, 1889, they met at Promontory Point, Utah, and on the 10th "in a flat valley, bare except for the sage brush and a spring of scrub oaks, with the uninvited world, save the circling buzzards, shut out," the final ceremony occurred.

Promoters of the two roads eyed each other, already getting set for the race that was to follow. The Union Pacific, and finally came the single word: "Done!" The transcontinental railroad was completed.

Within an hour, over the champagne, Leland Stanford was cursing the federal government for not making more generous grants. The subsidy for 30-year government loan, \$16,000 to \$48,000 a mile and 20 million acres of land, in less than six years he and his partner made a profit of more than 500 per cent on an investment of a million dollars.

This incredible work, this gigantic project that had thrilled the world and represented the effort of thousands, was the product of a man of vision, a man of an army of unknown men, in heat and cold and hunger and violent death, had led them through the desert and the mountains. And the work of the railroad—the Central Pacific—was soon to become a part of the nation's life. And the work of the Union Pacific—was for a generation to be a word for plunder, rapacity and ruth.

HOLLYWOOD—The honeymoon is over. Clark Gable has gone back to his task of making love scenes with Vivien Leigh, and Carole Lombard is putting around the Elnora house in the role of a ranch wife, now having a picture to do just yet.

But now that it's all over, maybe you'd like to know something of what happened on the day of the co-starting marriage, because it shows just how and why movie weddings are planned as they are.

Gable, who has been married many times on the screen, had been coached about what to do. At that, he stuttered on his first line. Miss Lombard cried, but responded clearly.

Most movie couples skip out of the state to avoid the California law requiring the previous filing of intention to wed. Of course, everybody knew the eventual intentions of Mr. Gable and Miss Lombard, but you can imagine what would have followed any formal statement—they would have been persecuted unmercifully.

Press Agent Worked in Reverse

As it was, nobody else knew of their definite plan except a mutual intimate friend—Otto Winkler, Metro publicist and former newspaper writer. They drove to his house at sun-up one morning, left Gable's car in his garage and walked to Arizona in Winkler's coupe.

Gable wore whipcord slacks, an old brown jacket, a green hat and white, opaque glasses. When stops were made for gasoline, he'd keep a hand on his forehead like a man with a headache.

Miss Lombard wore a very plain brown suit, no trace of makeup, and had her hair tight to her head. Their luggage contained fresh clothing for the ceremony.

Gable had bought a cottage for the bride but had been thoughtful in selecting one that did not look too bridal, lest the Hollywood flirts guess what was happening. What Gable hadn't considered was what a crowd would look on the drive.

Bride Made Sandwiches

Neither had brought any food. Just before starting, Winkler added his own refrigerator and brought out some remnants of turkey and a loaf of bread. That was all they had to eat on the long drive.

Miss Lombard sat in the middle and made sandwiches. They escaped recognition, however, differently except at the state line, where the Arizona agricultural inspector had to look through the car. That gave them some anxious minutes.

Picture people often are criticized for these furtive, hasty marriages, which improperly are called "elopements." Sentimentalists wonder why they don't prefer more formal ceremonies, with a religious minister, flowers and all the trimmings.

Trouble is, though, that no stars can be married in Hollywood merely as a couple of people in love. With the mobs, cops and photographers, the occasion becomes a cross between a carnival and a riot in Union Square.

And, too often, Hollywood bigwigs themselves help to make such a wedding a gash, noisy affair that brings lives from those of us who write about such things.

Complete with Music

Carole and Clark adopted Yuma because it has become something of a marriage hub. They went by motorcade, and were married by minister in a Methodist church, complete with wedding march from a pit-size organ pumped and played by the preacher's wife.

When they went to the courthouse to get the license, the young woman

clerk was so excited that she splashed ink on the ledger page. Since this occurred in mid-afternoon, Winkler avoided the possibility of a tip-off by inviting the clerk to the wedding.

They all went to the house of the Rev. Kenneth Engle and talked for two hours with his pretty wife before he came home loaded with groceries.


