

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### Road Must Be Open for Youth

Repeatedly it has been said, but it can not be said too often: The war in Europe must not be allowed to distract the United States completely from its own internal problems. They are just as important in spite of the war situation—perhaps more important.

spite of the war situation—perhaps more important. The American Youth commission has done a service in calling attention to the fact that the United States must "put its house in order at all costs," and that immediate objectives must be "the improvement of the health, education, and employment opportunities of our young people, to the end that they may have a sense of quickening life and power in this nation."

The Youth commission, which is not a governmental agency, was formed in 1935 by major educational institutions and associations. It has a distinguished non-political board.

It believes that the first duty the United States owes to its youth is to take care that it is not involved in the European war unless its territories are actually invaded, or its vital interests attacked. For it is youth which is sent out to die, which bears the brunt of the sacrifice, the loss, the tragedy.

of the sacrifice, the loss, the tragedy.

Look at the pictures of the young men being called to the colors in Europe—French, German, British. They are bright-eyed, beardless kids, many of them looking as though they would fit better into a Boy Scout uniform than into the shapeless dungarees which are today's war kit. This is no reflection on these boys. They will fight bravely enough, and die bravely enough, just as their fathers did. Look at your own picture, World war veteran, as you were when you put on khaki in 1917. These kids are no younger than you were then. younger than you were then.

So the best service we can render our youth is not to sacrifice them. But the Youth commission looks ever farther ahead. "By remaining at peace," it insists, "all the countries of this hemisphere can be of sists, an the countries of this nemisphere can be of inestimable value to the other nations of the world when the present struggle is over. With their youth vigorous and unimpaired, they may become for a time the only repository of sound government throughout the world."

Go back to 1919. Hitler, a demobilized corporal, finds a civil life awaiting him which offers no place, no opportunity, no hope. He turns to political agitation. A million other veterans, equally frustrated, are eager listeners. Younger men, reared amid the privations and looming horror of war and its aftermath, are equally eager for something that promises—that offers hope. Directly from the seed-beds fertilized by the World war, there springs up Hiler, and 1939 is on the way.

Its youth is any country's greatest asset; in a sense, its only asset. It must be guarded jealously by remedying deficiencies in employment, in education, is health. The promise of useful employment must be realized. Only by thus keeping the avenues of hope open to the coming generation can the Ameri-

hope open to the coming generation can the American future be kept bright.

Released by Britain, for public consumption, Sir Nevile's analysis of the Hitlerian philosophy and the ambassador's accounts of diplomatic proceedings would appear to be as nearly dispassionate as any contemporary writing from an anguly state could be The temporary writing from an enemy state could be. The former emissary tries to present a clear-cut picture of diplomatic interchanges and an honest personal im-pression of Adolf Hitler.

The document will become an important addition to the archives of the Second World war. It will give future historians a better opportunity to dissect impartially the elements that led to the 1939 conflict.

### Do They Go Poof?

A member of the British House of Commons has hinted that American-made shells go "poof" instead of "boom." In other words, he intimates, they're no

good.

He suggests, therefore, that Britain first ascertain whether the Empire can produce all of its own ammunition before any is imported from the United States—granted, of course, that the American embargo will be lifted.

Whether the shells are defective must be left to techwhether the shells are defective must be left to technical experts. But one thing is certain: If the war is to be a long one, Britain cannot rely solely on its own undustries for an adequate supply of ammunition.

Apparently British militarists have no complaint against American shells. The best test of a satisfied sustemer is whether he comes back for more.
