

GOP HINTS AT PARTY CONVENTION TO FOLLOW DEMOCRATS

DEWEY'S SPEECH RATED 'EXAMPLE OF SIDESTEPPING'

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (U.S.)—The third term issue blazed into prominence again today against a background of Democratic and Republican party maneuvers for the 1940 presidential campaign.

Debate, engaged in intra-party jockeying, took a few swipes at the presidential ambitions of New York District Attorney Thomas E. Dewey, who wants to be the Republican challenger to Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Republicans, shaping up their party tactics for 1940 indicated they would play a cat-and-mouse game with the Democrats. Chairman John D. M. Hamilton of the Republican national committee hinted at that strategy when he said the "orderly processes of government" entitled the majority party to hold its national convention after the Democrats have chosen their candidates and disclosed their platform.

He added, it was a good idea "to look into the eyes of the fellow you're going to fight."

At the third term convention, Topping these developments was the demand by former Gov. Alf M. Landon, 1936 Republican presidential candidate, that President Roosevelt disclose his 1940 intentions. Now, in the time, he said, for Mr. Roosevelt to "put out of the uncertainty" the interests of Democratic party.

Landon made it clear that he will give a hint for the Democratic party, as such, but felt that the party in the party in power was the cause of every citizen "because of the heart of successful administration." All the talk about third term, Landon said, is a "lot of stuff and nonsense."

Meanwhile, Secretary of the Interior Harold I. Ickes reaffirmed his support for a third term for Mr. Roosevelt.

FDR Supporter

The third term movement, found another supporter in Willis Mahoney, Portland, Ore., Democratic leader. After a conference with President Roosevelt, Mahoney indicated did not touch upon politics. Mahoney said "There is only one candidate for 1940—and that is the President."

Sen. Sheridan Downey, D., Calif., meanwhile, counted himself out as a presidential "favorite son" candidate. In a telegram to Carl Oppenheimer, Los Angeles, Downey asked Oppenheimer to cease campaign activities in his behalf.

MERCURY SOARS TO 62 IN BOISE

BOISE, Dec. 8 (U.S.)—A freak heat wave sent the mercury to an unprecedented high of 62 and in the vicinity of the Boise valley waited hopefully for a rain today to break a dry spell that left a precipitation deficiency of two inches since Oct. 1.

A light rain fell yesterday in the Boise and Payette national forests and there was a suggestion of snow in the higher elevations. Forecasters said the winter was behind schedule since snow usually comes about Dec. 1.

Hill, member of the executive board and also a winner of the Silver Beaver. The recipient of the award this year was not announced until presentation was made.

Principal speaker at the banquet was C. N. Miller, assistant national director, division of operations, Boy Scouts of America.

The speaker pointed out the importance of the Scout movement, especially coming at a time when a boy reaches the "gang" age.

Her home, the latch string of which is always out, is a mecca for those interested in art, literature, current events and all things which affect the lives of those about her.

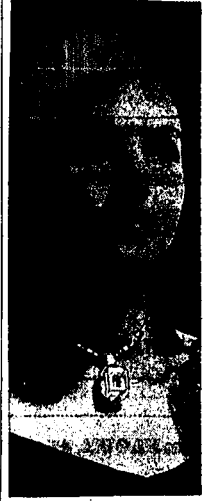

GERMAN TROOPS MAKE 60 RAIDS ON FRENCH ADVANCE LINE

NAZIS TRY NEW TECHNIQUES FOR OUTPOST ATTACK

By RALPH HEINZEN

PARIS, Dec. 8 (U.P.)—German troops made 60 raids on the French advance line of the western front during the early hours of this morning, it was learned today, in the first real activity in a month.

French outposts were raided all along a 100-mile line between the Meuse and Rhine rivers as the Germans sought to find weak places in the French defenses and obtain information regarding troop disposition.

Rifles, machine guns, grenades and mines made a bedlam of the front and finally artillery was brought into action to clear the "no man's land" between the French and German lines.

Clash Heavy Losses

The French reported heavy losses among the German raiding parties and numerous prisoners, but admitted they had lost some dead and wounded.

The biggest German attack took place in the Wissembourg sector at the east end of the line. An entire German battalion, perhaps 1,200 men, raided the French lines with the support of their artillery.

New Technique Used

Germans in all 60 raids used a new technique. They advanced in series of files or columns. In each raid, the Germans tried to cover French outposts from front and each side, using portable trench mortars, so that they were discovered, the Germans closed in, dug shelters and tried to hold their ground.

To knock them out and send them back to their own lines, the French advanced units signaled to the main line and they were ordered to support and it was asserted the Germans were driven back.

The French, however, were prepared for further attacks, perhaps in larger scale.

The French expressed belief the intensified German raiding activities, designed to gain information, were partly due to serious losses in reconnaissance planes.

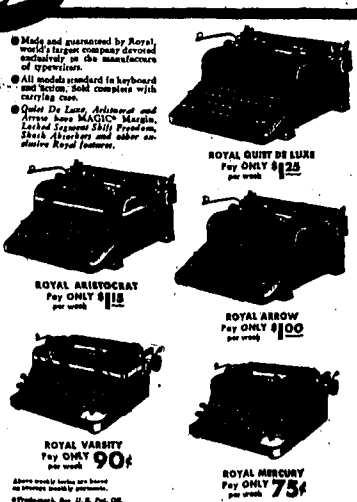
