## RAIL RATE SLASH AID TO DAIRYMEN

Increased consumption of Idaho and Utah butter, eggs, cheese and dressed poultry in the Los Angeles and San Francisco metropolitan areas was "foreseen" here today in an announcement by the Union Pacific of voluntary reduction by the railroads of carload rates on these commodities.

Reductions ranging from six to 30 cents per 100 pounds will become effective June 22, it was announced by Ambrose J. Seitz, assistant traffic manager of the Union Pacific for the Utah and Idaho district.

"As the result of cooperative marketing work with farmers' cooperatives, dairymen's associations, and egg and poultry producers of Idaho and Utah the railroads have agreed to reduce rates as a means of stimulating shipments to Los Angeles and San Francisco and thereby expanding these important markets for the consumption of the butter, cheese, eggs and dressed poultry produced in Utah and Idaho," Mr. Seitz reported.

The reductions average six cents per 100 pounds on 24,000-pound minimum carlots, 13 cents on 30,000-pound shipments, and 18 cents on 48,000-pound shipments.

## 36,000 Farms In Idaho AAA

BOISE, June 15 (UP)—Nearly 36,000 Idaho farms will operate under the 1939 agricultural conservation program, Clifford J. Vaughn, chairman of the Idaho state AAA committee announced today.

Vaughn reported an increase of more than 15 per cent over 1938 in the total number of farms in the program. The total number of farms in the state, according to the 1935 census, was 45,112.

Those signed up represent approximately 88 per cent of the farms in the state on which crop data for recent years has been assembled and involves approximately 87 per cent of crop land covered by AAA work sheets," Vaughn said.

## Egg Recipes for Dairy Month

With Idaho producers and distributors concentrating this month on the production of dairy and poultry products, here are some valuable egg hints and egg recipes.

Copies of a three-page pamphlet containing these hints and many others are available at the business offices of the Evening Times.

**SEVEN EGG EATING EGGS**  
Yolks and whites should be separated while cold, but whites beat better at room temperature.

Do not beat the whites of eggs until ready to use them.

Addition of a small amount of salt makes eggs beat stiffer, and addition of cream of tartar makes whites whiter. Addition of a small amount of water increases the amount. If an egg white has a rather curdled appearance when you beat it, that is, it looks wet and will not beat smooth, add a teaspoon powdered sugar to it and it will beat up smooth and dry.

All additions and flavoring should be put into eggs before beating.

If a few drops of vinegar are added to the water when peaching eggs, they will hold together and will not separate into the water.

Water should not be added for meringues, as it cooks out in bubbles, which baked. Plus topped meringue will cut easily if a little granulated sugar is sprinkled over the meringue just before it is browned in the oven. This makes a very attractive topping, too.

In making waffles, the use of an egg for each person to be served makes a lighter, fluffier waffle.

A slightly beaten egg white and its shell for each quart of soup stock when allowed to cook two minutes and stand 20 minutes will give a clear stock when drained. Coffee may be cleared the same way.

Egg white spread over the bottom crust of a berry pie will prevent weaking.

To give a glaze to hot cross buns or coffee cakes, brush over with beaten egg before baking.

**EGGS IN BACON RINGS**  
Cut strips of bacon to fit in a ring around the inside of muffin tins. Put into a hot oven (400°F) for from 5 to 8 minutes. Reduce the heat to 350°F or a moderate oven and gently slip an egg into each bacon ring. Over each egg put a tablespoon of cream and season with salt and pepper. Bake at 350°F for about 10 minutes longer or until the white of the egg is set. Serve on rounds of buttered toast. Sausage may be used this way also.

**MOLDED EGGS**  
1 to unflavored gelatin  
2 to tomato juice  
1 large slice onion  
1 stalk celery  
4 bay leaves  
6 hard cooked eggs  
salad dressing  
celery leaves or water cress

Put 1/3 c of the tomato juice in a bowl and sprinkle the gelatin over and let stand for 3 minutes. Add the onion, celery cut in small pieces and the bay leaf to the remaining tomato juice and heat to the boiling point. Stir and pour over the softened gelatin, stir until the gelatin is entirely dissolved. Put custard cups or similar molds 1/3 full of the tomato juice mixture and set in a cool place. When it starts to thicken place a hard cooked egg in each mold and cover with the remaining tomato juice. Set in a cool place to become firm.

