



# HUSBAND CLAIMS BABY NEGLECTED

Two husbands, one of them a Buhi rancher, filed divorce suits today in district court. In one of the suits the husband accused his wife of neglecting their infant daughter because, he said, she did not want the child.

Rudolph J. Cherniok, jr., brought that claim against Mrs. Luella Cherniok, whom he married June 20, 1935. Buhi at the wife's request, and Mr. Cherniok, who informed the court that he is a deaf mute, owns 110 acres of west end ranch land.

Mr. Cherniok complained that his wife had promised to care for his child, but had not done so. The child is now eight years old. He said she also neglected their own infant, now nine months old. He seeks custody of both and asks decree awarding him all community property. O. C. Hall is attorney for the plaintiff.

Charging desertion for the past eight years, Floyd Ford filed suit against Mrs. Helen Ford, to whom he was married Nov. 15, 1927 at Elko, Nev. He requests that he be given the right to visit a daughter, 8, at the home of her mother, but that his wife retain custody of all other children. W. L. Dunn is attorney for the petitioner.

# BUILDING TOTALS \$56,198 IN JUNE

Construction in Twin Falls during the month of June amounted to \$56,198, it was announced this afternoon by W. H. Eldridge, city clerk, in a report made available for publication.

The report shows that new residential buildings for which building permits were approved during the month period, represented an expenditure of \$51,450 while new non-residential structures came to \$5,748, and additions, alterations and repairs to \$2,000.

Total building expenditure in the city for the first half of the year, from Jan. 1 to June 30, amounted to \$256,260, the report shows.

Total amount expended for construction in June of 1936 came to \$14,800, while in the same month of 1937 it stood at \$24,278. Last month the total expended was \$20,210.

# CHRIST HAILED AS WORLD BULWARK

Declaring that Christ's way is the only way to develop personalities and the individual life, Peter Voronoff, 23-year-old son of a Russian immigrant, last night addressed a crowd assembled at the First Christian church in Twin Falls.

Telling of the horrors of a missionary's son in the Soviet, the youth also showed several photographic slides which were smuggled out of the country by reducing them to the size of a postage stamp and then concealing them between layers of leather in his shoe.

"No country is Godless. Russia is not Godless, but their god is Lenin and they are compelled to worship him. That is the shrine of Russia today," the speaker declared.

"Russia has the most damnable capitalist system the world has ever known. Women are mere government chattel property and as such are in use without regard to morals and work as men in every vocation."

"There is no such thing as the sanctity of the home or the right to property. Every person is the property of the state. Fascism and Nazism are the product of Communism, of atheistic origin and totalitarianism centered."

**Warms of Future**  
"Another world war will bring a totalitarian state of government to all countries for the seed is being planted and unless the Church of Christ prevails this condition will be forced upon the people," Voronoff said.

He described his personal sufferings in Russia and his escape. He also told of his visit to his father and mother who are separated by 1,000 miles in a concentration camp.

"Christ's way is the way of escape from this blood thirsty group who will not be satisfied until they rule the whole world," the speaker concluded.

# FIVE JUNE DAYS ABOVE 90 MARK

Only five days during the month of June in Twin Falls showed temperatures above the 90 degree mark, was shown today in a report for that period which was released by the bureau of entomology.

Three of the days on which the high temperatures were recorded came at the end of the month—June 28, 29 and 30, the report shows. On these three days the mercury went to 92 degrees, 100 degrees and 94 degrees respectively.

Precipitation for the 30-day period amounted to 25.8 of an inch with 17 of this amount being measured on June 18. Fourteen days of the month were clear, 14 were partly cloudy and two were cloudy.

Maximum temperature during the period, as pointed out previously, was 100 above while the minimum was but one point above freezing. Mean maximum was 79.9 degrees; mean minimum, 42.5 degrees and mean 66.2 degrees.

Wind was mostly from the west.

