GIGANTIC RECEIVES IN FINLAND COLLAPSES

Lewis Predicts Defeat if Roosevelt Seeks 3rd Term Warns Mine Workers To Give No Backing If FDR Runs Again

COLUMBUS, O., Jan. 24 (U.P.)—President John L. Lewis predicted before delegates to his United Mine Workers' convention today that if President Roosevelt were drafted for a third term, he would go down to "ignominious defeat."

Lewis said he doubted Roosevelt would seek a third term. Lewis said political conditions made it "unwise, in my judgment, for this convention at this time to bestow its endorsement upon any candidate for the Presidency of the United States."

Opposes FDR

"I am one who believes President Roosevelt will not be a candidate for reelection," Lewis said. "Conceding that the Democratic convention could be correct or dropped into, re-nominating him, I am convinced that, with the conditions now confronting the nation and the dissatisfaction now permeating the minds of the people, his candidacy would result in ignominious defeat."

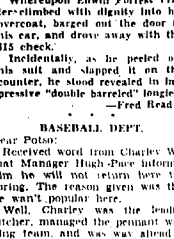

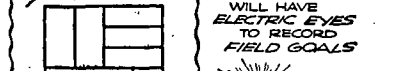

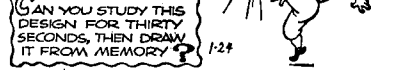

ALLIES QUARREL WITH RUMANIANS

LONDON, Jan. 24 (AP)—An allied dispute with Rumania over oil shipments to Germany added a new complication today to a serious diplomatic situation which now involved countries, belligerent and neutral, over most of the globe.

Not only had Rumania, according to reliable reports, insisted that foreign oil companies operating in Rumania provide their share of oil for Germany but it was complained here Rumania was withholding oil from the allies, presumably at Germany's demand.

Britain was understood to have made firm representations to Rumania and have added a clear intimation that permission for Rumania to obtain British products, including airplanes and other war materiel, might depend on a solution of the oil question.

In this as in other urgent diplomatic problems the basic question was the relation of belligerent nations to neutral ones, primarily in the light of the allied blockade against Germany.

GERMAN PLANES ATTACK ISLANDS

LONDON, Jan. 24 (AP)—German planes were reported to have dropped six bombs today on the Shetland Islands.

Messages from the islands said no damage was done by the bombs, dropped by three planes which renewed aerial activity over British naval and airplane bases north of Scotland.

British fighting planes went up against them. The air raid warning lasted 31 minutes.

One of the German planes flew high over the islands while another dived on the harbor, but did not attack.

The British planes failed to contact the three craft, which dodged behind high clouds and apparently flew away.

One plane, resembling a German Heinkel, dived at a steamer moored at a pier but did not attack.

Tiny, Complete Roman House—With Furnishings—Built by School Girl

A completely furnished authentic Roman house of the type built in the days of the early Roman empire, unbelievably intricate in detail and only three inches wide, four inches long and about three inches high, has been made by a junior high school girl who is a semi-invalid.

She is Mrs. Helen Stewart, and she made the house as a project in her Latin class taught by Miss Winifred Pizer. Despite the fact that she no longer attends school, she was out of school for a month, she is almost a straight-A student in Latin and the house is authentic in every detail.

Six Rooms

Her tiny house is red tiled roof, built by the Romans slanting to the center to catch rain water, lifts off the ground six inches, the atrium and the court, open to the sunning. Then the walls of the house lift up to reveal the main furnishings and mosaic floor.

The exterior of the house is white, fronting on the street, with the black mosaic pattern of a Roman woman, done in blue, green, red and black beads in modeling clay, and made by Marion Origas. Two working models of mosaics were made by Bill Merrill and Robert Van Orgeles.

War Implements

A bronze chariot, and all the implements of war including the shield, bow, sword and spear, were made by Bob Parker. An excellent relief map of Italy was modeled by Marian Tolbert. A wood-burned plaque of a Roman galley was done by Betty Lu Bolley, and a hut for a poor family, with a thatched roof, in striking contrast to the miniature house for a richer family, was made by Jean Parker.

Other projects were a model in clay of a rock carving by early Romans, found in the territory of Czechoslovakia, by Bruce McMillan, scrolls, wax tablets, soap carvings, maps and booklets.
