## WASHINGTON STATE FUNERAL HONORS BORAH

### Finn Troops Kill 1,000 Russians as Five Separate Attacks Fail

#### DEFENSE ARMIES SMASH 12 TANKS IN GREAT BATTLE

**HELINSKI, Jan. 22 (UP)**—Finnish troops killed nearly 1,000 Russians in five separate engagements yesterday and destroyed at least 12 tanks, an official communique announced today.

Fighting raged, as result of Russian attack on the Karelian isthmus to the mid-Pinland front.

The communique said 450 Russians were killed and five tanks were destroyed in an attack at Kollanajoki in the Loimola region.

It claimed 120 Russians were killed in two attacks and two armored cars were destroyed in an engagement at Kitiia. In describing a third engagement, the communique said several hundred Russians were killed when the Finns repulsed a Red army attack on the Taipale river front on the Karasjok peninsula.

Try Radio Score

In addition to the dead which were counted by the Finns, the communique said, the no-man's land area on the Taipale river was strewn with enemy dead which the Finns were unable to count. During the Taipale battle, according to the Finns, the Russians used radio in an attempt to scare the Finns with a warning the Germans were coming.

Russian artillery smashed shells at the rate of 100 a minute into the east end of the Mannerheim defense line in the Karasjok isthmus today, in an apparent attempt to make the entire line untenable by turning the Finns' left wing along Lake Ladoga.

Reports said the Finns were repelling with machine guns and artillery and were holding fast.

Five UP Announcements

Reports from the front said the Russians had been piling up ammunition for two weeks before the bombardment and that a big scale fight might be in progress.

Finns, noting continued Russian hammering along the Taipale river, believed it pressed an attempt to break through the Mannerheim line where it is anchored on Lake Ladoga. All previous Russian attacks in this area have failed.

It was learned that Ulaborg (Oulu), a city of 30,000 on the Gulf of Bothnia, has been shelled today. Numerous fires were started.

Russian air activity over residential areas yesterday was reduced considerably. Most damage was done at Ulaborg where, it was reported, three hospitals were struck by bombs.

An announcement said also Russian planes had been bombing at night with use of parachute flares.

#### Simple Funeral to Be Held at Boise on Thursday for Borah

**BOISE, Jan. 22 (UP)**—Sen. William E. Borah, Idaho's greatest public figure, will be buried Thursday after a simple funeral at the Episcopal cathedral, which will be the only speaker, C. C. Anderson, Boise, family friend, said today.

Only one musical number accompanied by electric organ will be played. The body will lie in state under a military guard of honor in the statehouse rotunda where the services will be conducted.

The public may view the body from 10 a. m. to 3 p. m., when services will begin. Burial will be in Moria cemetery.

State supreme court justices and state elective officials will act as honorary pallbearers. Personal pallbearers will be named later by Mrs. Borah.

W. M. Jeffers, Union Pacific president, announced a special train from Omaha to bring mourners to the Borah funeral. It will leave Omaha at 11:30 p. m. Tuesday and arrive in Boise at 7:30 a. m. Thursday.

The train will consist of a combination baggage-cab car in which Borah's body will lie in state, a special car for Mrs. Borah and a party of 26 national congressmen and executive dignitaries, three Pullman room cars, a diner, lounge and coach.

The special train will run as a second section of the Pacific Limited.

The locomotive will be draped in black. The trainmen will wear black armbands.

A special guard of honor from the Idaho border and accompany it back to the capital.

#### JAPAN PROTESTS BRITISH SEIZURE OF NAZI SAULERS

**TOKYO, Jan. 22 (UP)**—Japan was reported protesting to the protest today against British seizure of 21 German seamen from a Japanese ship. The protest showed a demand for strong action by the government, whose spokesman described the seizures as "a very disagreeable action."

The authoritative news agency Daimi said the foreign office had decided to file a protest with British authorities after receiving the report of the master of the Japanese steamship Asama Maru, Captain Yoshida Watanabe. The Germans were taken off the Asama by a British warship as the Japanese liner passed Yokohama.

It was indicated the incident might precipitate a Japanese-British dispute similar to that which had arisen as the result of censorship of the press from the United States by Britain.

Official sources forewarned that Japan would hold that some of the seizures could be classified neither as active service of military status nor as reservists and that therefore their seizure was illegal.

