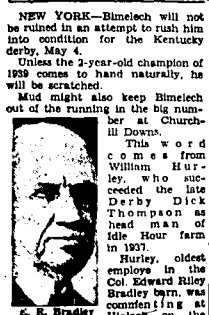

NEW YORK—Bimelech will not be ruined in an attempt to rush him into condition for the Kentucky derby, May 4.

Unless the 2-year-old champion of 1939 comes to hand naturally, he will be scratched.

Mud might also keep Bimelech out of the running in the big number one race at Churchill Downs.

This word comes from the late William Hurley, who succeeded the late Derby Dick Thompson as head man of Idle Hour farm in 1921.

Hurley, oldest employe in the Col. Edward Bradley barn, was commenting at E. E. Bradley Hialech on the fact that adverse weather conditions had temporarily halted the training of Derby eligibles. He will leave Miami Feb. 13 to personally take charge of Bimelech, now under the care of Alex Gordon, another old-timer who formerly pointed horses of the Coldstream stud.

"Since I entered this business 50 years ago in Chicago," says Hurley, "I have the reputation of being a turfman who never hurries horses for a race. My methods have not changed. If I feel the Bimelech is not quite keyed up for such a grueling mile and a quarter effort as the Derby so early in the season, I'll so inform Colonel Bradley with the recommendation that he be scratched.

Of course, I may be overruled by Colonel Bradley, but I know he has the same view.

Other Races

"Bimelech, in my opinion may turn out to be a great horse. There are many other big events for him to fill."

Black Toney's last son has never raced in 400 days and was withdrawn from the Arlington Futurity because the strip was not to his liking.

It would be a terrible disappointment to Colonel Bradley if Bimelech did not get to the post in Louisville on May 2. Bimelech was seriously ill last summer, has his heart set on winning his fifth derby with the colt, which as a juvenile last fall, he offered to match with any horse.

But like Hurley, Colonel Bradley believes that many promising colts have broken down while being swept into shape for the derby or as the result of expending so much money in early May.

So unless Bimelech snaps into it naturally, the water buck favorite is fairly certain to be kept in his stall in Derby day.

New Problems

Like all other trainers, Hurley and Ben Jones of the Calumet stable, now so hot as Hialech, have no formula for conditioning winners.

"Horses are like people," explains Jones. "Some are steady... other fractious... hard to get along with. It's a new problem every time you start out with one. You've got to study the habits of some of the smarter horses. Often you have to fool them to get the best out of them."

Jones is a tall, thickly-set, ruddy-faced man in his 60s, with a look in his blue eyes so frequently seen in good horsemen who know who go down to the sea in ships.

Asked how he broke in the re-asked. "You know how it is. First you own a saddle horse, then show horses, and the first thing you know you wind up with race horses, and then you're started right."

ART OF BOWLING

Regardless of how good you become or how long you bowl, you're going to face a certain number of splits.

The only thing to do is to try to make them, which in many cases can be done with a little judgment.

Think nothing of 7 when it is left standing with 5 and 8. Concentrate on and shoot for the center of the space between 5 and 8.

If you make this shot properly, 3 generally will be slid over and into 7 to complete a spare.

A thin hit to the left of the head pin sometimes leaves the 5-8, one of the more difficult splits.

In this case, the ball must be rolled so that its path at point of contact is directly in the center of the space between the pins. The ball is wide enough to get both.

Exceptional control is required of a look on this shot.

Don't drop it on the corner, as when shooting for the 1-3 pocket.



The ball is wide enough to topple both pins in a 5-8 split.

Throw it either down the side or through the gutter.

This will cause the ball to take the eighth later... sweep it in the gutter.

Another way with a hook is to move a bit to the left of the alley and aim for the space between the pins. Thrown correctly, the ball will sweep toward the gutter, then cut in and score a direct hit.

Unless the bowler has fine control of the hook, a straight ball is preferable when the target is a 5-8 split.

Sometimes a hard split, such as the 4-8-10, can be made more easily with a backup ball, because it will hit 4 going into it, rather than away from it, as would be the case with a regular hook.
