#### **Do We Want Parking Meters?**

Twin Falls will do well to think twice before installing downtown parking meters which have been sug-gested as a possible means of solving the traffic prob-lem in the business district. For metropolitan cities,

lem in the business district. For metropolitan cities, parking meters may be the only solution, but for towns the size of Twin Falls, that's different.

It is true that parking meters are used in some other cities, but that does not necessarily mean they meet with public approval or that they were installed without a protest. Installation of such devices invariably brings about immediate objection, and in many instances the reaction has been so pronounced that it became necessary to have the meters removed. Not that the public opposes anything of the kind just because it seems to be something modern, but the natural objection follows the reasoning that everyone should be given equal consideration in the use of public thoroughfares that are constructed and maintained through general taxation.

Those who feel they can afford to pay for parking privileges may not be seriously concerned, but those not so fortunate will probably feel none too kindly toward any such toll-taking devices.

No doubt, parking meters will serve to move automobiles out of parking spaces much faster than if no cost were involved, but such parking spaces are still reserved to those who can afford to "feed the meter." All others will feel obligated to seek parking space farther removed from the shopping district.

This raises the logical question as to what other method may be employed to relieve the situation. There always remains the one alternative—that of enforcing our parking laws instead of adhering to them only periodically.

If it's necessary to restrict parking to even lesser limits, that can be brought about by city ordinance. Strict enforcement of such regulations, day in and day out, would probably accomplish the same purpose without all the trouble and criticism the city would be sure to experience with parking meters.

The addition of another patrolman to the regular police force most likely would be sufficient to keep a careful check of all cars parked in downtown Twin Falls and the cost would probably be less than for parking meters. At least, everyone would have equal parking opportunities under such rigidly enforced restrictions.

It will be soon enough to consider parking meters after we have once made a determined effort to enforce our present regulations. So far, lack of enforcement has been our chief difficulty.

#### **Second American City**

We have become accustomed to think of New York as the first American city, Chicago the second, at least in size.

For Buenos Aires, the beautiful capital city of Argentina, is now the second city of the Western Hemisphere. Its population, which has had a phenomenal growth in recent years, is now 3,304,000 as compared with Chicago's 3,258,444. The two cities are almost the same size geographically since Buenos Aires increased the federal district which marks the city as our own District of Columbia bounds Washington. During the past eight years, Buenos Aires has grown in population by 400,000 while the whole state of Illinois was increasing only 200,000.

All this is simply a visible evidence of the great forward strides that are being made in the more progressive countries of South America, destined to be great empires within this century.

#### Arkansas, Realtor

The state of Arkansas, which owns one of every 16 acres of land within the state, is considered by the American Society of Planning Officials to have adopted land policies which place it in the front rank among the half dozen states which have this problem in ag-

The state has named a land commissioner who will classify the 2,000,000 acres of land, mostly tax-reverted, which belongs to the state. Land suitable for such purposes may be put back into private hands in "family-sized" tracts by sale or outright grant. But some effort will be made not to sell indiscriminately land for this purpose at \$1 an acre only to see it inevitable to the second of the secon ably bounce back on the state for taxes in a year or so. Proceeds from land sales will be used to pay adminis-tration expenses and protect and maintain the remain-

ing lands.