News of Yokohama

The 16,795-ton Japanese passenger liner Asama Maru was near Yokohama yesterday when a British warship fired two blank shots.

The Asama Maru had left San Francisco Jan. 6 and Honolulu Jan. 15. It was carrying 1,000 passengers and 51 German seamen aboard. All German passengers were taken off the vessel by the British warship and nine armed seamen boarded the Asama.

The British consul in Yokohama, Capt. Yoshida Watanabe, master of the Asama, received the deposition of the German general manager of the British armory party, Capt. H. H. Gross, ranking member of the German party, quickly stepped in and signed a letter of protest. He also signed the British officer selected 21 men who he held, were subject to military discipline.

#### SUPREME COURT, ROOSEVELT AND SOLONS ATTEND

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22 (UP)—William E. Borah was given a state funeral today in the chamber where he sat as senator from Idaho for 33 years.

His senate colleagues, President Roosevelt, supreme court justices, cabinet members, diplomats and officials assembled in tribute to the 74-year-old dean of the senate who died Friday evening.

His body rested in gray steel casket in the well of the chamber. Around it flowers were banded thick. Above them a wreath of pink carnations from the White House, one of lilacs and white carnations from the senate.

Mrs. Borah Stays Away

While the nation's great and near-great offered their final homage to Borah, the senator's consoling family was in place. His wife, Mrs. Borah, who had been in the strain of her husband's sudden illness and death, but her wish was not to witness the ceremony. She had been in the hospital for several days and was provided for her close to the office of Vice-President John N. Garner. With her was Clara Rubin, the senator's secretary for 22 years.

Each chair that could be placed in the senate was occupied, save one which was Borah's own place from which he rose to thunder against Woodrow Wilson's plan for a league of nations, against Monrovia's special privileges against President Franklin D. Roosevelt. His chair was vacant and empty. The copper name plate on the desk was a single "J" of red rose.

Today there was no apology in the senate for the simple and simple Episcopal funeral service, beginning:

Chamber Crowded

"An the resurrection and the life, and the Lord."

The Rev. James H. Montgomery, chaplain of the house, opened the service. Senate Chaplain Z. Barney T. Phillips brought it to a conclusion.

At the end of the casket stood a capitol policeman at attention. The chamber was crowded but hushed. Long before the services began the gallery galleries were crowded and long lines of men and women stood hopefully awaiting admittance. The senate assembled a room.

Then house members who had not separately in their chamber marched into the senate, following the President's cabinet, supreme court justices and the President himself.

Two hymns were sung during the services—a favorite of Borah's. They were "Lead, Kindly Light" and "Able, My Father." They were sung by Mrs. Heuristica Bagger Plum.

Casket

The casket was left in the senate well after the service, but was not opened until 11:30 a. m. Thursday. The body will lie in state in the Idaho state capitol until 2:30 p. m. when a funeral will be held.

#### YOUTH DIES AFTER HIGHWAY ACCIDENT

**Dale E. Westing, married and the father of two children, was dead today as a result of injuries received in a highway accident Saturday at 1 p. m.**

The death of the 18-year-old youth in the county general hospital at 11:15 a. m. today brought to two the number who have died in this county as a result of automobile mishaps since the first of the year. First accident victim was R. A. Bacon, 47, local produce man, who died Jan. 12 as a result of injuries received when his car struck a tree near Buhl on Jan. 5.

Westing was injured when, according to state police, he attempted to pass a car driven by R. F. Boyd, Twin Falls, and apparently lost control of the heavy truck which he was driving. The truck was loaded with 6,000 pounds of sand.

Thrown From Car

The truck careened down the road some 400 feet and then overturned, coming to a stop right side up after taking out a section of fence. Westing was thrown from the cab and fell some 15 feet away.

Death came as a result of head injuries and also a fractured vertebra between the shoulders which partially paralyzed the youth.

Westing was employed by the Cement Pipe company of Twin Falls and was driving a company truck at the time of the mishap. The youth lived on route three.

Surviving, aside from his wife, Mrs. Westing, are two children and his mother, Mrs. Nellie Westing, the latter residing in Buhl.

Other Mishaps

The body was taken to the Twin Falls mortuary. Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Just prior to the Westing mishap, cars operated by George C. Magers, Twin Falls, and Charles E. Uhlig, Kimberly, crashed Saturday one mile north of Kimberly. Mrs. Uhlig was killed, and both cars and trucks were damaged.