# STRIKING WPA WORKERS MAY BE DROPPED FROM ROLLS

## MEN MUST COME BACK TO JOBS IN FIVE DAYS TIME

WASHINGTON, July 6 (AP)—WPA officials indicated today that thousands of skilled workers who halted work on WPA projects in protest against new hourly wage rates may be dropped from relief rolls unless they return to their jobs within five days.

A spokesman for the works projects administration said the WPA does not recognize strikes. He added that the "normal policy" of WPA has been to drop workers from relief rolls five days after they refuse to continue their assigned work.

No Immediate Comment

WPA Administrator F. C. Harrison had no immediate comment on a spreading series of work stoppages throughout the country, called in protest against the new wage law which terminates the policy of paying relief workers "prevailing" wages. The new law compels WPA clients to work 120 hours a month for the same pay that some of them formerly received for 50 hours or less of work monthly.

From New York to Fort Dodge, Ia., skilled workers on many relief projects had halted work. WPA, operating upon the policy of not recognizing such incidents, claimed to have no complete reports on the numbers of workers involved.

But reports from project sites indicated thousands of workers were involved. Thomas A. Murray, president of the New York building and construction trades council, claimed that 90 percent of the 37,000 skilled WPA construction workers in that area had halted work. His estimate, however, was disputed by Col. Breton B. Somerville, New York City WPA administrator, who said only a few projects in his jurisdiction had been forced to suspend operations.

Work stoppages were reported also at Minneapolis and several other Minnesota projects; at Milwaukee; Fort Dodge, Ia.; Rochester, N. Y.; Cleveland, and other cities.

## SCOUTS DEPART ON CAMP JAUNT

SHOSHONE, July 6 (Special)—The Boy Scout companies of this area were to start today toward the annual summer outing and go into quarters at Camp Baumgartner, on the south Snake river. The contingent from this part of the state will comprise 150, and locally will be under the supervision of J. J. Locke and Ed Hahn, alternating for a few days each. Ned Mabbitt, veteran commissioner and at heart a Boy Scout himself, and a thorough outdoor man, has taken leave of absence and will look after the youngsters, mostly when meals call for help.

From Shoshone to the camp it is 88 miles and the Scouts will go in trucks. Several routes being traversed. The local contingent will go up the Warm Springs creek road, others will go from Gooding over the Soldier summit and others along other roads to get a slant on the scenery. The party will camp a week, and there will be 150 in the party.

The boys at this camp will be given a touch on cooking as well as general outdoor instructions and many of them already know the different species of conifer as well as the deer. One of the interesting items of the Scouts will be the raft race, which covers a stretch of three miles on the river. It is a comprehensive training stunt. A cable across the river carries a message. The first raft securing it by burning the string is entitled to the opening of the string. To do this he must start his light by ablution. Then he signals a mountain top, is answered, and reports a man in danger. This is signalled up the river and a raft starts with first aid toward the "injured" man. Arriving the detail of first aid application is worked out by Woodruff and other outdoor and general instructive training is extended.

## The Public Forum

REMINDS DWORSHAK HE WAS NOT ELECTED JUDGE

Editor, Evening Times:

To our honorable representative, Mr. Dworshak... I like hundreds of others, read your apology in the Public Forum, and I am sure that you will support the bill if the people in your district were in favor of it.

One of your excuses for not voting for the bill was that it was unconstitutional. We voters here in Idaho thought we were electing you as our representative, not as a judge of the supreme bench. In the past, the judges have been appointed.

Then you were afraid it would ruin the small business man. How about the petitions sent to you from Twin Falls, signed by something like 150 of the business men here, asking you to support the bill? Do you think they don't know that their business would increase if there was more money in circulation?

And you were afraid it would work a hardship on the farmer. Most farmers know that when everybody that wants work has it, spends more for things to eat, and eats is what the farmer produces. Consequently, a better demand and a better price. He also knows he is going to be taxed one way or another, and that the transaction tax is the fairest tax.

