Russia Demands Three Finnish Islands Crew and Craft Reported Taken To Soviet Port

BASES ASKED TO ASSURE THERE IS NO FORTIFICATION

MOSCOW, Oct. 24 (UP)—Russia has demanded three Finnish islands off Kronstadt, the Russian naval base in the gulf of Finland, and a share of control in the Åland islands, between Finland and Sweden, it was reported today by best informed sources.

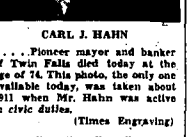
Owners Admit Illegal Goods Aboard Vessel

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (UP)—The maritime commission acknowledged today that the American freighter City of Flint, seized as a prize of war by a German war vessel, was carrying merchandise listed as contraband by German authorities.

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, Oct. 24 (UP)—The crack German cruiser Emden, at large on the high seas as a raider in defiance of the British blockade, captured the American freighter City of Flint, and put a prize crew aboard which sailed it to Kola bay, in the Russian Arctic sea, it was disclosed today.

Promoter Afraid Third-Rater Will Beat Champ

NEW YORK, Oct. 24 (U.P.)—Promoter Mike Jacobs' perturbation over Heavyweight Champion Joe Louis' proposed exhibition tour stimulates the belief in cauliflower canyon that the first top-flight heavy who comes along will wreathe the title from the "Brown Bomber."

Louis was tentatively slated to give exhibitions in nine American cities during October and November, but Jacobs has called the whole thing off—with the exception of a four-rounder at Flint, Mich., on Oct. 27, and another four-rounder at Richmond, Ind., on Oct. 30.

Jacobs cancelled the tour because some promoters—like the one at St. Louis—were matching the Bomber with a fair third-rate opponent and advertising the scrap as for the world title.

John L. Sullivan may have gone barnstorming about the country offering to knock out any so-and-so in the house, but not Joe Louis who stuns a bit too easily when watched in the head. Promoter Jacobs is taking no chances with his precious bit of boxing brioche-brace who already earned for Louis and managers more than \$1,500,000 under the Jacobs' gonfalon.

Uncle Mike is willing to let Louis ride his crown against anybody in the world when the gate promises to be more than \$100,000 and when Uncle Mike has a five-year contract on the challenger before said title bout.

Jacobs will have that contract with Arturo Godoy of Chile when Godoy fights Louis for the crown at Madison Square Garden on Feb. 9 and for all future title bouts.

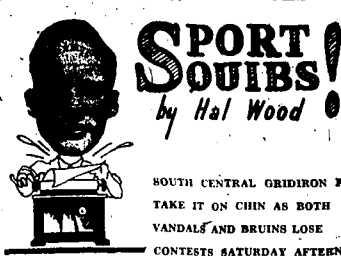

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Duck Flight to Be Double This Year

The northern flight of ducks over south central Idaho will be double that of last year, it was asserted today by W. R. Priebe, official government bird bander for this region.

Stating that the early start of the ducks had a lot to do with the unexpected success on the opening day Sunday, Priebe pointed out that he had ascertained that the flight would be exceptionally large.

Biggest Flight
"All signs point to the biggest flight in years," he stated. "Despite the warm weather, the hunting was good on the opening day of the season—much better than is usually the case when there is lack of rain or any other type of moisture to send the birds down."

"I was able to bring down eight birds by 8 a. m. on Sunday and many hunters in the section I was located in had a bag limit before the day was over."

"We found that all the ducks were in excellent condition and well fed. The flight from the north this year will be over double that of last year on both the Snake river and along the canals in this area, so one of the greatest duck hunting seasons in the history of the state is in store for south central Idaho hunters," he stated.

Cape Bulge
Ducks during the first two days of the open season showed bulging crops, mostly full of corn and oats, pointing to unusually good feeding grounds for the migratory fowl.

Hunters were again warned in this sector against the shooting of ducks before 8 a. m. or after 4 p. m.—the penalty of arrest. The bag limit is 10 birds per day—or an aggregate of 30 in possession at any time.

All guns must be plugged to allow carriage of only three shells while duck hunting, Grover C. Davis, conservation officer, announced.

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FINNS AWAIT RESULT OF ALL-NIGHT KREMLIN MEET

RUSSIA SUBMITS WRITTEN PLANS TO DELEGATION

By NORMAN B. DEUEL.
HELSINKI, Finland, Oct. 24 (UP)—One of Finland's negotiators is returning tonight from Moscow for new instructions on how to answer Russia's demands, it was announced today.

The conversations were said to have reached a final stage and that all but one of the five-man Finnish delegation will stay in Moscow awaiting the verdict.

Russia has submitted written proposals, it was announced, and the minister, leaving Moscow tonight, will arrive with them Thursday morning.

An announcement was made after Finns had waited all night to learn whether the conference at Moscow meant better security for Finland, or invasion and war.

Reach Critical Stage
It was known that the discussions had reached a critical stage because while all-night conferences at the Kremlin are not unusual, no ordinary matter could keep Stalin up all night.

Finland reportedly was determined at any cost to avoid a military alliance with Russia, which would mean independence 10 years ago. While the nature of Russia's demands had not been disclosed, it was reported that Stalin was asking for an alliance of some kind, as a face-saver to offset his failure to negotiate a new pact with Turkey, and that he also was making concessions on the Carelian isthmus, between Lake Ladoga and the Gulf of Finland, where the Russian and Finnish borders meet.

Prepare for Emergency
Finland was making hurried preparations for an emergency, it was determined. If necessary, to throw its fewer than 500,000 troops against the Russian army. Tank traps were laid on every approach to the Russian border. Sentries with rifles or machine guns stood behind trees along the border. It was announced that the Gulf of Finland had been mined and that the Finnish coast was covered with mines and mines and to Finnish boats only. The ministry of interior closed the Helsinki post office and employees were ordered to stay at home. Kallio ordered police to take charge of all telephone service.

Nevertheless, the government proceeded to be optimistic and the only official statement was: "We remain calm."


