# ROAD WIDENING MAY BE ABANDONED EXCEPT IN BUHL AREA

## HIGHWAY NO. 30 WORK INDEFINITE FOR THIS SEASON

Continuation of widening work in connection with highway No. 30 through Twin Falls county was indefinite today and the possibility was seen that the project might have to be abandoned except in the Buhl area, at least through the summer months.

State highway officials said that work will start Tuesday on widening operations between Hansen and Kimberly but added that status of the work thereafter was not known at this time.

**Three Weeks Work**  
In the final budgeting stage, work to be done during these three weeks will be of at least two small bridges. That district is meeting its share of expense under terms of an arrangement between it and the state. Whether or not this work will be finished after the Hansen-Kimberly stretch is not known.

In the case of widening operations in the area beyond the Hansen-Kimberly stretch, the district officials it is understood have agreed not to advance the agreed \$1000 per mile state aid until the work is completed in each instance and the road is opened.

**No Funds Available**  
In the case of the highway district no funds are available to meet share of the expense, it is understood.

State highway officials today expressed the opinion that work would eventually be completed but added that the possibility of a summer let down was probable. It was pointed out that the state highway department was likewise having financial difficulties which may not permit the work to proceed unless a share of the expense is met before hand by the highway district involved.

## BOTT PROCLAIMS IDAHO JOBS WEEK

Statewide observance of the American Legion's national employment week has been decreed by Governor C. A. Bottolfsen, officials of the Twin Falls post—who issued first announcement of the week yesterday—were advised this afternoon.

The Twin Falls post is calling on local citizens to give mention to the employment week in public Sunday. The week starts April 30 and extends through May 6. Twin Falls employers will be asked to cooperate in utilizing the state employment office here, through the Legion work.

**Legion Work**  
Governor Bottolfsen's proclamation as received by Charles Russell, chairman here, set April 30 to May 6 national employment week in Idaho and urged all industry to make an effort to place additional persons in employment.

The national government and the governments of the various states bear a major portion of the responsibility which comes with unemployment but the private citizen and private industry should be no less concerned over the problem.

Let Commander R. V. Jones, pointing out background of the national Legion's campaign declared that National Commander Stephen C. Chubbuck feels "the American system is to survive, there must be an end to mass involuntary idleness."

**Would Hit "Subversives"**  
"Unemployment can only be ended in the composite will and concerted action of industry itself," Jones said, the Legion feels that when we can place the bulk of our citizens back into general occupations, we will automatically eliminate recruits for "subversive organizations."

He explained that the Legion is particularly concerned over plight of the worker since age is 30 or more.

## Tennis Netting Brassieres Bring Peace at Exposition

SAN FRANCISCO, April 28 (AP)—Sally Rand put brassieres that looked like they were made of tennis netting on her "nude girl" showgirls at the Golden Gate exposition today and admitted losing round No. 1 in a fight with a source-jaded police captain named John O'Meara.

But round No. 2 and possibly other rounds were coming up. For Sally and other congressional showgirls they wanted a showdown on their demands that fair officials quit interfering with the business of making money.

O'Meara, assigned to "maintain order and decency" at the fair set off the latest squabble between congresswomen and authorities. He demanded more—or at least some—clothes be worn by "nude girls."

Sally closed down her nude ranch and her "Miss America" exhibit but reopened in six hours.

In what passed on a compromise, she had her girls put on the net brassieres and expressed hope such action "will meet the specifications" without driving people away.

At other girl shows, grumbling compliance was forthwith Zerkina, "queen of the nudists," draped some lingerie on her subjects.

"If my girls have to wear these things," she said, "I'm going to demand that the management put brassieres on the statue, too."

**ORPHANS**  
SHOSHONE, April 28 (Special)—Interest centered around about 300 orphans at the local postoffice Sunday noon. Somehow or other they just couldn't get located, and no contact could be reached with the parties most interested, when they arrived here Saturday.

They put up a pretty general claim to the effect that they were hungry, and that was provided for. But after 24 hours had slipped by, Postmaster Cling, after that his regulations permitted no longer occupancy of the office, and after repeated effort to locate those responsible for their arrival and finding, he announced that decision would be reached Sunday noon.

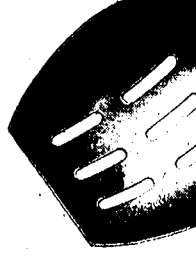

## SALT LAKE GETS CONTROL CENTER

WASHINGTON, April 28 (AP)—The civil aeronautics authority today announced three new aircraft control centers will go into operation May 1 at Salt Lake City, St. Louis, Mo., and Salt Lake City, Utah.

## THREE KILLED IN TRAIN-CAR CRASH

BUCCODA, Wash., April 28 (AP)—An engine's last desperate attempt to avoid a collision with a loaded passenger train, having saved possible heavy loss of life in a train crash, resulted in the deaths of three people and the injury of six others.

Those killed were the engineer, Charles Beatty, Portlana, Wash.; his fireman, Clyde Hendrix, Centralia; and Herman Vollman, Mayfield, Wash. driver of the truck.

The crash occurred on a grade crossing here when a San Francisco-bound Union Pacific passenger train crashed into a heavy truck and trailer loaded with logs for a nearby sawmill.

Beatty and Hendrix were killed when they were pinned by the cab of the engine as it fell onto the truck. Vollman's body was smashed when the train cut his truck in two, spilling parts of it on both sides of the tracks.

The train's engine tender and baggage car were tossed on their sides. The first three passenger cars were derailed. The truck was torn up for 200 yards.

Railway officials said Beatty's split-second action in jumping on all brakes and saving the train, averted greater loss of life and additional injuries to passengers.
