



# BRITISH TROOPS JOIN FRENCH IN DRIVE ON GERMANS

## ARMY LANDS IN FRANCE WITHOUT LOSS OF 1 LIFE

LONDON, Sept. 12.—British newspapers today described British troops in action beside French soldiers on the western front and announced that no British soldiers had been killed in the fighting.

"For some days," the ministry added, "rumors have been current in this country that while British troops had landed in France, the ministry of information was permitted to announce officially that this is so."

The ministry said that it was the intention of the military authorities to supply information from time to time.

Remarks made by the ministry's denial that British troops were in France were described as activities of the troops, apparently on the basis of a ministry of information statement of mention that the British expeditionary force, including land forces and airplanes, had landed on French soil.

Newspapers were waiting. They had known for days that British troops were in France. They had seen the authorization, given when they re-made their entire first pages to blazon to the British public the latest news that the government, pledged to fight until Hitlerism had been smashed, had now thrown land as well as sea and air forces into the war.

The British Tommies were the sons of the "old campaigners" who, in France, August, 1914, and the millions of British men who followed them. The French beside whom they fought were sons of the British who, with British arms, had back the Germans at the Marne when Paris was in danger.

Discussions of the presence of British troops in France were made only after bitter complaints by Britons that the country was being overrun by the Germans, and that it was a strange sort of war in which Germany was left almost unimpeded, except for the French attack in the East, to crush Poland.

But authorities had been determined to proceed with the design of secrecy until the first expeditionary force had been landed. The Germans had boasted, before the war, that they would have any army it would not reach France because German submarines would sink it to the bottom of the Channel. In 1914, the Kaiser and other leaders of imperial Germany were variously quoted as if Britain sent a "contemptible" little army to France. The Berlin police force would be sent to arrest it.

The Daily Mail asserted that British troops had been operating on German soil in cooperation with the French, and that the British man side of the frontier. Many successful operations were reported, the Daily Mail said, and several counter attacks had been carried out successfully without the loss of a single life.

but two cases the British crews escaped in life boats. British announced four merchant ships attacked by U-boats had escaped. The Germans have lost four merchant ships and one warship, unidentified, which was struck by the Danish newspaper, Berlingske. Aftermath to have struck a mine in the Baltic and sunk after a German trader had taken aboard part of the crew.

**Dutch Loss Two**  
France has lost one ship, the Tamara, which was torpedoed. Two Dutch ships have been sunk, the Willem van der Zaan, which drifted into a Baltic mine and sank with the loss of 28 men; and the Mark, 1814 tons, which struck a mine in the North sea and sank after the crew escaped in lifeboats. The Greek freighter Kosti, also sunk by a mine off Sweden.

In addition, the Finnish bark, Olyvrensk of Oskari, a 2,700-ton sailing vessel, was sunk by a mine 105 miles off Bouviers, Denmark, with a loss of 16 men. The total German ships in nine days of war was 25.

## \$272,245 BUDGET SET FOR SCHOOLS

Including \$38,200 provided for retirement of a portion of the building bonds, total budget for the Twin Falls school district for 1939-40 has been approved today at \$272,245.

Trustees last night approved the budget as submitted by Supt. Homer M. Davis.

Approval of the budget as submitted by Supt. Davis came last night prior to the adjournment of the board to include its two new members, Edgar H. Olmstead and Frank.

**Some Up, Some Down**  
Subdivisions under the new budget show both increases and decreases from the 1938-39 year. For this year, however, will be only 18.5 miles as compared to 18.7 for 1938-39.

Largest budgeted item, as always, is for instructional services. That totals \$187,760 for the coming year, or \$18,776 more than the 1938-39 year.

Bulk of the instructional services budget will be spent on salaries of teachers in the public system, and the balance on supplies, \$18,776 for the year. The previous 12 months required \$18,024.

Despite the fact that two large new buildings are now going into their second year in the system, maintenance of plant shows a drop to \$100 from \$127 last year and \$18,761 in 1937-38.

**Fired Charge Down**  
Fixed charges, such as insurance and taxes, were down for the coming year to \$18,500 from \$19,000. Plant operation will take \$25,000 from \$24,500 last year.

Although Lincoln field stadium is now nearing completion as one of the finest athletic plants in Idaho, the budget for its operation, \$10,000, is only \$10,025 for 1937-38.

Budget figures for estimated receipts: Current tax, \$136,111; bonds, \$131,331; but valuation of the district is higher, \$187,760; school appropriation from state and county, \$90,182 last year \$107,470; vocational education, \$1,000; tuition, \$4,400 (last year \$4,300); book store sales, \$3,500. Total is \$238,034. General fund total is \$179,245 last year the total was \$182,022, showing receipts considerably higher.