Five minor mishaps were recorded in the city during Saturday afternoon. Drivers of cars involved were L. N. Weaver and Thomas C. Peavey, D. G. Bryant and an unnamed operator; H. D. Gilre and another unnamed driver; Albert D. Nelson, Rupert, and A. L. Kuykendall, Tonic, near Twin Falls; A. H. Hunsaker, near Twin Falls; and W. Parker, Twin Falls, and J. P. Hagg, Pendleton, Ore. No personal injuries resulted in any of the mishaps.

#### Bioff Denies Guilt on Tax Pay Evasions

**HOLLYWOOD, Jan. 22 (UP)**—William Bioff, film studio leader, today pleaded not guilty before Federal Judge Ralph James to charges of income tax evasion.

The case will be set on trial Feb. 5.

Bioff, who is wanted in Chicago for failure to serve a sentence after conviction of pandering, did not indicate whether he would demand a jury trial.

He is under federal grand jury indictment on two counts of income tax evasion. One count charges him with attempted evasion of \$4,364 on his 1936 income, and the other count charges attempted evasion of \$80,000 on his 1937 income.

#### POTATO TRAIN AT BOISE DEDICATED

**BOISE, Jan. 22 (UP)**—An 11-car potato train scheduled to make a tour of Idaho and six other potato-producing states, was dedicated today by Union Pacific railroad officials in Boise.

W. B. O'Neil, Salt Lake City, zone director of the district general manager and A. M. Moore, president of the Idaho Growers and Shippers association, officiated at the dedication. O'Neil said Idaho potato production had risen since January 1939, from 3,000 cars to 35,000 cars and that Idaho potato growers received an average of \$120,000,000 annually.

A transcribed message from W. M. Jeffers, Union Pacific president, dedicated the train in production of more high quality potatoes per acre and elimination of potato disease.

The train included exhibits, lectures, cars, demonstration, managers and accommodations for officials. State officials and other dignitaries made a special preview of the train early today. It will stop tonight for a tour of Idaho.

President Harold D. Unsworth, Idaho Growers and Shippers association, represented the state.

Earle G. Reed, county superintendent of crops and Commissioner of Agriculture, U. S. Department of Agriculture, represented the federal government.

#### APPROVAL LOOMS FOR DIES' WORK

**WASHINGTON, Jan. 22 (UP)**—The house rules committee today unanimously approved continuation of the Dies committee investigation of un-American activities for another year.

The rules committee action will put the question before the house for one hour of debate tomorrow. Indications were the house would vote by a large margin to continue the inquiry.

The committee acted after hearing arguments for and against continuation of the investigation. The committee was headed by H. H. Clegg, D. Mich., member to establish that an "understanding of some sort existed between Chairman Martin Dies and William Dudley Pelley, head of the United Kluxers. He did not offer any evidence, but said he would attempt to investigate in the Congressional Record later.

Frank J. Murphy, D. Mich., member of the committee, said he would continue to investigate the matter.

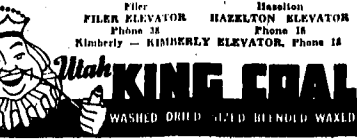

Providing an up-to-the-minute motor freight terminal for Twin Falls, Orange Transportation Company, Inc. is now operating in its modern \$21,000 plant at 305 Fifth avenue west, according to Dan G. Gilster, agent in Twin Falls.

The plant offers enlarged warehouse, terminal loading and unloading facilities, expanded garage space and comfortable office quarters.

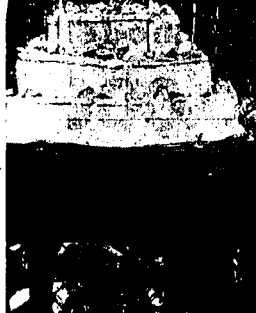

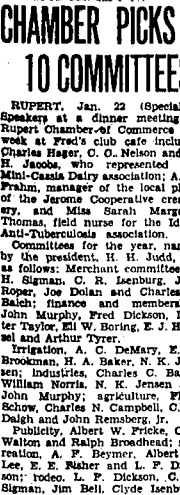

# Ty Cobb Reveals Heartaches He Had While Getting Start in Pro Baseball

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 22 (UP)—The only splike he wears these days is the one built for fair ways and greens, but for the rest of his life, Ty Cobb's first, real and lasting affection is for baseball.

