# Squalus Disaster Spotlights Rescue Genius of U.S. Navy

WASHINGTON, May 30 — The trapped men rescued from the submarine Squalus, 240 feet below Atlantic's surface, mostly have Charles Bowers Momen, lieutenant commander, U. S. N., to thank. For this 43-year-old naval officer has been the outstanding genius in the perfection of submarine rescue devices during the closest years or so the navy department has been working to prevent such wholesale loss of life as occurred in the S-1 and S-4 disasters.

So, when the Squalus sank, Momen flew to the scene, and stood by watching some of his inventions get their first real life-and-death tests. The very divers who descended to the Squalus could work longer, more safely, more comfortably and more efficiently, due to a new breathing misting of helium and oxygen, he devised to replace the plain air that used to be pumped to them.

The Gobs Like Him  
After about a score of years in the navy, much of it in submarines, there's little about the "gobs" that "Squid" Momen, the genius from St. Paul, Minn., doesn't know. At present he is in charge of the experimental diving unit in the Washington navy yard, where developments for submarines are tested out. He has been a sub commander in his time, and it is reported that next year he will be assigned to command a division of them.

Their crews will welcome him, because his reputation as a square shooter is A-1 with the gobs who go down in the sea. Those at the Washington navy yard tell you he never orders anyone to do anything he can't or won't do himself.

Honor for "Lung"  
One time he did it himself, because he refused to let an enlisted man take the risk. That was when he and other navy research men had perfected the new famous "Momen lung"—that little bag of oxygen which, clipped to a man's nose, enables him to rise to the water's surface from great depths.

The only way to test it was to test it. If it worked—well, if it didn't—another name would go on the navy honor roll of dead heroes. Momen gambled his life on the device and won. He also won the Distinguished Service Cross for that little stunt. The citation described the lung as the "greatest single contribution to submarine escape."

Perfection of the great diving chamber, in which the first men rescued from the Squalus were brought up, is credited largely to Momen, although the device, like others, was developed by many researchers.

Sailors are notoriously superstitious. But Commander Momen must be an exception. Because he went down to the ocean's bottom to risk his life testing the rescue lung, in the S-4.

And the S-4 was the ill-fated submarine in which 40 officers and men bag died when it was rammed off Newfoundland. It was later salvaged and used for experimental work.