If the farmer is lucky enough to have the right kind of a crop that happens to be a good price, he can afford to pay transaction tax. # DEMOS CHARGE IDAHO GOP WITH BOOSTING EXPENSES

## OFFICERS BATTLE AS STATE FUNDS HIT LOW MARK

By WILLIAM McHENAMIN

BOISE, July 6.—Charges and denials that the present state administration is spending an average of \$200,000 a month more than 1937 to run the state are being made by an economy guardianship of state funds, entitled the split between Republicans and Democrats in the state-house this week.

Critics of the administration assert that the state general fund is so depleted that for the first time in four years, it must issue registered warrants to pay ordinary expenses of government.

The controversy started when the board of examiners set an interest rate of two percent on any registered warrants, that might be issued by State Auditor Calvin E. Wright. State Treasurer Myrtle Ewing asked for issuance of the warrants after finding that expenditures of the Republican-controlled administration were depleting the general fund, Wright and Ewing are Democrats.

Average expenditures of the present administration has spent an average of \$375,000 a month for the first five months of 1939 compared to \$150,000 in 1937. Beginning of the administration of Democratic Governor Barzilla Clark, C. J. Hugo, director of the bureau of budget, immediately took exception to the statement. He called attention to the fact that the payments for unemployment compensation were not started until 1938 and therefore were not being paid in the first months of 1939.

Hugo said these costs for the first quarter of 1939 exceeded \$1,232,340, or more in three months than the increase expenditures for the entire five month period of the administration as compared to that of former Governor Clark.

**Falsification**

Hugo insisted that the whole comparison was not on an equitable basis and insisted that it provided the public with a false impression of the condition of state finances.

Democrats insist that the last Republican legislature failed to provide for an ad valorem levy for the general fund. The financial experts decided on a special ad valorem tax of \$100,000 a year to take care of relief and believed that ordinary taxes such as income, kilowatt, beer and mail, would take care of the general fund requirements. This has not been the case, they say.

**Surplus Wiped Out**

The general fund surplus at the end of 1938 was \$400,000. This has been wiped out in recent months and now the issuance of warrants is expected to become necessary in order to draw money from other funds to meet a pending general fund deficit.

But those who defend the administration's position assert that, this period is the time of the year when the general fund usually runs the lowest and that later in the year tax income will increase to a point where it will overcome the deficit and build up another surplus.

They point to the fact that this general fund surplus was purposely cut down by the legislature in order to meet expenditures and economies elsewhere.

## Your Health

**ACIDOSIS**

In our language today there are no more meaningless words than those overworked phrases "too much acid" and "an acid condition."

**What is Acidosis?**

The waste products of the human body are normally acid in reaction. The healthy kidneys, therefore, produce a urine which is acid because of these substances. But if the body produces more waste material than it eliminates, these substances will accumulate in the blood and make it less alkaline than it ought to be. This is the condition known to doctors as "acidosis." But neither the blood nor the body tissues can ever be actually acid, for their reaction would be produced by a great loss of alkali as by an excess production or poor elimination of acid substance.

**How is Acidosis Produced?**

Acidosis then, you see, is not a disease itself but only a state of the body's chemistry. It is normally produced by a great loss of alkali as by an excess production or poor elimination of acid substance.

**Alkalosis**

This condition—the opposite of acidosis—is much commoner than people realize. It is caused by vomiting through causing the loss of acid in the stomach contents may bring on alkalosis. But far more often the cause is the habitual use of soda.

Many persons with digestive disturbances imagine that they have an ulcer of the stomach or "too much acid," and so they take large doses of soda day after day, thinking this common substance perfectly harmless. As a matter of fact, soda taken in this way may not only make the stomach symptoms worse but lead to an alkalosis severe enough to cause convulsions.

**Treatment**

The logical treatment of acidosis is (1) to remove its cause if possible, and then (2) to supply the alkali and water of which the body stands in need. To be effective the alkaline solution must be given directly into the vein.

The transient mild acidosis of acute infections ordinarily requires no particular attention. But diabetic acidosis is extremely dangerous; it demands the prolonged and expert use of insulin and sugar as well as salt solution. All such patients being in a hospital under constant supervision.