I rode out to the San Francisco match play open with him and Cleveland's vice president, and as the car rolled along toward the course their conversation rolled back the years and Cobb was once again a rookie in Royston, Georgia, dreaming of a chance to make good in baseball.

"I got a home run and a double the first day, and a single in three times up the second," Cobb said, "but the third day, when the regular first baseman came back, they gave me my release. It broke my heart and I hated to call up my dad because I was sure he would say he knew just what would be the result all the time, and to come on home. But when I talked to him, and told him I had a chance to go to Anniston, he said 'Son, go on to Anniston and don't come back until you've made good.'"

You even wrote some letters to the newspapers about how good you were, didn't you Ty?

He made an appointment to either West Point or Annapolis, and he was dead set against baseball. I didn't tell him I was going to the Atlanta Journal at that time, and I used to get letters from towns all over the south telling me to watch a young fellow with Anniston named Cobb. The letters described what a hitter he was, how he could run the bases, and how he could play the outfield. The letters were signed John Brown, Phil Harris, Joe Thomson, and every other name.

"I wrote them all," Cobb admitted. "I knew you could give me the publicity I needed, and I used to write you every time I got a hit or made a good catch or did anything. The stories you wrote helped, too. It got me a job in Augusta again, and this time at the fancy salary of ninety dollars a month."

A year with Augusta and Detroit bought him for the then impressive price of \$500. If ever there was a greater bargain in baseball you try to name it. Wonder what a major league team would pay these days for a rookie who for 24 years had a batting average of .368 per year?

# ART OF BOWLING

In taking the second spare position for the cross-over, or Brooklyn, hit, station yourself two inches to the right of the ball and strike with the body to the angle shown in the accompanying diagram. Naturally, the hook is best. No good bowler throws a straight ball.

Regulation alleys are 41 inches wide and 60 feet long, and the ball breaks about eight feet from the pins.

I tell beginners to stay in the center of the alley, directly in front of the No. 1 pin.

In the delivery, it doesn't make any difference whether you take three steps or four, as long as you get your feet forward in bowling. Naturally, in the case of a left-handed bowler, it is the opposite. In other words, you deliver the ball with your right hand.

In that way you follow through, as in golf or any other game.

The foul line is there for two reasons. The first is that you may stay in back of it.

The other is that it enables you to look at a definite spot 12 or 14 feet in front of you, and you must hit that spot to obtain high scores.

In golf, you don't look at the hole. You keep your eye on the ball. In bowling, you don't look at the pins. You keep your eye on the spot where the ball is to hit.

# WAR AT SEA TAKES EIGHT SHIPS DURING WEEK-END

## DESTROYER FROM BRITISH FLEET IS MAJOR CASUALTY

LONDON, Jan. 22 (AP)—The war at sea claimed at least eight ships over the weekend, including the 1,538-ton British destroyer HMS Grenville and an estimated 100 lives.

The Grenville, a flotilla leader, went down in the North sea Saturday the victim of a mine of tonnage. The admiral announced eight men were known to have been killed and the admiral said 70 missing must be presumed to have lost their lives.

The Grenville was the fourth British destroyer lost.

Other ships lost:

The British steamer Persival of 1,985 tons was sunk after striking a mine off the northwest coast of Britain. Twelve crew members were believed lost.

The Swedish steamer Flamingo, 900 tons, which sank after hitting a mine while on route from Amsterdam to Gothenburg with stone and paper. Seventeen crew members were killed.

The British ship Tekla, of 1,215 tons, believed to have struck a mine off the northwest coast of Britain. The ship's owners reported the captain and eight members of the crew were missing.

At Hangö, Norway, it was reported the Norwegian ship Borea had picked up a seaman who said his ship, the Puxen, had been sunk in the North sea either by a mine or a torpedo. He said he did not know the fate of the rest of the crew.

The British tanker Caronvick, of 8,707 tons, exploded and sank within 20 minutes after it left a port on the northwest coast of Britain to undergo tests.

