

Don't Cloud the Recreation Issue

An energetic controversy is in full swing in Twin Falls on this issue: Shall the city provide approxi-mately \$65 monthly for rent and maintenance of the recreation center? creation center? The council has not yet taken definite action since

one member was absent last Monday. But three out of the four who were present went on record informal-ly against the proposal. Civic clubs, Parent-Teacher

Jy against the proposal. Civic clubs, Parent-Teacher associations, the Legion and other groups are official-ly on record as favoring continuance of the center. Greatest danger in the controversy is that the main issue may be clouded by a subsidiary issue which seems to be at the bottom of opposition—resentment at the government for its threat to withdraw paid recreation leaders if rent money is not forthcoming. That resentment, however, should not be permitted to befog the important fact that a recreational pro-gram of a fairly comprehensive nature is more and more becoming an essential element in community life. This fact becomes glaringly apparent on in-quiry into the status of certain localities in Twin Falls where play facilities are inadequate and leisure time where play facilities are inadequate and leisure time of youngsters may easily be diverted into destructive channels

Twin Falls has twice in recent months refuective channels. Twin Falls has twice in recent months refuect to supply rent to government agencies—the WPA zone office and the FSA. In those instances the refusal met with general approbation because both incidents did carry the aspect of governmental "dumping" of an agency. The Evening Times was thoroughly in accord with both rejections. But a recreational program is another matter. That activity here was initiated by the Parent-Teacher as-sociation in the form of summer play, it was carried on for two years thereafter by financial aid of the city itself. It is the city council's prerogative now, of course, to say it does not wish WPA sharing or assist-ing in that work. But without federal aid, the program should not be permitted to lapse. Since leadership under the

But with or without federal aid, the program should not be permitted to lapse. Since leadership under the present set-up doesn't cost the city a nickel, it would seem that careful thought should be given to the mat-ter of dispensing with that leadership. Aside from this matter of the governmental finger in the pie, we need directed play activities. No amount of table-thumping "sturdy individualism" changes that fact.

"Black-Jack Justice" Censured

A renewed pledge that the U. S. supreme court would be vigilant in the matter of civil liberties and constitutional rights for even the lowliest and most unpopular of citizens came from the lips of Justice Hugo L. Black, the other day, when he spoke for the unanimous court in a decision involving third degree methods methods. The words of the southern justice, who warned that

The words of the southern justice, who warned that the "courts stand against any which that blow as havens of refuge for those who might otherwise suf-fer," must have fallen heavily upon the consciences not only of enforcement authorities, guilty of rubber-hosing and torture-chamber justice, but also those of self-appointed vigilantes. Civil liberties, the justice said, cannot be "safely entrusted to secret inquisi-torial processes."

torial processes." The unequivocal language of Justice Black, speak-ing for the nation's highest tribunal, comes as a re-freshing reassurance to Americans, who have watched with sqme misgivings the collapse of civil rights abroad, and, in some instances, right here at home.

What Father Coughlin meant, no doubt, is that the press will not fall for reams of propaganda. In that, he is correct. The columns of American newspapers are, at all times, open to earnest controversies of in-terest to their readers. When such controversies are individual or an idea out of proportion to its signif-icance, the press is not willing to cooperate. The past several years have been trying ones for the press in general. Propaganda is sometimes dressed in alluring robes, and it is not easy to distinguish it from true news. During the strain of modern events, American newspapers generally have performed a