Alkalosis is prevented by avoiding the habitual use of large amounts of soda and treated by stopping the alkali and giving salt solution in the veins.

## Meeting With Royalty Recounted by Woman

Probably no persons in the United States, remote from the cities where the king and queen visited on their recent sojourn in America, were more interested in following the accounts of their entertainment than three residents of this county.

To William Trentowsky, Twin Falls, and Mrs. T. F. Holloway, and Mrs. H. B. Zink, Ellettsville, the visitation brought to mind their mother's reminiscences concerning the arrival in Canada years ago of the king's illustrious ancestor, Edward VII, then the prince of Wales.

Formerly of Canada

They are the son and daughter of A. C. O. Trentowsky, who was among the Saint John, New Brunswick, residents to greet the then prince of Wales, King Edward VII, when he came to Canada.

Receipt by her of a copy of the evening edition of the June 6, 1939, prompted her to relate some interesting facts concerning her family.

Her father, in 1880, when the prince of Wales visited Saint John, was German consul for eastern Canada. He was an accomplished linguist; master of 10 languages. His cousin was Russian ambassador to Germany and he was a member of the common council, engaged in the lumber industry, according to the newspaper clipping, the statements being reiterated by Mrs. Holloway.

Audience with Prince

The meeting of the prince and the citizenry of Saint John took place in the council chamber of the court house, King Square, and Mr. Trentowsky was the only one having the honor to be recalled by his royal highness and was in conversation with him for half an hour.

The facts are on record in the Dominion Archives at Ottawa, according to Mrs. Holloway, who displayed a small Morocco-bound note containing vivid clippings telling of the marriage of her father and mother, and of his death.

"When my mother gave me this book she said 'This is next to the Bible in importance,'" Mrs. Holloway explained proudly. It was given to her mother by her father when the couple was engaged.

Book Treasury

It is easy to see what she meant. For Trentowsky had preserved through the years, both in clippings and in pen-and-ink, now brown with age, the poems, the inspirational vignettes, that had meant most to her.

Of her father, who was Prussian consul of Saint John for many years, and afterwards consul for the German empire, Mrs. Holloway remembers little, except through the eyes and words of her mother. Her father died when she was but six years of age.

"Everyone who knew them both, says that my brother, William, living in Twin Falls, is the image of my father," Mrs. Holloway commented.

# SHAKEUP LOOMS IN IDAHO'S FISH AND GAME DEPARTMENT

## STATE'S BOARD MEMBERS HOLD MEETING JULY 8

BOISE, July 6 (UP)—Threats of a shakeup in the Idaho fish and game department probably will be either resolved into fact or disappear by July 8 when the reorganized game commission meets for the first time since it was split open by a gubernatorial investigation last month.

The commission will be called into quarterly session on Saturday by George Booth, assistant governor. W. Grebe, Kuna, newly appointed commissioner, will meet with the commission for the first time on that day.

**New Majority Line-Up**  
Grebe is expected to line up with Kelleys of Kellogg and Walter Flucas of Pocatello to a new majority combination that may shake many of the present game department officials out of their posts.

Most of the game department heads including Director Harold R. Harvey were appointed by the commission when Chairman Booth combined with G. R. Howell, Ririe, and Bird N. Hawley, county game commissioners, to form the board majority.

**Situation Changes**  
But now that Hawley has been removed, the situation has changed completely. A new secretary must be appointed and the commission must complete the installation of the new civilian civil service system for the department. Civil service examinations were given recently and the results have not yet been received.

A fish planting program suggested by present department heads must be placed in effect.

Meanwhile, the suit for Hawley for reinstatement on the commission still is pending before the state supreme court.

## PRISON AND JAIL TERMS FOR SIX

Three men had been sentenced today to county jail terms committed to penitentiary sentences, and three others awaited transfer to Boise to serve state prison penalties.

Judge J. W. Porter passed sentences in district court Wednesday afternoon after arraignment and pleas were entered by the six accused in burglary and forgery cases.

