PROBE ASKED IN BRITISH CABINET SHAKE-UP

FINNISH FORCES PUSH BACK REDS IN NORTH AREAS

WITH THE FINNISH ARMY, ROVANMIKI, Finland, Jan. 6 (UP)—Finnish victories in the war above the Arctic circle had pushed the main battle lines back today to the Salla front, only 22 miles from the Russian border.

Russians left west of Salla were considered now of little importance and Finnish patrols kept the advance over the region and constant sniping, which kept them always on the move.

Full Significance
The full significance of five quick Finnish victories on this north-central front between Dec. 18 and Dec. 23 was only now being realized. On Dec. 18 the Russians had been compelled to retreat from the west of Salla, in the middle of north central Finland. At that point they were half way to the Swedish border and they had looked as though the Russians had called it "the front gate to Sweden." Now they have been driven from the region and the whole advance appears to have been nullified.

Russian Losses
The Russian losses in the five days was estimated at from 3,000 to 4,000 men. The losses in the north, in the Rovaniemi sector, were heavier. Estimates of the entire Russian strength on this front ranged from one to two divisions, probably 10,000 to 12,000 men, have been slain.

It was believed that the Russians on the Salla front either must retreat or pull reinforcements. With the Finns holding Suvaiko, north-west of Salla, the Russians were in a less favorable position to advance than they had been in before. The Finns had not yet taken the town of Suvaiko, which they had not try to take over toward Kemijarvi as long as they held Suvaiko, and to attack by the Finns from Suvaiko.

Blame Tolerance Charges by F. I. investigators against hoodlums are "impersonation of a law officer." Hoover said. He blamed tolerance of "wide open" gambling by public officers for the attraction of racketeers from large northern cities. "Any place that has gambling and prostitution always is a mecca for hoodlums and fugitives from justice," he said. "The only way they can spend their ill-gotten money is on gambling and women."