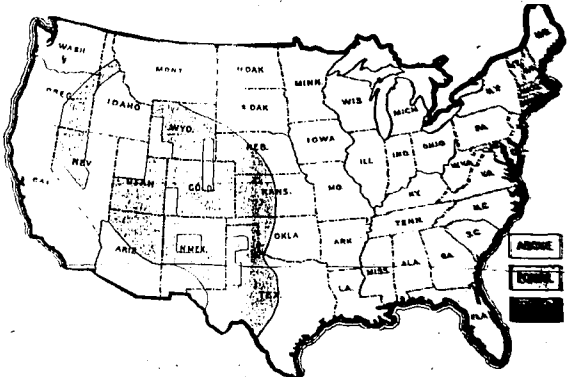
**Steamer Wrecked**

The British steamer Protevious, of 5,575 tons, was wrecked in the vicinity of a west coast port, presumably by a mine. There were no casualties.

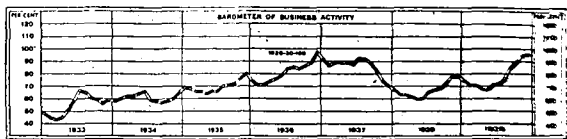
The Estonian steamer Nautic, of 2,050 tons, sank off the Shetland Islands. Its crew was said to have been rescued.

The 10,788-ton British liner Llandaff Castle, left London Friday for South Africa with 170 passengers and freight, limped back to a north coast port with a damaged bow as a result of a collision with a vessel in the same convoy.

## REDS WILL FIGHT FINN WAR TO END

MOSCOW, Jan. 22 (AP)—Russia will fight the Finnish war to the end, the 18th anniversary of Lenin's death, that it intends to conclude the Russo-Finnish war and that any attempt by foreign nations to intervene would be disastrous.

Further, an announcement that elections would be held March 24 in some portions of Russian occupied Finland was taken to be a tacit answer—and a denial—that Russia might hand over to Germany some areas adjoining Humana.

**Denounces Foreign Press**

The statement regarding Finland was made by Alexander Scherbakov, secretary of the Moscow Communist party, at a mass meeting in Lenin's honor at the grand opera house.

The statement was made in presence of Joseph Stalin, Premier-Foreign Commissar Vyacheslav Molotov and War Commissar Klement Voroshilov, among others.

Scherbakov denounced the foreign press because, he said, it was inciting a "holy dream" of intervention. Such incitements, he said, forgot the lessons of 1918 to 1920, when capitalist nations suffered "humiliating defeats" in Siberia, and the Ukraine, the Black sea area and at Archangel in the far north.

**Red Army Powerful**

"The young Red army was hungry and weaker than it is now," Scherbakov said. "Should they (interventionists) dare to intervene now they will face a modern, powerful Red army supported by the enthusiastic millions of the Soviet people."

Scherbakov said that Russia was determined to conclude the Finnish war and "liberate the Finnish people from the imperialist yoke."

**CHENKING**—A steamer carrying 600 passengers was cut in half today in a collision with a small steamer on the Yangtze river. Only 50 persons were saved.

**AMSTERDAM**—Officials of the Royal Netherlands Indies Airways said today eight persons—three Americans and five Indonesians—died on board, were killed in the crash of an air liner near Batavia.

**LONDON**—Government authorities, intensifying a drive to lighten anti-air and anti-submarine precautions, prepared today to re-examine 24,000 "enemy aliens" living in unconditional liberty in Britain.

**LONDON**—Hotels reported a booming business from honeymooners today as a result of the honeymoon levy for soldiers who marry on short leave.

**MIAMI, Fla.**—Schools were dismissed today in southeastern Florida because of a cold wave which has brought discomfort to the state for three days and threatened fruit and vegetable crops.

**WASHINGTON**—Embassy Suez was not expected until now, but a dispatch from the Arab League indicated that the Egyptian cabinet will meet in a report on the situation.

**TOKYO**—The American Embassy was understood to be seeking information from Japanese pulp mills on their action yesterday in selling James H. Young, contractor for the Japanese United News Service, and taking him in pulp headquarters for "questioning."

**BAHRAIN**—King Ibn Saud announced that he has granted a reprieve to a former police inspector who had been sentenced to death.

**BERLIN**—Field Marshal Hermann Goerring, as commander in chief of the entire project of the German-Polish state in German-occupied areas of Poland today, for the purpose of safeguarding it.

It is estimated that an Atlantic cable will be run for 1940 for Washington with the same line and conditions will pass to the ocean the day 1939.
