## FINNS CLAIM GREATEST VICTORY

### EXTENSION TO BE ASKED ON HULL'S TRADE TREATIES

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 (U.P.)—Chairman Robert L. Doughton, D., of the House Ways and Means committee will offer a resolution to congress to extend authority for negotiation of reciprocal trade agreements for three years.

The resolution will be referred to the committee for hearings beginning Thursday with Secretary of State Cordell Hull as the first witness.

A group of American Federation of Labor unions joined the trade treaty dispute today with an appeal to congress to repudiate existing agreements and permit the authority to expire on June 12, as scheduled. Farm organizations have been critical. Some of the more outspoken objectors to the Hull law tariff plan were Democrats who insist they will bolt the administration on that issue.

Happiest ones for the Hull forces was collapse of negotiations for an Argentine-United States trade agreement, announced last Friday. The tariff concessions to Argentine agricultural products, which would have been likely in any agreement, would have added to protests here that the whole program works to the detriment of the American farmer. Argentine negotiations may be revived if the agreement act is extended.

## Red Division Smashes Defenders Take Prisoners

WITH THE FINNISH ARMY. Rovaniemi, Jan. 8 (U.P.)—Fighting between Finnish and Russian forces has reached the actual Russian frontier in the Suomalaisi sector, it was asserted today.

The fighting is in progress near the town of Itante, which is 11 1/2 miles from the frontier, it was said. Raute is on the road extending from Suomalaisi to the frontier. Lake Raute, in the neighborhood, is bisected by the frontier.

Announcement that Finns had killed a Russian ski detachment on the Salla front, near the Arctic circle, brought the disclosure that Finns were now in some instances equipped with skis in an effort to match the operations of the Finnish ski patrols. However, whereas the Finns operate in small detachments, the Russians were said to move in patrols numbering up to 1,000 men.

Russians Try Skis  
There had been reports from several points recently that the Russians were using skis. The Finns assert, however, that hardly any of the Russians know how to use skis. They assert they have found skis with Russian foot levers on them—that when the Russians were forced to flee they had left skis and boots behind.

The Russians on the Salla front, it was learned, have been using barbed wire for several days to protect themselves against Finnish attacks.

Russian field kitchens have been among the major objectives of Finnish attacks. Whenever possible the Finns have destroyed kitchens in accordance with orders to "take the Russians in their stomachs."

String Barbed Wire  
Often the Finns found Russians had strung barbed wire about as a man's head from tree to tree. At other places the wire was strung low, in hope of entangling the Finns and their skis. The wire, however, was no protection for the Finns against the cold and hunger. Finnish patrols frequently report having found groups of 20 or more Russians frozen to death around the ashes of their fires.

All Russian activities during the last few days to break through the ring of Finnish forces in the Salla area have failed.

Finns estimated the Russians operating in the Salla area at a division of about 18,000 men. Their attacks all have broken down under Finnish machine gun fire.

U. S. Agrees to Send Assistance to Finns  
GENEVA, Jan. 8 (U.P.)—The United States notified the League of Nations today of its readiness to assist Finland. The notification was a reply from the department of state to an inquiry from the League of Nations. The inquiry was sent in accordance with an assembly resolution which called for assistance to Finland at the time Soviet Russia's explosion was voted.

It was addressed to Joseph A. M. G. de la Paiz, secretary general of the League.

The American note expressed the opinion that the league's staff of technical studies, by achieving extraordinary action, could assist the United States in its efforts to help Finland by the various governments which have agreed to aid her.

### BATTLE FLARES AT NLRB HEARING

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 (U.P.)—Counsel for the house committee investigating the national labor relations board lashed out at a free-for-all dispute today by charging that a trial examiner for the board had asserted "I am working for the CIO."

Committee Counsel Edmund M. Tolan said witnesses in the American Radiator Co. case at Littlefield, Ill., had asserted untruthful testimony that a labor board field examiner had said "I am working for the CIO" and "I will benefit you by back pay."

Not Disciplined  
Tolan said the board's personnel records show that the witness had been disciplined. On the contrary, he said, they showed he still worked at the board and had received pay raises since then.

The testimony in the NLRB American Radiator hearing showed that the chairman of the board had been apprised of the charges against Davis, and Davis had not been called as a witness to deny them.

Rep. Abe Murdock, D., Utah, demanded to know whether Tolan had contacted Murdock to learn whether any disciplinary action had been taken against Davis.

Tolan said he had gone through the board's files, the records did not disclose any rebuke to Davis.

### New Chairman Twin Falls Stores Set 8 P. M. Saturday Closing

With agreement by grocerymen, removing the major obstacle, the Twin Falls merchants bureau went on record unanimously today for closing of Twin Falls stores at 8 p. m. Saturdays and at 6 p. m. on other week-days during January, February and March.

The motion came after John Gardner, chairman of the contact committee which consulted grocery operators, reported that the food store men had agreed unanimously to close at 8 p. m. daily and at 6 p. m. Saturday closing for the next three months.