Ben Benson, 40, Jerome: one to five years in state prison; second degree burglary. (Jail of 30 days watch from J. A. Olson, 545 Fourth avenue east, Jan. 26; pleaded guilty.)  
Joe Mead, 30, Lewiston: one to five years in state prison; forgery of \$20 check May 19; pleaded guilty.  
Alvin Litsberger, 26, Denver, Colo.: one to five years in state prison; forgery of \$17.85 check May 19; pleaded guilty.

**Three Commuted**  
Mike Baisi, 29, Kimberly: one to five years committed to six months in county jail; second degree burglary in theft of \$13.50 from room of Spencer at Kimberly; pleaded guilty.

**Joe Stephenson, 22, Lewiston, Utah, and Richard Crane, 27, Alpine, Tex., one to 14 years committed to four months in county jail; possession of forged checks May 19 with intent to "pass" them; both pleaded guilty.**

The three committed terms were granted on showing that the trio had no former convictions.

The four check accusations all involved forging of the name of H. J. Pringle as payor.

Sentences were pronounced immediately because all six criminal defendants waived the statutory time.

He was a member from Elmore county—Glenn Ferry. Later, he was a member of the legislature, school superintendent, probate judge and county attorney of Elmore county. For a number of years he has been living retired in Oregon City, Ore.

## Indian Relics Uncovered in Oakley Area

If you'd like to find Indian relics in the form of arrowheads, pottery and even tomahawk heads, a new field was opened for you today.

It's the Goosecreek area near Oakley.

Kelle Gooney, Oakley garage man, visited Twin Falls with a goodly collection of perfectly made flint arrowheads and one reconstructed and very dead-looking tomahawk.

Although the Goosecreek sector hasn't previously been noted for Indian finds, Gooney said that weekend cutting parties who visit the region can unearth the relics without too much trouble.

He has 100 arrowheads, many of them perfect workmanship, many very small, practically all made of flint. Some of the flint is an unusual opaque type.

The tomahawk head he found, except for a few missing pieces, is a radius of about two feet.

Indian relics aren't all that may be discovered in the area. Gooney saw a bit of old leather sticking out from the dust. He kicked it loose, thinking it an old shoe. Instead, it was a genuine leather boot, now old it's hard to say but undoubtedly dating back to pioneer days. Inscribed on the holster was the familiar term for the site-shooter of a forgotten pioneer—"Betty."

**Pottery Broken**  
The Indian pottery to be found in the area is broken but can easily be glued together.

Gooney said he believes the region was formerly an Indian hunting ground. Twin Falls residents can reach it by taking the road to Oakley, turning off at Murfreesburg, going five miles south, turning east toward Churchill, site of an abandoned grain elevator, then working northward from there. The Indian relics are found about 10 miles north from Oakley in the channel of an old dried-up river. The region is some 24 miles south of the City of Rocks, which itself offers many finds of Indian relics especially in the Indian Grove sector in the north portion of the City of Rocks.

Gooney said that according to the lore he learned as a child, the arrowheads were made in a cave fashion. The Indians heated the flint, then dropped water on it to drop it down wherever they wanted the flint to take off. Then they chipped it carefully into arrowhead points.

He plans to display his relics at his Oakley establishment.

## Ima Mines Claims Giant Ore Strike

SPokane, Wash., July 6 (UP)—Geologists of the Ima Mines corporation claim to have the largest tungsten mine in the nation.

It is situated near May, Ida., a remote spot 40 miles north of Salmon.

The president of the company, Ben H. Tilly, said in a recent letter to George (Gibbs) Spokane, that another vein of high grade ore has been struck in a lower tunnel and that it is 25 feet wide.

"That tunnel is a wonderful one body with nothing like it in the United States," Gibbs commented. "A tunnel body three or four feet wide is big."

