

GARNER URGES EARLY ADJOURNMENT FOR CONGRESS

LEGISLATIVE END SEEN AS BENEFIT TO FDR, NATION

WASHINGTON, May 20 (AP)—A close senate colleague of John N. Garner said today that the vice-president believes an early adjournment of congress would benefit the Democratic party, President Roosevelt and the nation as a whole. Garner believes, his friend said, that continued appropriation of large sums of money by congress is disturbing business.

Fending among senate Democrats also worries him, it was said. He believes that a united front must be maintained for the 1940 presidential election.

Abandons Plan
Garner was represented as desiring to return to his home in Uvalde, Tex., before the session ends, but it was understood, he has abandoned the plan because of the interpretation that it might receive. He left Washington in 1937 in the midst of the senate after the death of Majority Leader Joseph T. Robinson to compromise the warring factions.

An attack of lumbago this spring has caused Garner to diet for the first time in his life, but he has been keeping his office hours regularly from 7 a. m. to 5 p. m. He was represented as feeling that a departure before the session end would be interpreted as an open revolt with President Roosevelt—a development he has sought to discourage even though they disagree on fiscal policies.

Adjournment Gains
Garner has assailed in an envelope his guess on adjournment date. Most senators have set July 16, as a tentative date, but actual adjournment might fall either way according to the moves by leaders during the closing rush.

Rumors of a new spending-lending program, tax legislation and the relief program for 1940, appeared to be the chief obstacles to early adjournment of congress.

Few congressional leaders expect action on neutrality legislation or amendments to the Wagner labor act.

NATIONS PONDER SOVIET ALLIANCE

LONDON, May 20 (AP)—Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain has decided to consult Poland and Rumania at once regarding the advisability of entering an alliance with Russia, it was understood today as Viscount Halifax, foreign secretary, left for Paris and Geneva to conduct negotiations there with French and Russian delegates.

It was intended to conduct several days of intensive negotiations on Russia's role in the British-French "security front." Chamberlain hoped that the cabinet would have sufficient information by Wednesday to make a final decision at its regular weekly meeting there.

Ivan Maisky, Russian ambassador, left for Paris last night on his way to Geneva, to attend the League of Nations council meeting. It was Maisky's plan to consult Jacob Souris, Russian ambassador to Paris, and French leaders.

Halifax left by train this morning, to consult with Premier Edward Daladier and Foreign Minister Georges Bonnet in Paris and to continue on to Geneva for the league meeting which starts Monday.

Despite an apparent deadlock in British-Russian negotiations, spokesmen for both sides admitted now that they expected an agreement in the end.

Wood, appearing in court last Monday, had consented to court issuance of an order for the payments to his wife. Judge Porter took the matter under advisement, and then decreed the \$5 figure for a period of 12 months. Bail was set at \$500 and Wood was released on his own recognizance.

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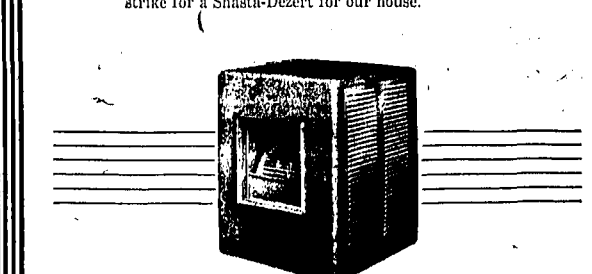

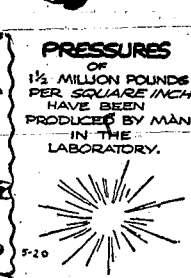
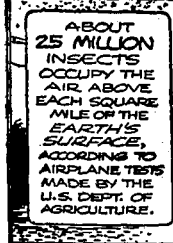