The majority seemed glad to close, he reported.

Chairman H. V. Vallin, presiding at his initial bureau meeting since his election last week, emphasized that the change in closing hours is limited to night workers in the stores and to give them added leisure time.

The bureau instructed Secretary V. H. Carter to dispatch a letter to Guy C. A. Hoffman, urging him to select next Monday, Jan. 15, as the date for the change in closing hours in Idaho in order to achieve uniformity. Prudential Roggevelt has already selected that date.

Chairman Vallin was authorized to select a five-man committee to prepare a suggested list of bureau projects and activities at next Monday's session in the Roggevelt hotel.

### POTTER ELECTED BOARD CHAIRMAN

Ben E. Potter, county commissioner representing the east side, was elected today as chairman of the board after George R. Hart, who resigned the chairmanship.

Potter was chosen to head the commissioners by vote of Mr. Hart and C. B. Lambey, third member of the county administrative group. Mr. Potter himself did not vote on the motion naming him as chairman or on the motion accepting Mr. Hart's resignation.

Withdrawal of Hart came as a surprise. He had been chairman for the past year, since Jan. 8, 1939, and probably was chairman for two years when James T. Barnes and Robert Hart were co-chairmen on the board.

"My resignation as chairman does not come as a result of friction or anything of that nature," Mr. Hart said. "It's just that I believe the honor if I am to be should be passed on to my successor."

The resolution placed only the chairmanship of Mr. Hart continues as one of the commissioners. He is the only member of the board who is not a resident of the county.

"I wish to express my thanks to the board," he said in a statement. "The committee they have elected to be as chairman for the past year."

### Late FLASHES

### ROGERS TRIAL IS SET FOR JAN. 10

Misdemeanor trial of Everett L. Rogers on charge of maintaining a public nuisance by reason of liquor law violation was set today for 10 a. m., Wednesday, Jan. 10.

Mr. Rogers will be tried in probate court before a six-man jury.

Hearing in 2nd Charge  
Immediately following that trial he will stand preliminary hearing on the second of the two charges against him—sale of liquor to a minor. That offense is an indictable misdemeanor in which the probate court's function will be to decide whether or not evidence is sufficient to bind Rogers over to district court.

Rogers, operator of the Twin Falls Social club, formerly known as the Country club, has been under \$500 bond on each of the two counts since the charges were filed by Prosecutor Everett M. Sweeney. Complaints were signed by Chief of Police Howard Carter as Gentry on two "tasks" which followed effective dates of the new city ordinance prohibiting liquor sales to private clubs to police officers in performance of their duty.

Delayed Two Days  
Trial of Mr. Rogers on the misdemeanor charge originally was to have come up today. It was postponed until Wednesday by Judge A. J. Baker, after W. S. Shroyer (fence court) reached agreement with the prosecutor.

A short court session for injunction to close Mr. Rogers' club is now pending. The establishment, however, was shut down by the prosecutor on advice of his counsel after the closing of the public trial charge.

War Casualty  
The latest Finnish report was that the winter at least all Russian hope of cutting across the country to the Gulf of Bothnia had vanished.

Two Finnish soldiers had been killed for behind the Russian lines and dynamited the Russian Leningrad-Murmansk railroad, a supply line for the Russian army in the north, it was understood.

Expert skiers, the Finnish soldiers started out alone from their base with as much dynamite as they could carry. It was said, and made their way through the snow by night, camping in forested areas by day.

Their dynamite exploded on the railroad tracks, they made their way back in safety, it was reported.

The expedition effected under almost impossible conditions with temperatures ranging around 40 degrees below zero, took place in the north, the skiers as usual having only what supplies they could carry.

Whether other expeditions were not discussed officially, because of military secrecy. But it is said there have been several expeditions of the sort which, if they could be told, would rival the operations of the British. The Russian army in the blistering snow was in retreat during the war.

Each of these expeditions is a three to four day supply mission for food as well as material to the front.

The Russians have placed much emphasis on northern operations, on their specially produced arctic sledges, equipped with airplane engines and propellers. They hoped to move to the north by a third line, the Finns say, but have met with no more success than with their previous attempts.

The Finns have knocked the sledges out, as they did the tanks, it was asserted, and have captured a number of them.

### COLON SEES NO FDR THIRD TERM

DENVER, Jan. 8 (U.P.)—Sen. Barton K. Wheeler, D., Mont., predicted today that President Roosevelt would not be constitutionally eligible for a third term and no man groomed by the President to succeed him could win a second term.

Senator Wheeler said Democrats in Washington believed the President would not be eligible for a third term. He said that the President's term would expire on March 4, 1941, and that no man groomed by the President to succeed him could win a second term.

### HOUSE VOTES ON ANTI-LYNCH BILL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 (U.P.)—The House voted today to take up the federal anti-lynching bill. The vote was 247-173.

The bill, which would make it a crime to conspire to deprive a person of their life or liberty because of their race, was introduced by Rep. Charles McNary, D., Ore.