**SPANISH OMELET**  
8 large eggs, beaten light. Add 1/2 teaspoon baking powder, salt. Place in well buttered pan and cook over slow fire until about 1/3 done.

## Spread Spanish sauce on omelet and roll as you would a jelly roll. Place in medium oven and bake until done. The Spanish sauce is made with onion, salt, chilly pepper, cayenne and tomato juice, thickened by cooking. Serve on toast and add extra sauce to top.

## POTATO NESTS

Put well seasoned mashed potatoes into a baking dish to a depth of an inch or more. Make depressions according to number to be served. Cover spaces between depressions with thinly sliced bacon. Bake until bacon is browned. Remove from oven and drop an uncooked egg into each depression. Season eggs and return to oven and cook until eggs are set. Good way to use left-over mashed potatoes.

**BAKED POTATOES AND EGGS**  
Bake medium sized potatoes until done. Cut in two and remove potatoes from skins. Mash and season with butter, cream, salt and pepper and return to skins. Make depression in center of each half potato and drop an egg in. Return to oven long enough for the eggs to cook.

## SUPPER SCRAMBLED EGGS

Cube of butter.  
Finely chopped onion, fry until onion is tender. Add 3 eggs beaten and seasoned with a dash of thyme, one bay leaf, salt and pepper and a bit of Worcestershire. Add 8 tablespoons of cream and pour into skillet with onions. Delicious with hot biscuits. Makes a good midnight lunch.

# NEW FDR ACTION BECOMES AS ONLY HOPE AGAINST LABOR WAR

## AFL, CIO CHIEFS ABANDON TALKS ON UNION AMITY

WASHINGTON, June 15 (AP)—Further intervention by President Roosevelt in the dispute between the American Federation of Labor and the Congress of Industrial Organizations appeared today to be the only remaining hope for prevention of a more intensified labor war.

Leaders of the AFL and the CIO cast aside the President's peace "with honor" virtually abandoned negotiations for unity, and disputed responsibility for failure of the latest peace talks which have been in recess since April 4.

Neither side said definitely that further peace conferences would not be held, but it was apparent that any would be fruitless unless Mr. Roosevelt and his aides applied strong pressure.

CIO President John L. Lewis made the first move late yesterday when he said the CIO's executive board would peace negotiations with the present federation negotiating committee were "impossible."

## TWO WOMEN ASK DIVORCE DECREES

Two divorce suits — one asserting that the daughter-in-law of a Buhl step-mother, subject of the Buhl mother to indignities — were filed late yesterday in district court.

Mrs. Ruth H. Morrison, Buhl, asked freedom from William R. Morrison, whom she wed Oct. 21, 1927 at Coalinga, she asserted that Morrison built a dwelling near the residence for his son and the latter's wife. She charged her step-son's wife "perpetually" subjected her to indignities.

J. H. Sherford, Buhl, is counsel for Mrs. Morrison.

Mrs. Eunice Denny filed suit against Paul M. Denny, charging extreme cruelty. The pair married here June 27, 1938. The wife asks for division of community holdings which include a dwelling in New Rexford addition, Twin Falls. She informed the court she put several hundred dollars of her money into the community property plus her salary earnings. Her step-son's wife, Ray D. Agee is attorney for the petitioner.

German newspapers, denouncing foreign reports, used such headlines as "Press Fables of Dramatic German Preparations in the East," "British Lies—A World Scandal," "Lies About a German March," and "The Lies About an Invasion." Joseph Goebbels, Nazi propaganda minister, made a speech last night to 10,000 students at the Reichstag in which he urged his listeners to obey and have faith in a strong Nazi leadership.

## LENIENCY ASKED FOR BUIH YOUTH

With an Emmett Clegman and his congregation aligned on the side of further leniency, hearing will be staged in district court at 10 a. m. Saturday to decide whether or not to grant a parole to Buih, 22, formerly of Buih, must go to prison for parole violation.