## GERMANY TAKES POLISH REGIONS

**(From Pass One)**  
The German dispatches again made no reference to fighting on the western front, and for the first time in several days, claimed no further losses at Warsaw.

**Protest Guerrilla Warfare**  
German radio broadcasts continued to protest against guerrilla fighting by Polish citizens. It was announced that residents of Warsaw were tearing up the streets to build barricades, that civilians were being taken from their homes and sent to German troops all around Warsaw.

The German attitude is that the Polish resistance is made up of mere criminals and will be treated as such, it was announced.

The German high command said that the big battle was still in progress, and that the Polish army is reaching its final point.

German troops, the communique said, were approaching Modlin, 10 miles north of Warsaw, one of the key points in Warsaw's defense.

Highways east of the Vistula, the communique said, have been blocked by air force attacks and the Polish resistance, have been defeated northeast of Warsaw.

Ending nine and eight years service were S. B. Graves and Louis J. Tenkink. Replacing them are Frank L. Sheehan and Edgar H. Olmstead.

The retiring pair took part in the concluding of old business, with Mr. Graves as temporary chairman in absence of George W. Ward. Then both stepped back into capacity of private citizens as Mr. Graves administered the oath of office to Mr. Sheehan, attorney, and Mr. Olmstead, prominent rancher with four children now in the school system.

Election of officers then presented this group for the coming year:

Chairman Re-elected  
George J. Ward, chairman, re-elected to serve his fifth term in that post.

John Bodine, treasurer.  
Ernest F. Biedler, clerk, re-elected to serve his fourth term in that position.

All elections were unanimous.

## COUNCIL PASSES 1 HOUR PARKING

Auto drivers will be limited to one hour parking on eight blocks in the main business district starting Sept. 23 following action of the city council last night in amending an existing ordinance to cut the parking time in half.

In addition to cutting parking time, the new ordinance provides for 10 minute parking in front of the Rogers and Perrine hotels for the use of hotel guests in loading and unloading their cars, a zone for police cars on Shoshone paralleling Twin Falls Bank and Trust company, and 10-minute parking in front of the Postoffice.

The parking rule for 30 feet in front of the postoffice will be enforced by officers, but the ban on long parking there will be lifted between 11 p. m. and 1 a. m.

The new statute changes the parking limit from two to one hour for two blocks each way on Shoshone and Shoshone from the intersection of the two streets.

Warning from Police Commissioner Carl Hickey would "rigidly enforce" the ordinance came after the proposed changes had "hot" read the new statute provided that drivers may be fined any sum "not in excess of \$100 for violation."

It was also suggested at the council meeting that an ordinance be passed making it unlawful for pedestrians to cross the street against traffic lights on principal downtown streets.

Mayor Joe Koehler asserted that work on new municipal 5,000-gallon water storage reservoir is "from six to eight weeks behind schedule because of lack of manpower and failure of WPA to provide necessary help." Pies B. Wilson, city engineer, upheld the contention of the mayor. Koehler said he would go to Boise Thursday to confer with WPA officials and urge speedy completion of the project.

Shedding light on the matter, Wilson said he believed it would not be possible to pour concrete for the reservoir this fall. It was pointed out that concrete pouring should be underway now, according to the original schedule.

Disposal of water from the city's storm sewers was considered at a meeting of the Twin Falls Canal company board of directors today and request that the city be allowed to place the sewer pipes into a canal company drainage tunnel.

Persons on whose land the water is being run at present have been asked to deposit waste paper may be placed on principal street corners in the near future, it was suggested.

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## BRITAIN TIGHTENS CONTROL ON SEA

LONDON, Sept. 12 (U.P.)—Great Britain tightened her control of the sea today.

The British and French navies, working in close cooperation, were laying heavy mine fields in the North sea and the English channel, closing in the blockade on Germany which they hope will bring her to her knees.

The admiralty hastened its preparations to convoy all allied merchant shipping to and from allied ports and to the major ports of the world as German submarines sank four more British ships. The convoy system was expected to be as effective as to reduce the toll of torpedoes to a minimum.

Authoritative quarters said Britain's flotilla of destroyers and light craft hunting submarines, particularly around the British Isles and the Atlantic ocean lanes, had been active. Nothing was said about their results in view of the government policy of withholding news of submarine destruction in the belief that the mystery surrounding submarines which leave Germany and are never heard of again, weakens the morale of the German submarine forces.

Submarines are known to have torpedoed 11 British ships. The ministry of information announced early today the names of the latest four. They were the Regent "Fleur," the Goodwin, the Rio Clara and the Magdalen, all freighters of less than 5,000 tons.

The Magdalen, the largest, lost some of its crew, but the casualties were not given. The other crews were saved.
