



Our Flag and Religion The six-year-old youngster who refuses to salute the American flag is confronting the Twin Falls school board with a ticklish problem.

Principal difficulty involved in this issue is the parents' disapproval of the salute for religious reasons, and the development has been watched with interest by schools throughout the state.

Fully aware that courts the country over, almost without exception, have upheld a school board's authority to require a flag salute, the trustees never-theless realize that any drastic attempt to enforce this authority might involve prolonged and expensive literation litigation.

It may not be serious in itself that one pupil refuses to respect the national emblem, but the effect such violation of rule and principle may have upon other

School children is reason for some concern. Taking a stand on any issue involving religion is treading on troublesome ground. But in this instance it is difficult for anyone to refrain from drawing conclusion conclusions.

First of all, if the school board concludes that this This of all, if the school board concludes that this one exception is not sufficiently serious to warrant the possible expense of enforcing its authority, let's hope that all the other children will not misunder-stand; that instead they will become even more ap-preciative of their national emblem because of this one example of disrespect. Let's hope that in so doing they will exercise the tolerance of which the American flag is emblematic. Otherwise rigid enforcement

Meantime, we can only wonder why any religious sect would have any reason for not cherishing the American flag and the principles it typifies. Few countries in the world offer such a fundamental guar-antee for freedom of religious worship, and all re-ligions should respect the American flag for that reason, if no other. There are other flags under which religion has no such guarantee. They may be symbolic of militarism, suppression, and political intrigue. And because of the principles some of these emblems herald, religion has been harassed, maligned and persecuted. Under the American flag religion suffers no such molestation. It represents a country that was found-ed principally to overcome just such evils. It waves over a great democracy in which everyone enjoys the most liberal freedom on earth. Everyone of us, all religions included, should thank (bod that it still waves as a symbol of that freedom.

Teachers Get Ideas

Somebody is always coming along with new ideas to push education farther along the path of progress. But the Dallas (Texas) Teachers' association now sug-gests/hat maybe a little less advancement would do or some va me thru the bein a man the cause some good. The recommendations were made for the benefit of the Dullas public school system, but anyone who ever had the remotest association with schools will be interested.

Generally, it is suggested that schools get back to the old-fashioned theory of the "three R's." The teach-ers would also cut out pep squads and take athletic programs down a peg or two. And to top it off, they would like to keep youngsters in elementary schools an extra year to polish them off before sending them to birb when high school.

Frills can be carried too far. And the trappings of progressive education can be brought to a point where the effect is lost in confusion. No matter how they're taught, readin', writin' and 'rithmetic must still re-main part of the curriculum. Perhaps the Dallas teachers are right in believing these rudiments may as well be dished out straight.
