Britain far exceed those carried by when in the struggle of 1914-18; although, even then, war had ceased to be a job for soldiers alone.

Before the World war, there were only 30 women

to every 100 men employed in England. In 1918, fe-male workers had picked up so many jobs left by sold-iers that the ratio had risen to 56 women per 100 men. Last year, England had 42 women for every 100 men

It is estimated that when the war gets into full swing and men now in factories are called to the col-ors, there will be 85 women for every 100 men work-ing in England. Of the 22,636,000 jobs, 10,449,000 will be filled by female workers.

France today has 280,000 women workers busy in its munitions industry. Many of them are wives of soldiers who never before had a job, but who have tak-en over their husbands' places in the factories. Some are dressmakers and seamstresses, and other have been gamered from industries that have suffered