The action for revocation of parole will be the second initiated against Asher by Prosecutor Evered. The first time Judge Porter rejected the move but lengthened the parole period and added more drastic allegations.

Request for leniency was directed to Judge Porter in a letter from Rev. C. A. Swanson, Four-square Gospel pastor at Emmett. The letter included a petition signed by 25 residents of Emmett. Rev. Swanson said that he feels "ever since" having faith and confidence in the young man. He said he believes Asher, if given another chance, will prove to you and the rest of us that his life has been changed and that he has a different outlook on life and the life to come.

Willing to Help

The clergyman informed the judge that he and his congregation are willing to help Asher in any way we can.

At Emmett, Asher had been working in hay harvesting.

First move to revoke his parole which was granted him after he was convicted of forging a check for \$100 on Oct. 1, 1937, was based on showing that he was sentenced to 30 days in county jail by Justice R. H. Stewart, Buih, for theft of a pistol from Henderson's residence March 6.

Asher is married, is father of a small son and Mrs. Asher is presently expecting another child.

## George VI and Elizabeth Sail Today to End Tour in America

By WERE MILLER

HALIFAX, N. S., June 15 (AP)—George VI and his smiling queen, Elizabeth, ended their triumphal, 21,700-mile tour of Canada and the United States today.

They will broadcast their farewells and thanks to the Americas by radio this afternoon, and sail tonight for England on the Empress of Britain, tired but pleased over the achievements of their trip.

Before sailing, however, they were having another round of ceremonies at Nova Scotia last of the nine Canadian provinces to receive them, said its respects.

It was the end of a tour on which the king and queen had seen at least 15,000,000 people. It was, for the 42-year-old monarch, who had been elevated to the throne on a few days notice, both a personal and political triumph.

These results of the trip were outstanding:

Canada's loyalty to the crown had been re-inspired.

There was a firmer integration of wealth of nations.

There was a broader comprehension among the American people of Britain's role, under the constitutional monarchy, as a defender of the system of the democracy they cherish.

The essential unity of the British empire had been demonstrated.

Other subsidiary results, some perhaps with equal potential importance in future, include:

Personal Symbols

Incursions by the king—within the limitations of the constitutional monarchy—into the domain of international affairs, as exemplified in his Ottawa and other speeches.

Dramatization of the attractive monarchy.

Notable increase of self-confidence in bearing and the speech of the king, who suffered nervousness all his life and was overshadowed from birth by his brother, the duke of Windsor.

Shattering of the lingering illusion of a small school of opinion (mostly all outside England) that the duke of Windsor could, if he ever wished, alienate sympathies of the people from his successor. This journey has weaned away whatever sentiment there existed for the duke of Windsor.

Talks With FDR

In Washington, the king had a long, confidential talk with President Roosevelt regarding the international situation and Britain's role in it.

Today the royal train went into disarray. Their majesties saw the last of it on the arrival here. Their new home will be the royal residence at Windsor, where they will have two veranda apartments. The press of Australia, on which came from England, it was only the royal party of 9, not a crew.

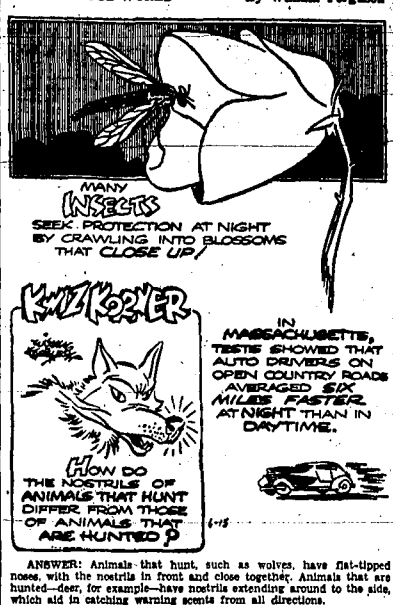

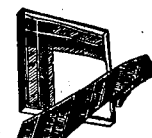

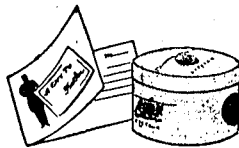