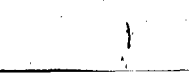
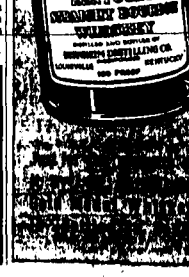

## SUGAR ACT SEEN AT NEXT SESSION

Although little chance remains for sugar legislation in the present session of congress, lawmakers from the sugar states including Idaho expect to introduce "comprehensive" measures at the next session. Compton I. White, Idaho, informed the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce today.

White answered the chamber's resolution in connection with a move for increased beet quotas. Other members of the Idaho congressional delegation had previously replied that the President's opposition will prevent any sugar legislation at the current term. But White revealed the plans for the future.

"Congressmen Cummings further assured me that the whole matter of the sugar policy of the federal government was being worked out by the members representing the sugar states," Congressman White said. "It is expected that comprehensive legislation would be drafted and introduced at the next session of congress."

White disclosed also that a move is underway to strike at sugar imports from the Philippines. Any such move would rebound to advantage of western beet producers.

"I might add," he said, "that the committee on insular affairs has under consideration H. R. 6594 which will seriously affect the importation of sugar from the Philippines."

The chamber here, in common with other civic groups of south central Idaho, is on record vigorously in favor of a boost in beet quota for this area in 1940.

## Japan Sponsors Celebrations On 2nd Anniversary of War

TOKYO, Friday, July 7 (UP)—Japan's patriotic organizations sponsored empire-wide celebrations today on the second anniversary of the war against China.

It was two years ago today that scattered rifle firing outside Peking presaged the taking of that ancient capital and the beginning of a war which has so far cost \$5,500,000,000 and has taxed Japan's material resources far beyond her first estimate. There is, however, little evidence, beyond a mild inflation, that Japan has reached her limit. The China adventure, while costly, is reckoned here as having partly paid for itself in the training for the possibility of a war with Russia.

The anniversary today was called "Asia Development Commemoration day," and the flag of the rising sun was flown from every home. Each citizen was called upon for sacrifice, and was asked to contribute one sen (a little more than one-fourth of an American cent). Men were asked to go without sake, the native wine, for the day, and women without combs.

The outstanding effect of the war has been the rise of the army in politics as demonstrated in recent incidents involving foreign powers. Japan now has nearly 2,000,000 soldiers on the continent. These include the troops in Manchuria who are better trained than those in China, where Japan from the first sent secondary forces.

## RAIN EASES NEED OF TRACT WATER

HOLLISTER, July 6 (Special)—Because of the heavy rains which drenched the Salmon tract yesterday and Tuesday, the scheduled irrigation water run booked for Friday had been postponed today until next Monday or Wednesday, according to Salmon River Canal company officials. Date will depend on crop needs.

Rainfall Wednesday totaled almost half an inch here and was heavier at the north end of the project.

Reservoir gauge yesterday showed 2.40, meaning about 30,000 acre feet of available storage water.

## RUSSIANS CLAIM MONGOL VICTORY

MOSCOW, July 6 (UP)—Russia claimed a big victory today for outer Mongolian-Russian troops in a three-day battle against Japanese-Manchukuan forces on the Mongolian frontier.

An official communique from the headquarters of the Mongolian-Soviet forces asserted that the Japanese-Manchukuan had lost 50 tanks, 45 airplanes, eight field guns and 800 killed. Mongolian-Russian forces, it was admitted, lost 25 tanks and armored cars, nine airplanes, 100 killed and 200 wounded.

It was asserted furthermore that the chief of the press bureau of the Japanese army in Manchukuo had been dismissed from publishing "false and boastful reports of imaginary successes of Japanese aviation."

Hainan Island, recently seized by the Japanese, was owned by the Chinese for more than 2,000 years.

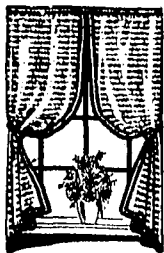

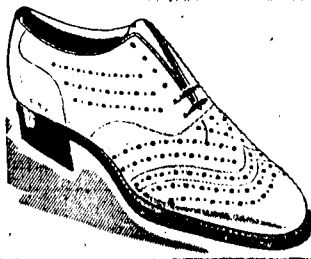