### New Deal Leaders Agree to Postpone New Tax Proposal

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 (U.P.)—Administration congressional leaders today agreed to postpone the proposed new tax law for three months.

The consideration of the proposal was postponed because of the need for more time to study the bill. The bill would increase the tax on income over \$100,000 and on the value of property.

# NAVAL REEF FEARS U. S. WILL BECOME "WEAK SEA POWER"

## STARK REVEALS "NECESSITY" FOR HEAVY PROGRAM

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 (AP)—Admiral Harold R. Stark, chief of operations, told the house naval affairs committee today that other nations are building warships rapidly and that the United States will be relatively weak in naval power unless congress appropriates further construction.

Stark testified in support of a bill by Chairman Carl Vinson authorizing a 25 per cent increase in naval appropriations and an increase of \$100,000,000 for a total cost of \$1,300,000,000.

"If there is any doubt as to the necessity of this program," Stark said, "I need only point to the fact that the United States is now being regarded as a second-rate power."

Stark's testimony followed a brief statement by Secretary of the Navy Charles E.aton asking enactment of the bill in view of the grave international situation. "I promised to elaborate on his statement later," Eaton said.

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## FORMER OFFICIAL TAKEN BY DEATH

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 (AP)—Attorney General-designate Robert H. Jackson probably will speak at the Jackson day dinner which tonight with an appeal at Cleveland, O., for reelection of President Roosevelt for a third term.

Word that Jackson intended to propose a third term leaked here last night.

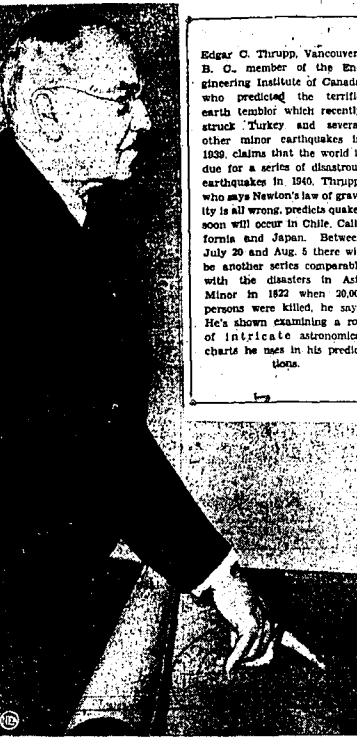
Jackson is big in the political scene again after eclipse when he was passed over in 1936 as Democratic nominee for governor of New York.

Vice President Nominee?

Jackson has just been pronounced from solicitor general to attorney general and is being talked about by New Dealers as the man who should be nominated for vice president if Mr. Roosevelt steps aside for some compromise presidential candidate such as Secretary of State Cordell Hull.

The President will speak at the main party rally which takes place here tonight on the main floor of the Mayflower hotel. He promised a non-partisan speech instead of the political appeal with which he usually addresses these gatherings.

## "World Due for Series of Quakes"



Edgar C. Thrupp, Vancouver, B. C. member of the Engineering Institute of Canada who predicted the terrific earth trembler which recently struck Turkey and several other minor earthquakes in 1939, claims that the world is due for a series of disastrous earthquakes in 1940. Thrupp, who says Newton's law of gravity is all wrong, predicts quakes soon will occur in Chile, California and Japan. Between July 20 and Aug. 5 there will be another series comparable with the disasters in Asia Minor in 1822 when 20,000 persons were killed, he says. He's shown examining a roll of intricate astronomical charts he uses in his predictions.

Ickes already are on the band wagon. Postmaster General James A. Farley is a candidate, himself, not is judged now to be against a third term. Joseph P. Kennedy, ambassador to Great Britain and Joseph E. Davies, former ambassador to Belgium who is now attached to Hull's office on special work, both plumped for a third term.

Sen. Burton K. Wheeler, D. Mont., another candidate for President, will speak tonight in Denver. Who will speak in Des Moines and Federal Security Administrator Paul V. McNight will talk in Raleigh, N. C.

## WATER STORAGE HIGHER THAN '37

BOISE, Jan. 8 (UP)—Idaho storage water content in 12 major reservoirs slightly greater than in December, 1937, despite a drop below the 1938 levels, Reclamation Commissioner James Spofford said in a survey released today.

The 12 reservoirs impounded 2,406,000 acre-feet on Dec. 31, 1939, compared with 2,440,879 on the same day of 1938 and 2,230,327 in 1937.

Storms during the past 10 days brightened the irrigation prospect for next summer, Spofford said. No snow has accumulated to any extent in the valleys and foothills. This will tend to increase the runoff from the snows which should cover these areas within the next 60 days, Spofford said.

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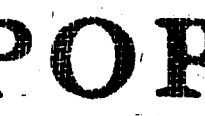
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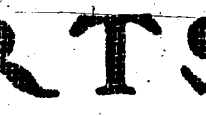
